2021 has seen some of the Covid restrictions removed but as yet we have not held any face to face Council meetings, but Katherine has been able to return to working from the Office.

July saw the dispersal sale of the Bybeck stud and although a sad event prices were deservedly good. On behalf of the Society I would like to thank the Roberts family for their involvement over the past 20 years and wish Colin and Heather a happy and healthy retirement. There are a number of Fell rights on the Howgills for ponies included in the sale of Bybeck, and hopefully these will be taken up by the purchaser.

It was pleasing that the Breed Show was able to run as near normal as possible this year. Entries and the number of spectators were at a pleasing level and the Show was a success. Thanks go to those who work tirelessly, often behind the scenes, to make this so.

The Drybarrows Trophy, given to the prefix that gains the most points in the in hand classes at the Stallion show, the Breed show and the Southern show, was not awarded in 2020, but for 2021 it is based on just two shows as the Stallion show did not take place. HRH the Duke of Edinburgh was a staunch supporter of the Fell pony achieving much success driving his team of Fells and promoting the breed world wide. In 2014 Prince Philip presented the FPS with an annual award to be given internationally to a single or multiple turnout of registered Fell ponies, for achievement in Driving. April saw us lose a long-time Fell breeder, Dennis Williamson. Along with his wife Gwen, Dennis bred over 40 Fell ponies with the Tarnbeck prefix between 1977 and 2010.

We lost another of the Society's staunch supporters this year, George Guy. A larger than life character many of us will miss George's friendly banter and endless stories, you knew when George wasn't well when he stopped trying to wind you up. A breeder of over 60 Severnvale Fell ponies since 1994, George was a great ambassador for Fells, especially in the South West. His prefix will be continued by his granddaughter, Leanne Harman, who will no doubt continue her grandfather's good work.

Sarah Bradley, whose family breed the Kinniside Fell ponies, also passed away this year.

Our condolences go to the friends and family of all those members we have lost recently.

Hopefully everything will be back to normality next year as we all look forward to the FPS Centenary Celebrations.

Trophies and Awards for 2021

The Queen's Trophy is presented annually to a person or persons who, in the opinion of the current chairman and approved by Council, has promoted the Fell pony breed by work, recreation, or study.

The Edinburgh Prize for Driving is awarded internationally to a single or multiple turnout of registered Fell ponies, for achievement in Driving.

The Lownthwaite Rob trophy is awarded annually to the pony that has done the most to publicise the breed outside the show ring. $\,$

Peahill Basil Award is awarded internationally to a single registered Fell Pony for achievements as a veteran 15 years and over.

Secretary & Treasurer's Report - Autumn 2021

As I am writing this report we have quickly moved into Autumn with dark nights and mornings making our before and after work chores seem less enjoyable. However, we are excited to be looking forward to our Centenary Celebrations in 2022. The Centenary Committee have been working on this for some months now to ensure we are able to celebrate this special occasion in style.

Interest in the breed continues to flourish and sales in ponies increased by around 50 compared to the January - September period last year.

I moved back into the office in August after working mainly from home since March 2020. Thank you all for your patience during this difficult time.

Thankfully there has been some normality resumed this Summer with many events taking place as normal, although the majority of Agricultural Shows, particularly in Cumbria were unable to go ahead. We were particularly pleased to be able to hold our Breed Show in August.

Our Display Team were able to attend some events this year, promoting the Fell Pony to the general public, and even enjoyed meeting with HRH Princess Anne at the Westmorland County Show in September.

Council have continued to meet, although this has been via Zoom, but it has ensured that FPS business has continued as normal.

The Society is categorised as 'At Risk' on the RBST Watchlist for 2021/22. At Risk breed status represents those breeds with lower numbers than ideal and with a degree of inbreeding that gives cause for concern.

Thank you to our Patron, Her Majesty The Queen, for her donation sent together with warmest wishes for the forthcoming year.

Many thanks also to the Horserace Betting Levy Board for receipt of the Rare Breeds grant. Their continued support is very much appreciated.

Membership for 2021 is at just under 1100. This figure is up on last year and we are delighted to have processed well over 200 new memberships, some coming back to us after a break and some completely new members. We also have new memberships waiting to be processed for 2022.

I would like to thank President, Christine Morton, and Chairman, Peter Boustead, as well as Council, for their continued support; also thanks to my colleagues Chris and Elizabeth.

From the Office









- Registration / Passport application forms cannot be downloaded from the website; they are only available by applying to the office. Do not photocopy the form. We are receiving a number of forms where the description is very difficult to read and the location of the chip has not been recorded by the vet. The description must be printed in block letters. All whorls must be recorded in black ink and all white must be recorded in red ink. Please read the guidance notes carefully prior to completion of the forms. Any forms incomplete or incorrectly completed will be returned.
- Passport Applications / Vet Report Forms / DNA & FIS sample packets Please make sure that the full registered name with correct spelling is recorded (stable/pet names are not acceptable).
- The current Equine Identification regulations require the applications for foal passports to arrive with the Society within 6 months of birth or 30 November whichever is the later. However, in addition to the above, FPS regulations require applications to be received by no later than 31 December (irrespective of age) or the application will be treated as late and will require late registration fees and confirmation of the sire and dam by DNA. Double fees may also apply if applications are received during December.
- Passports are returned by Royal Mail 'Signed For' in the UK, and with a 'Proof of Posting' overseas. If you wish to have your passport posted by 'Special Delivery' in the UK or 'International Track and Sign' overseas, please add £5.00 to the fee and let us know you wish to have it returned this way.
- Service books are not issued automatically, so if you need a book you must request one. Service certificates / notifications of coverings online must be notified by 31 December in the year of covering, if not any resulting foal will have to be DNA typed to confirm the sire prior to registration. If you choose to input the details online you will receive an email acknowledging the successful receipt. If you don't receive an email the information has not been received and you should contact the Society without delay.

When completing stallion service certificates please complete all the details fully, including full name and registration number of stallion and mare and full dates of covering to include at least month and year. Month on its own with no year is unacceptable.

• Any changes to a passport should in the first instance be notified to the Fell Pony Society. Please do not notify the Central Equine Database; the Society will do this once the changes have been verified.

For example

- change of address/contact details of the current owner,
- castration
- change of ownership
- notification of death
- change in 'food chain status'.

If you are unsure of the procedure then please ask.

The above rates apply from 2021. If you pay by Standing Order, please check with your bank that the Order is for the correct amount.

The range of overseas membership types mirrors the UK types, with an additional charge to cover the cost of overseas postage.

An associate member is unlikely to own a pony and therefore will not wish to take advantage of the pony related privileges of membership.

Family membership may be applied for by married or co-habiting couples and their children under the age of 18 years, all residing at the same address. The two adult members enjoy the rights and privileges of full membership, and the children the rights and privileges of junior membership. Full details are in section 2 of the Articles of Association. Please note that Family membership does not apply to adult couples without children; in these cases the membership is for 2 Full memberships (separate membership forms required).

Membership Renewal

Society memberships fall due on 1 January annually.

No member is entitled to vote for the election of Council if his/her subscription to the Society has not been paid on or before 15 February, or to vote at an EGM / AGM if his/her subscription has not been paid by the date of the meeting. Please have your membership card ready to show on arrival.

If subscriptions have not been received by the time we send out the Spring Magazine, a reminder slip is enclosed with it. Alternatively, members can arrange to pay their subscription by standing order on 1 January each year; or pay by bank transfer.

Please contact the FPS office by email if you have any queries regarding the issue of and updating of passports for Fell Ponies in the EU, such as foal registrations, late registrations, duplicate passports, transfer of ownership, transfer to gelding etc.

We can:

Issue Stallion Licences, stallion service books and accept service details online.

Accept FPS membership applications - for new EU members and renewals

Issue FIS test kits to EU members

Issue DNA test kits to EU members

Issue prefix applications for EU breeders to register a prefix with the Central Prefix Register in the UK

Owners of ponies in Germany, Belgium and Hungary can apply to the NFPS for passports and/or duplicates. With regard to new passports, these ponies will receive Fell Pony passports with full pedigree information. The NFPS requires that the DNA of both parents of a foal is sampled and where possible verified. DNA testing can be done in The Netherlands (Van Haeringen Laboratories).

Tribute to HRH The Duke of Edinburgh

We were very sad to hear the news that Prince Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh, had passed. He was a fabulous Ambassador for the equine world and Fell ponies in particular, competing internationally with his Fell team and being a past President of the FPS.

"HRH" was an innovator, a problem solver, and the founder of an astonishing number of admirable projects: among them, The World-Wide Fund for Nature, the Prince Philip Cup for Pony Club games, The Duke of Edinburgh Awards, the sport of competitive Horse Driving Trials and the Fell Pony Society's Edinburgh Award for Driving.



He loved the Lowther Trials and all the horse driving trials; it appeared that at such events he was able to dispense with much of the Royal bodyguard presence. At Lowther he used to drop in at the Fell Pony Society's little square marquee (including a Fell pony in a pen) and sit in the back, in private, drinking tea and talking about ponies with Molly Laing. Later, when he retired from competitive driving, he was seen spectating at Lowther driving a tandem of Fell ponies.

We extend our deepest sympathy to H.M. The Queen.

The FPS Magazine is delivered by post to members twice a year. It can be sent to you by e-mail instead, if you ask for it. Details of how to do that are on the FPS web site on the Magazines page. Very few members have asked, so people obviously like to have the printed Magazine in their hands! We still send it out to 99.9% of our members as a printed copy.

"Back numbers" of the Magazine can be read on the FPS web site as PDFs. We don't upload the previous copy for public access until the new Volume has been sent to members.

Thanks to John Slater and Trevor Good who digitised many of the printed issues in the 1990s, we carry almost all the back numbers, starting with the first volume of "Fell Pony News" in 1968. This makes the FPS web site a great resource of information about the breed.

After a pandemic-induced hiatus, everybody was delighted to be back at Berkshire College of Agriculture for the thirty-first Southern Show. The weather was perfect, not too hot and not too cold, and judges Hayley Reynolds and Sarah Prior were kept busy judging a succession of quality ponies. The in-hand mare classes were well-filled and owner/bred ponies swept the board. Sue Petritz was thrilled to win a strong Mares 9 years+ class with Richmond Deborah. The Mare Championship went to the Broodmare winner, Helen Wenden's Brocklebank Chardonnay, with Deb Vychinski's Boutime Esther, winner of the younger mares class, in reserve. In the gelding ring, which was less well attended, Liam Bruno celebrated his 16th birthday by winning the Gelding Championship with his mother Emma Drewett's Meadowvalley the Governor. In hand stallions was won by Kate Scorey-Sayer's Llanai Guardsman, shown by his breeder Philip Ward-Burton.

Youngstock classes had low entries but there were quality winners in each age group. Gemma Chambers was delighted to win the Foals class with Fellacre Lady Fenella. A new business venture for Fellacre stud owners Gemma Cooper and Katie Saberton meant a stud reduction, and the filly's sire was exported to the Czech Republic in June this year. Gemma and Katie are delighted to have this filly to continue the line. Rachel and Leanne Nicholl's Greenleigh Special Addition won the two year olds. Youngstock champion was Yearling winner Boutime Peaky Blinder, owned and bred by Deb Vychinski, and reserve the three year old winner Wellbrow Leonora, owned by Tabitha Bennett.

From a quality selection of ponies in the inhand championship the judges picked Brocklebank Chardonnay as champion, with Boutime Peaky Blinder in reserve. This was followed by the Inter-Area group in-hand championship, for ponies representing their FPS Area Support Groups. Boutime Peaky Blinder took the Bewcastle Boy Blue Trophy for the Midlands West Support Group, and Richmond Deborah was reserve for the South West Support Group.

While the showing judges went off for their lunches, activity was still underway in the Working Hunter Ring under judge Malcolm Fry. Mosshey Centurion, owned and ridden by Georgia Norton, was WHP Champion, with Charlotte Knight and Scotshaven Bella Augusta reserve. The dressage arena held two NPS Dressage qualifying classes; Rowena Day and Townend Bellboy II won the Novice and Harriet Burgess and Burnhead Henry the Prelim. Sue Petritz continued her successful day with Richmond Deborah by winning the walk/trot test.

Ridden classes were keenly contested, starting with the BSPS Liverpool International semi-final qualifier which was won by Mosshey Centurion with Lunesdale Warlord the other qualifier. Six year old Harvey Fletcher-Hodge rode his grandmother's Inglegarth Preview to take the Children's Championship. He is more used to riding something smaller, as he qualified his Shetland pony for the Royal International Horse Show when he was three. Due to a reduction in entries over the past few years the ridden classes are now for combined mares and geldings, and mares swept the board. The Nicholls' Lunesdale Warlord won the ridden stallions. 





Learning With Fells stud visits: August 2021

On 15th August we visited the Mallinson family at Hethersgill, breeders of the Hardendale ponies. We spent a very enjoyable morning looking at and comparing a variety of ponies. We started with two lovely mares, the younger one being the daughter of the older mare. We compared the two mares, and their very handsome colt foals, discussing conformation points. We then looked at three 3 year old mares, and talked about their various attributes, and how they are likely to mature; it was very interesting to compare the differences and note the similarities. Two very lovely bay mares were next. Again, the older mare was the dam of the younger. We discussed the conformation points inherited from the dam, together with those inherited from the sire of the younger mare. All of these mares have scanned in foal.

We were then introduced to a mare and stunning dappled grey gelding who were full siblings - two very different ponies.

After lunch we watched the three 3 year olds loose in the school. Barry and Tracey discussed their movement, and the action of each one, which was particularly interesting. We asked them to pick out their own personal favourite and to discuss why they had chosen that pony - this was a very interesting discussion!

14 year old Georgina then brought out her novice pony, Casper, to the school. We discussed his action, and how to build upon the natural paces of a pony. Georgina then tacked up her open pony, Rosie, and we watched her warming up, and then doing a show for us. Tracey discussed the finer points of a ridden show, and confirmed the importance of correct training...and time....

To end the day, we had a lively discussion about breeding and the intricacies of the Stud Book. It was a great day and I would thank Barry, Tracey and Georgina for their time and generosity in sharing their knowledge and obvious commitment to their ponies.



On 20th August we visited Winterbutlee Farm, the home of Andrew and Michelle Thorpe, and the Wellbrow Fell ponies. After coffee, we headed up the hill from the farm to meet the first group of mares, their foals, and stallion. Andrew talked about the stallion and each mare, four of whom had foals, and explained a number of conformation points and their impact on the movement of the ponies.

We then moved on to second group of mares, running with a lovely grey stallion. Again, we discussed the foals, and also the importance of finding the right stallion. Andrew explained how he decides which mares will run with which stallions, including breeding lines, conformation points and, to some extent, height. We talked about the Breed standards, and the particular importance of certain characteristics on the hardiness and action of the ponies. From the hilltop we could







see the hills and moorland where the mares run - as far as the eye could see on the high and exposed moors above the Rossendale valley.

We drove to the other side of the valley to another group of mares, with a young stallion in his first year of covering. Andrew talked about this stallion and his hopes for future progeny. This group contained mares of slightly differing shapes and sizes so that Andrew and Michelle will get a good idea of the stamp of offspring and the influence of this particular stallion.

We returned to the farm to meet more mares, their foals and stallion. Andrew discussed the lines of each, and the impact of previous stallions on his herd. Andrew explained the process of managing the ponies through the seasons and indeed, the years, from foaling to retirement.

We went to see the yearlings who are now down from the hill at the farm. They are a lovely bunch of young black and bay ponies - very interested in what was going on and full of promise.



I was struck by the amazing bond Andrew has with his ponies - even those running on the hill. A mare who stands out in this respect is Wellbrow Pat (above) who came to see us, as wild as the hill she lives on, but her trust in Andrew was clear. The gentle, but inquisitive nature of these lovely ponies is such a positive characteristic. They are a credit to Andrew and Michelle.

I have very much enjoyed my visits to the Mallinsons and the Thorpes. I would encourage anyone with an interest in the breed to sign up to the Learning with Fells initiative. These breeders are so generous with their knowledge and experience, will answer any question, and will share their love of their ponies and the breed.

Launch of the new Grassroots Online Registry

Announcing the launch of the new look Grassroots Online Registry which replaces the old Pedeweb. The registry can be accessed via the Society website or direct at www.grassroots.co.uk/fell.html using your normal Breed Society Member Number and password. It gives access to the whole Society database and allows you to 'Manage Your Animal Records'.

Manage Your Animal Records

The system opens with a list of all the animals in your registered ownership.

- · Click on an animal to view its details, pedigree and progeny list
- · Click on the magnifying glass (top left) to search the whole database
- · Click on the menu (top right) to make changes
- · Click on the magnifying glass (top left) to search for people

If you have animals for sale - please go to the menu and flag them 'For Sale'. This information will not have come across from the old system.

The Registry is very straightforward to use but a 'step by step' guide is available on the Grassroots website home.grassroots.co.uk

- Flag animals 'For Sale' to appear in the Online Registry

Service Certificates Online

Log on from the link on the FPS website using your usual Member Number and Password.

- Then click on 3 red horizontal lines top right.
- from drop down menu select Service Certificates.
- Click on My Males in the red box and select the stallion to be recorded.
- The name will appear beside the My Males box.
- $^{\circ}$ Then input the service dates and enter part of name / address of mare owner, a list of mares owned will appear, select the mare (or mares if service dates are the same). Click continue and mare will appear with the dates for you to check, you can print the service certificate at this stage. Click the back button to cancel or submit to confirm.
 - You will not be able to input a date in advance.

Please note that if the Service Certificates have been successfully recorded you will receive a confirmation email from the FPS. If you do not receive a confirmation email within 7 days then please contact the FPS.



Kirsty Edwards and Shadowcroft Hero

From Kirsty Edwards & Shadowcroft Hero:

Often the media focuses on winning to celebrate success and of course that's important, it rewards years of hard work and experience that can't be achieved overnight. There is also another side to this wonderful breed though that's not always celebrated.

I'd like to share Hero's successes this year: he continues to work in a small riding school, bringing joy and delight to a range of riders from tiny tots, to Accessibility Mark clients, to one client who is training to be a cavalry rider. When clients ride him for in-house competitions, he often wins. He's careful with them all and adapts his behaviour to his rider (although he is still rather strong on the ground - we used him to demonstrate that fact during a demonstration with Avon Fire and Rescue handlers!).

For me, I'm slowly developing more confidence and skill and Hero is instrumental in that journey. We've attended the Dorset Fell Show, the Bath and West Show, and Search for a Star this year - all things I didn't think I'd achieve. Whilst our results weren't great, there's a balance to be had so that he can still do his 'day job' without becoming too strong or fizzy which wouldn't suit me either (yet). We've also had our second season at Quest, stepping up to Prelim level this year and finishing just one place outside of the regional championships. Last year we finished our Intro debut in 10th place at the regionals. This has given me the confidence to try some affiliated dressage later this year and to try Novice classes next year - again something I didn't think I could achieve having started riding as an adult and having many gaps over the years.

Sometimes, when I see pages and pages of red ribbons, HOYS tickets and colourful sashes, I feel a little envious that we haven't yet achieved these things, but I wanted to celebrate our journey to encourage others to share theirs more often because the 'little' wins are so important. Each combination has their own challenges and successes and I'd definitely recommend Fell Ponies as a way of creating a partnership that will take you to unexpected places and bring many, many opportunities for learning.

If I'm ever in doubt about how far we can go together, I only need to watch my coach ride Hero to see that he has more to give and I have more to learn! Thanks to Hero, I'm now continuing my BHS education and have the confidence to ride other horses again. We've had a great year and are looking forward to what the future brings.

From Jadine Huxtable:

This winter saw the highest number of Fell Ponies located all over the country complete the Top Barn 12 Week Challenge. The challenge is designed to keep owners accountable over a period of 12 weeks during the toughest months of horse ownership. Owners 'pledged' to spend a set amount of time training with their horses each week, over the period of 3 months from January to March. These time pledges ranged from 3 hours per week to 15 hours per week and had to be documented on the group's social media pages where a community of over 3000 horse owners come together to support each other.

Despite this year's challenging weather and the global pandemic, it was a real tribute to the breed and owners who managed to complete this challenge or for those that couldn't complete but took part anyway, showing the wider group of horse owners just









what our Fell Ponies are capable of! The breed was represented across all disciplines and ages of pony from yearlings to those well into their twenties.

Taking part in the challenge has resulted in many ponies ready for the spring and summer, many starting the season fitter and in better shape for competition; it also meant that owners could try something new - maybe jumping, dressage, western or in hand tasks. A huge congratulations to all that took part and to those that completed the challenge! From Keren Masters and Lydvale Ellenor:

I decided this year I was going to try lots of different types of events with Ellenor, so I got myself a new instructor, Sophie Trigidgo Port, and started a bit of jumping at the beginning of the season. Our first show out was NPS area 26 - we did the novice working hunter, which we won. She loved it!

After that we went to WPCS at Royal Cornwall show ground. The weather was horrendous, I don't think I've ever been so wet. Ellenor was a true professional and the weather didn't bother her. She won both her in-hand classes, took both ring

championships (alongside her friend Tredellans Jewel who took reserve champion), then the silver medal championship and reserve Supreme in-hand of the whole show. We won the open ridden class in fantastic company, and took Reserve ridden champion.

At Devon County Show, Ellenor won a massive Fell, Highland and Dales in-hand class, and took M&M champion and Fell pony champion. In the afternoon we entered our first county ridden class where we came 3rd and best Ridden Fell pony. We were invited back the next day for the Cuddy Supreme. It was an honour to represent the breed.

NPS championships was next. We had never been before so this was a big thing for us. In the open ridden class we were placed 5th in amazing company and I was the only amateur

rider in the class. We were placed well in all of our finals and had an amazing time. Our first HOYS qualifier was at NPS area 10 at Chard. Never did I think we would get placed. She was the smallest pony in the class but she didn't care. We were 5th with the 2nd highest conformation mark. I actually cried when we were pulled in as I couldn't believe it! She won reserve in-hand champion, which was the icing on the cake.

At the Royal Cornwall Equine show we won a massive open ridden class, then took overall M&M reserve champion.

We have also started dressage, gaining a score of over 71% in our first Prelim and we have qualified for the Dressage championships at Hartpury next year! Ellenor truly is an all rounder, she will try anything you ask of her. Credit to Bob and Sue McNamara, her breeders, and Sophie Trigidgo Port for making me believe in myself and Ellenor.





New Daughter Society in Denmark

The first Fell arrived in Denmark approximately 18 years ago. Sinnce then breeders and importers alike have ensured a steady growth in the Danish Fell pony population and today we are counting around 300 Fell ponies in Denmark. As seen with many other breeds, interest groups formed, all culminating in the establishment of the Association in 2007, which was the starting point of the Danish Fell Pony Association also called Dansk Fell Pony Forening (DFPF). DFPF has visions for the future for the Danish Fell ponies, but behind the vision is a deep respect for the work of representing a growing group of individual Fell pony owners. Most importantly it has been imperative that the preservation of the Fell ponies and the heritage from which they originate, is the founding stone in DFPF ideology.

As the population of Fell ponies grew in Denmark so did the need for political structure, joint cooperation between the European countries and a closer cooperation and inspiration from and with The Fell Pony Society and its representatives. With Brexit and the challenges it represented and the approval process for DFPF within Denmark and EU it felt natural that we became a even more integrated part of the political agenda for equines and another representative for the Fell ponies in EU. All of this started the agenda for the current DFPF board: not only did we wish to become a bigger part of the Fell pony world, we also hoped for the honorable title of Daughter Society for the Fell Pony Society, and early this fall, this became a reality for DFPF.

The work for us has just started. There are many issues to be addressed in the Brexit future, hopefully with a successful outcome. We can however safely say that we have started a new chapter in Denmark, a Daughter Society chapter with exciting challenges, people and Ponies to look forward to, all the while still doing what we love the most which is ensuring the Fell pony breed is seen as the beautiful, versatile, agile, talented family pony that we all know and love.

When 2022 arrives so will the Danish Fell pony people - we are known for our purple shirts and loud laughs - so when you see us in UK for the Stallion and anniversary show, don't hold back, come see us. We love to learn more about the ponies and their native environment.

Conservation and Grazing Sub-committee

Breeders Survey

Despite not being able to meet face to face the sub-committee have been busy putting together a Breeders Survey. This is not a "head count" but an attempt to gather first-hand facts and figures about the type of ground our members keep their ponies on and how they manage their ponies.

The responses will enable the FPS to give much more accurate information during discussions with Government bodies and environmental organisations, such as how many ponies are running on the fell commons, kept on fell allotments and intakes and on other types of enclosed fell or rough grazing areas, and at what times of year, and also any other types of grazing systems that they use.

We would like to know more about the types of problems and also successes that breeders are having, and in turn we can use that information to help other breeders in similar situations, or indeed, people who are just starting out as breeders.

The survey is being sent out to all breeders we have contact details for and it can be completed on line, or printed out. If you are a breeder and haven't received a copy, please contact myself or Sue Millard (details in the front of the Magazine). If you need help to complete it, again, please contact us.

I would ask that all breeders complete the survey. Your information and experiences are as important as those of anyone else who breeds Fell ponies. Sharing that is your way to help FPS to help you and others.

Rare Breeds Survival Trust

Several members of Council, including those who are also members of our sub-committee recently sat in on a Zoom meeting with the Rare Breeds Survival Trust about some of the changes to Agricultural payments, namely ELMS. This was a very interesting meeting as it related specifically to Native Livestock and Equines. There was too much detail to go into here, but if anyone would like to see the slides from the meeting let me know and I can forward the email to you.

University Thesis

I also recently took part in a short interview for a young lady who is doing Conservation Grazing as part of her University Thesis. She has been focussing on Exmoors in particular, but wanted to also learn about Fell ponies.

Lastly, I would just like to ask you all to keep an eye out for any possible grazing sites that might be suitable for our ponies to go onto. Grazing sites don't usually come looking for us, it is a matter of being proactive and finding suitable areas.

Trainee Judges Scheme 2020-2021

Despite the inevitable disruption caused by Covid 19 over the last year, several staunch enthusiasts have continued to plug away at their course of learning and assessment as they worked through the Fell Pony trainee judges scheme. Our probationers have been exemplary in the way they have conducted themselves under challenging and ever changing circumstances, adhering to the special measures put in place to keep themselves, judges and competitors safe whilst also making the most of the few opportunities they had to actually get in the ring.

As a result of the delays to training and the lack of shows this year, the committee has decided to move our annual assessment day to the Spring of 2022. We would heartily welcome any further applications for the trainee judges scheme for the season of 2022.

Following application and the assessment day, during which applicants are asked to demonstrate their knowledge of ponies both practically by judging an array of ponies before them, and theoretically by answering a range of hypothetical questions, suitable candidates are put forward for training. At this point, experienced master judges will be assigned to each candidate and they will act as a mentor to their trainee during the course of their time on the scheme. Trainees will be expected to attend a number of shows, the object of which is to learn from the judge on the day about their approach to judging fell ponies, about different types and styles of shows and showing, and most importantly to demonstrate their understanding of the breed and develop confidence in doing so.

It is only through the nurturing of new generations of high quality judges that the Fell Pony Society, and all other native breed societies, can ensure that the quality of the ponies produced and bred from going forward conforms to the breed standard that makes the Fell pony so unique. Christine: We will definitely need a fire extinguisher and all our Health and Safety paperwork. Trading standards down there are pretty hot on spot checking that all is in order.

Sue M: I think this may be an occasion when we also need the Westmorland flag, don't you?

Christine: Both Cumberland and Westmorland please.

Sue M: I'm just rendering our two videos of Lowther 2015 and Black Combe 2021 so I'm hoping for an electricity hookup on site. My 2 older laptops won't currently (haha) run without mains input. I won't bring the work laptop because there's some FPS material on it but I have laptop batteries due to be delivered tomorrow so belt and braces.

Sue M: Someone on a countryside forum suggested that for future possible needs we could buy a suitcase generator - small, quiet and will run 8 hours for light loads like tech equipment.

Susan B: Panic over, we do have electric.

Sue M: But now my brain is scrambled. Am reduced to writing luggage labels for all the varied bags I will be loading tomorrow... Office merchandise, ironing board and CHAIR are all loaded and locked in for the night.

Christine: Remember the tape for the trailer roof, don't want to wake up wet on Thursday morning.

Susan B: I will remind Rachael - she has it at the moment for Phil's abscessed foot.

The weather was red hot for the setting-up day on Tuesday 7 September, and by the time the tent frame was up and clad in its big black covers we all needed a shower.

8 September



On Wednesday the electricity socket still didn't work. However as I was on my way to tell the Show Office about it for the third time, two electricians appeared, vanished round the hedge and flicked a switch on the other side, and hey presto, we had power. The show ground was already busy with socially distanced crowds of visitors. By mid morning the sunshine was so strong we decided we would have to link-in a newer, brighter monitor to the oldest laptop to display its video.

The identity of our Very Important Visitors was still a mystery. We had no idea who had









asked for us to appear on Thursday and we even wondered whether we'd been hoaxed. But eventually the information was released!

Susan B: Keep this a big secret please. We have been told our visitors tomorrow are Sophie Countess of Wessex and Princess Anne. Visiting RDA and us, that's why we are strategically placed next to each other. They will be here at 11:45.

I'm not saying that's why we began to make fools of ourselves, but inevitably we did. Because of the heat we bought huge ice creams and they welded themselves to each other between leaving the van and arriving at the stand. Not content with that, they melted onto us. Then Susan B, wearing the remains of a dollop of ice cream, managed to step down out of the horse trailer into a bowl of washing up water - I gather it's not the first time, and we'll have to watch her. She asked us how we were, and she was very interested in the ponies. We talked about how we've been promoting Fell ponies with our displays and she said we were doing a great job. It was an honour to be able to chat with her in such a laid back and informal way, and in fact, in the general light-hearted scrum of people passing, there were wheelchairs and pushchairs and attendant families who simply didn't see anything but photographers blocking the alley and a big group of people talking about ponies!

Her Royal Highness then joined the Countess at the RDA stand next door. While she was engaged there we were able to hand over a few mementoes, including the FPS Magazine,

to one of her ladies in waiting who slipped them into a Westmorland Show bag.

In 2011 they came across a photo of what they described as a 'cute little horse' on the internet; this turned out to be a Fell pony, a breed that they did not know existed. "In 2012, we found a farm in the Czech Republic, where we bought the first stallion and mare. After they came to us and settled in our stable, our love for this breed began. Every year our stud grew, we brought several ponies from England, the Czech Republic and Holland.

"In 2015 and 2019, we and our ponies received many titles at exhibitions and shows and were twice awarded the title of the Best Pony Breeding Farm in Russia. In 2020, the family decided to name our farm "Sitas FellHouse " and officially register the prefix "Sitas". Now all our ponies "wear" the family name of my daughter Liza, who is madly in love with these ponies, is engaged in training with them for riding and driving.... and already at the age of 16, she says that our farm is her life's work. I really hope that thanks to my daughter, our farm will have a great future.

"To date, we have ten mares and three stallions: Murthwaite Mo Farah (sire Wellbrow Rusty) brought from England, Goodshapes Corrado (s.

Lunesdale Mountain Mist) from the Czech Republic and Kai van de Wildhoeve (s. Wildhoeve Boy).

"Our plans do not stop there. We want Fell ponies in Russia to become popular and loved, today they already have fans, which we are very happy about. We also plan to develop equestrian sports, such as driving, as the basis of our farm."

Fantastic to hear that Fell ponies are indeed taking over the world! Good luck to Liza, family and Sitas Fellhouse!

New Fell Pony Society Branch in Sweden

Asa Pettersson reports that Swedish Fell Pony enthusiasts have exciting plans to increase awareness of the Fell pony in their home country. The Swedish Fell Pony Organisation started in 2015 and membership has increased every year. The group recently applied to become an overseas branch of the Fell Pony Society, and to join the Swedish Horse breeding organisation, which will provide access to larger events and shows. The group hopes to rectify the fact that there are currently no shows for Fell ponies in Sweden, and to educate Swedish judges on Fell pony attributes.

Prior to 2000 there were only a few imported Fell ponies in Sweden, but numbers have risen from 15 ponies in 2007 to around 85 today. Members cover a wide area, so have long distances between them, but there is great teamwork and they manage to meet at least annually, usually at a member's home where ponies can be viewed.

Two Fell ponies who have generated much of the interest in

the breed are Bluewater Simon and Greenholme Bracken. Bluewater Simon is a 9-year-old gelding competing in higher level driving with his 13-year-old driver, Mimmi Olskims (see next article). Driving is becoming very popular in Sweden, whether this be for competition or at home on the farm. The family also have Stommengardens Peggy Sue and Greenholme One and Only.

Greenholme Bracken and his owner Christian Johansson have competed successfully in

several different western classes. They have five SM medals and won the Roper of the Year trophy in 2016. For the last few years Christian's daughter, Mira, has competed Bracken in barrel racing and pole bending. Katherine Wilkinson saw Bracken in action during her visit and was extremely impressed, reporting that 'He knows his job to a T!'.

More and more people in Sweden are discovering that the Fell pony is a great all-round family pony, being steady and sure-footed, yet brave, and with extra energy and a turn of speed when needed. Many of those who have ponies use them for hacking in the countryside and driving; and most ponies live out all year with access to shelter during the winter. Some owners are small breeders, and there are currently seven licensed stallions in Sweden and five foals expected this Summer.

Asa felt that he needed a mare to run with, and now the number has increased to three, with Sleddale Heather Bell II, Bybeck Georgie Girl and Greenholme Fancy II all now residing at Asa's new Västanvinden stud, which hopes to welcome three foals this year.

European Junior Driving Championship

Mimmi Olskims & Bluewater Simon at FEI European Driving Championship for young drivers, juniors & children, at Seléstat France 24 August 2021 - 29 August 2021

The sun shines through the window on the plane where I sit and I feel expectant. The year is 2019 and I'm on my way from Sweden to Holland to check out a gray Fell pony that I had heard could work for my oldest daughter who was then 11 years old and had just started competing in sports driving. I had no experience of the breed but judging by the movies, which I got from the seller, I became curious enough to want to take a look and test drive him.

This trip was the prelude to an adventure that finally took Team Olskims to the FEI European Championship for young drivers, juniors & children at Seléstat, France, 24 August 2021 - 29 August 2021.

But back to my trip in Holland. Before I got to meet Simon, the Fell pony, I visited the Equestrian Center de Peelbergen in Kronenberg and was very impressed by the facility. I enjoyed watching the competitions in sports driving, cheered on the Swedish four-in-hand team and got to see my idol Boyd Exell. I cycled through the amazingly beautiful tulip plantations and my mind was filled with a light love for Holland. Surely it was this feeling I took with me because when I met Simon he was like a dream horse taken from a fairy tale with his long mane and lovely feather. Was he the perfect buy for a sports pony? No. But apart from good paces, charisma and a friendly mind, he had something extra that made me choose to buy him. He lives up to his nickname "grandpa", a stubborn but kind individual who does things in his own way. In the spring of 2019, Bluewater Simon came to Sweden. At the end of that summer, Mimmi competed for the first time with Simon and with me as a groom.

From the spring of 2019 to the summer of 2021, we've spent an incredible number of hours training and analyzing various problems that had arisen. As everyone in the team







agrees, I'm the team's nerd and can think for hours about small details that might be decisive in the long run regarding both pony, rider and equipment as well as the team's tasks. It is my winter pleasure to find the improvements that take us ato the next step in our development as a competition crew. Coaching and being a team for a children driver is also something completely different from training an adult where the cerebral cortex has finished growing. In many respects, it is easier as children by nature are curious and willing to try different things. To make an arrangement however where the child is able to concentrate as much as possible during training or competition and to combine this with the fact that it should be pleasurable for the learning to take place as painlessly as possible can sometimes make the most positive person gray-haired.

Of course, this also applies to the training of the pony, which should preferably be positive for its task for many years to come. Has everything gone smoothly for us? Absolutely not. Simon, like other Fell ponies, is both stubborn and smart. If he doesn't want to do something, it will not work. But as with most horses, there is always an explanation when something doesn't work or a way if you are creative enough and make a correct analysis. If you look at pictures of Simon when he came to us and today, our work and our process can be seen as his body in many ways looks like a completely different pony. Our journey has never been straightforward but we have done competitions where people applauded afterwards and newspapers wanted to interview Mimmi as a driver, and others where Simon stood still in water obstacles and cones courses like a stubborn donkey and the daughter had to be cheered up with chocolate, hugs and white lies afterwards. But we have never given up and all the corrections we have made have always been made based on horse welfare or that the driver, pony or others in the team should find more desire for what we do. Happy pony = happy driver and happy driver + happy pony = the competition results we want.

In 2020, despite poor conditions due to the pandemic and missed competitions, we still qualified for the Swedish Championships in sports driving. But it would take until the summer of 2021 before we could participate.

In May 2021, our new fine dressage carriage arrived. Mimmi and Simon immediately started driving with it. Shortly afterwards, we chose to register individually for the



Nordic Championships in sports driving. At the end of July, Mimmi, me and Simon went to Denmark to compete in the FEI Children class. After the vet check, we were selected to represent Sweden in teams. Something we hadn't counted on as we hadn't been selected for the national team for this year. At this competition Simon truly showed that we had trained right during the winter and the competition ended with fantastic dressage points, ok cones and an individual bronze

placement in the marathon and a gold medal for the Swedish team.

Two weeks later it was time for the Swedish Championship in sports driving where we took home silver in all disciplines. By this time we knew that we were selected to represent Sweden at the FEI European Driving Championship for young drivers, juniors & children at the end of August in France. To be selected for a European Championship and to represent your country is a huge dream come true. But to participate with a Fell pony is bigger!!

On August 22 we went to France. The trip involved a ferry, German highways and overnight stays as well as rest for 2- and 4-legged. Two days later we were on site at the







competition site in France. We had the only Fell pony out of all the competitors. An abundance of beautiful Welsh of various kinds as well as various other fine ponies and horses were in place.

I inspected the stable and to my delight found nothing Simon could scratch himself on or that could stain. Having a gray-white Fell pony that unfortunately also suffers from summer dermatitis/sweet itch is no fun if there are sharp edges or box walls that discolour. In my opinion, there is really nothing more beautiful than a white pony in the dressage arena, but there are many swear words behind a beautiful white horse. The vet check is always a little nervewracking too, because it would be terrible not to pass when you have gone so far. But Simon and Mimmi passed the vet check with bravura and Simon was his usual calm self.

became a memory for life.



On August 26, it was time for dressage. I usually sew Simon's braids and spend hours getting him looking nice but at this championship I had our Chef d'Equipe who with quick accustomed fingers fixed and helped me get our white pony braided and neat & tidy. In Competition A, Mimmi drove one of her best dressages so far and Simon did fantastically well. We ended up in ninth place out of 31 competitors with 58.48 penalty points. The work we had put into obedience, form and bearing gave exactly the result we wanted. In the evening it was nations evening and we fully enjoyed all the fantastic dining tables that different countries set up. My taste buds stuck mainly to the Spanish tapas and the French goat cheese as well as the Danes' herring sandwich. The youngsters had an evening that

The next day we walked marathon obstacles over and over again. My pedometer stood at 35,000 steps and the bike rides were not included. I noticed that the majority of the competitors had electric bikes. I'm starting to hate my old lady's bike...On Saturday the 28th, the loud French roosters woke us up at five in the morning and it was marathon day. Simon had good energy and exploded in a good mood towards the obstacles. The driver struggled a bit in the heat and I didn't set the turntable brake quite correctly so a few small mistakes in the obstacles made us end up in 14th place out of 31 drivers. In retrospect, we can see that Simon's joy and speed, that we have trained for a year has given a fantastic result, but the driver needs to practice more on her steering and on helping Simon better in the fast tight turns. In the evening after the marathon, Mimmi walked the cones course and I stood by the side and checked out what the route looked like. The cones were quite tricky with some rather tight turns. We did not get the sketch map for the course until the next morning, which felt a little bit late to be honest. Mimmi was bent on revenge after the marathon and Simon likes the cones so he didn't hang about. A perfectly OK time without penalty in the Children's class but unfortunately three balls down so we placed in the total in a 17th place out of 31 crews.

All in all, team Olskims with Bluewater Simon contributed to Sweden coming in an honorable fifth place at the European Championships.

Now we have rested for a few weeks and it is time to watch the films from the European Championships and analyze what we see and set new training goals for 2022. Mimmi will be a Junior next year and then even more team support is required. We have no idea how far we can go with the Fell pony as a sport driving pony, but the hope is to participate in more international championships and place ourselves in the junior class as well. But the most important thing is and remains that we have fun as a team together with our fantastic Fell pony Simon.







By the way, there are now two more Fell ponies at home in the stable since about a year ago! A black mare named Stommengardens Peggy Sue, three years old, whose training has just started, and a two-year-old, Greenholme One and Only, a mare who will turn gray-white just like Simon!

My dream is to one day be able to run these mares together in pairs.

Three years ago, I asked a course designer how I and my girls could get started with sports driving. He told us which club we could apply to and how we could get started. However, he concluded by pointing out that it would take many years before my girls could count on participating in larger contexts.

It took three years from the time they started driving their Shetland ponies until this summer. With that, I want to end with the quote:
