



FPS Breeders Award

I was interested to see in the report of the 2015 Drybarrows Breeders Award that 59 different studs took part, which is great. A Breeders trophy is a fantastic idea, but my concern is that the present points structure actually restricts the realistic chance of winning to a mere handful of studs, as it rewards quantity not quality. The studs that are regularly producing the most foals every year are always going to win, irrespective of the quality of these ponies. Is that right? We should reflect on the fact that this trophy was presented in memory of Chris Thompson, with a lifetime's interest in the breed as a breeder, whose primary focus was to breed quality ponies, many of which have had a lasting influence in the Fell breed. It should be a very prestigious award to compete for.

I would suggest that only in-hand classes for mares, stallions and young stock up to three years old be eligible, and that the FPS Youngstock show held every autumn should be included as a qualifying show for this award. The allocation of the points should reflect quality and be in the region of:

Supreme Champion, 25pts; Reserve Champion, 15pts; Best of, 10pts; Class winner, 8pts; 2nd, 6pts; 3rd, 4pts.

The Breeders Award would then reward the breeding of quality ponies rather than quantity and reflect far better Chris Thomson's ideas on breeding Fell ponies.

Chairman's Report—September 2016

The Fell Pony Society has had a very busy and successful year following on from the great results at Olympia at the end of 2015. Our ponies have excelled in many equine disciplines and have had splendid coverage in the equine magazines. Also, our happy hackers had the chance to get into the limelight in an experience of a lifetime at the 90th Birthday Guard of Honour Ride at Windsor Castle in July. I believe it has been a truly memorable 2016.

Sadly we have lost several valued members and Fell pony supporters since I wrote my last report. Anne Carslaw, Carol Anne King and Mr Jewitt were all valued members and will be sadly missed; Mr William (Bill) Steadman from Brough, who had reached his 100th birthday shortly before his death, bred ponies under the Low Green and Bullistone prefixes; also Barbara Muller from Germany. We send our deepest sympathy to their families and friends.

A great deal of my summer was spent helping our President, Mary Longsdon MBE, arrange the 'Guard of Honour' ride. It all began in March with thoughts of choosing a suitable birthday card for H M The Queen. A North East artist, Shelly Gilson, came to my aid and designed and produced the perfect card which was posted to Buckingham Palace before 21st April. I then deliberated on the type of shirt everyone should wear for the Windsor Castle event and the logo to go on it. GG Gear at Darlington kindly gave me samples of their rugby shirts and Mary and I agreed on a red, white and blue theme. On the 4th attempt the logo was agreed and an order for 273 shirts was placed. Mary took on the responsibility of sourcing and ordering the stables and toilets but both of these had to be increased when Her Majesty gave permission for us to have more than 90 ponies. A generator, for the running of the toilets, was kindly donated by A Plant, Cumbria, and transported to Windsor by the Mallinson family. We were extremely grateful to have the bedding donated by BEDMAX shavings, especially as most people did not have any space to carry anything else in their horseboxes that weekend. Katherine and Carol in the office were very obliging and put all of the rider and guest information onto a spreadsheet for me so that I could select and use the information. The saying 'it'll be all right on the night' kept coming to mind when we suddenly realised the large number of people involved. Mary reminded everyone at the briefing on the morning of 17th July that we could not have a rehearsal so it had to be right first time, and it was. Those of you who attended will never forget the sea of red shirts as we rode up to Windsor Castle and our guests, wearing blue shirts, standing around the paddock when H M The Queen came to meet the ponies. I hope that you have all bought a copy of the DVD covering this event and had the opportunity to read the list of ponies who took part. Seventy-two different prefixes took part which is a valuable record for the future.

The Society shows have all been well attended by exhibitors and spectators. Katie Raine was delighted to win the Stallion Show championship in May with her

stallion Lunesdale Black Ice II. The South Cumbria Show Supreme Champion was Banksgate Elidor owned by Francesca Hoggarth. Margaret Wilson had several ponies in the ribbons at the Breed Show in August but it was Townend Fantasy who was awarded Supreme Champion. The Southern Show in September gave the Supreme Championship to Deborah Vychinski's stallion Boutime Wooster. Well done to everyone involved in running these shows and to all exhibitors for making the effort to take part.

I attended a Rare Breeds meeting at Stoneleigh during July where it was decided to establish a Equine Rare Breeds GB group to form a strong, knowledgeable, single voice to advise Defra on matters regarding the Single Equine Database.

During 2016 the Society introduced a Stallion Grading scheme. In this first year 2yr & 3yr old colts and stallions were eligible to come forward to be graded. In 2017 this scheme will be offered to all colts and stallions 2yrs and above. Full details of dates and venues will be published on our website early next year.

As the nights begin to close in and the annual agricultural shows are over my thoughts turn to weaning foals and our autumn sale at North West Auctions near Kendal on 29th October. I hope prices continue to be buoyant and all breeders are rewarded for their efforts. If you are considering owning another Fell pony then please come along and support our breeders. If you are unsure of how to buy at an auction, then contact North West Auctions before the sale and find out or ask any Council member.

I would like to thank Eileen Walker and Council for their continued support, and also Carol and Elizabeth who make up our efficient office team.



From The Office

- Council have agreed that visitors to the office can only be admitted by appointment. Alternatively any Society business can be carried out by phone, email, or post, or message through the letter box at Bank House. Please do not make a special trip to Appleby without making an appointment first.
- With regard to the EU referendum, DEFRA have reminded Passport Issuing Organisations that the UK is still part of the EU and the laws relating to Horse Passports still apply until the UK actually leaves the EU. Owners must still identify their horses and abide by the medication arrangements. The following rules continue to apply:
 - i) a change of ownership should be notified to the Society within 30 days of the change.
 - ii) applications for passports should be received in the office by 31 December in the year of birth.
 - iii) the passport should be returned to the Society when a pony dies. It can of course be returned to you, if requested, after cancellation.
 - iv) Please remember to check your passports, particularly those issued prior to 10 June 2004, as they may not have been updated with a 'Section IX' page (usually the back page). Without this page, the passport is no longer valid and it is illegal to transport or sell a pony without it.
- Service Books / online notifications of coverings must be notified to the Society by 31 December—ie, in the year of covering. If not, then any resulting foal will have to be DNA typed to confirm the sire prior to registration.
- Just a reminder that new registration forms have been printed for 2016, so please do not use the old ones as they cannot be accepted.

The range of overseas membership types has been extended to mirror the UK types, with an additional charge to cover the cost of overseas postage.

An Associate member is unlikely to own a pony and therefore will not wish to take advantage of the pony related privileges of membership.


Family membership may be applied for by married or co-habiting couples and their children under the age of 18 years, all residing at the same address. The two adult members enjoy the rights and privileges of full membership, and the children the rights and privileges of junior membership. Full details are in Section 2 of the Articles of Association.

Membership Renewal

Society memberships fall due on 1 January annually.

No member is entitled to vote for the election of Council if his/her subscription to the Society has not been paid on or before 15 February or to vote at an EGM/AGM if his/her subscription has not been paid by the date of the meeting (1 April 2017).

If subscriptions have not been received by the time we send out the Spring Magazine, a reminder slip is enclosed. Alternatively, members can arrange to pay their subscription by standing order on 1 January each year.





Minutes of the Annual General Meeting of the FPS, 2016

Held at Orton Market Hall on Saturday 2 April 2016

Mrs Walker opened the meeting and welcomed everyone and told members of the friends that the Society had lost over the last twelve months: Mr H Tunstall, Ravenstonedale, Member & Breeder of the Foggy Gill ponies; Mr T B Capstick, Ravenstonedale, Breeder of the Murthwaite ponies; and Mr E Blockley, Yorkshire, FPS judge. She asked members to show respect to them and their families by observing a one minute's silence.

1 Apologies for absence

2 Approval and adoption of EGM & Annual General Meeting Minutes of 28 March 2015

Mrs Morland asked that the minutes be corrected where they stated that Mr Howe was applauded by members to say "by some members" and "certainly not all", and also in the following paragraph Mrs Morland asked that the minutes be changed where stated that Miss Charlton was applauded by members to add "by some members not all".

Mrs Walker agreed that the minutes would be corrected and asked if the remainder of the minutes could now be approved. Mrs Ashcroft asked if she could make a point: that Mrs Walker had agreed that the minutes would be corrected but as they have already been published, she suggested that Council should consider that the minutes of the AGM should be circulated to those present so that issues like those raised can be ironed out before they are published. Mrs Walker responded by saying that it could be considered by Council at the May meeting but it hadn't been done in the past. Mrs Ashcroft said that part of the issue was the length of time between the minutes going out to members and the AGM, so she suggested the minutes be circulated shortly after the meeting while matters were fresh in people's minds and issues could be reported back prior to them being published.

Mrs Walker asked for a proposer and seconder for approval of the minutes apart from the issues raised, which would be recorded in the Autumn magazine. Acceptance of the minutes was proposed by Miss Simpson and seconded by Miss Parker.

Mrs Walker asked for a proposer and seconder for the minutes of the EGM. Acceptance of the minutes was proposed by Miss Simpson and seconded by Mrs Millard and agreed by members.

3 Matters arising from the minutes of the EGM and the Annual General Meeting held on 28 March 2015

Mrs Morland asked if the matter relating to the publishing of the Council meeting minutes had been discussed as she had not received any feedback on the matter, and if legal advice had been taken. Mrs Walker confirmed the matter had been discussed at Council and that legal advice had been taken advising not to publish the minutes from the Council meetings. Mrs Walker reported that certain points that members need to know about would be displayed on the FPS website, and Mrs Millard confirmed that this is already being done. Mrs Ashcroft asked if she could have a copy of that legal advice.

Mrs Plank asked if the meeting could move on from this matter. She said that the AGM minutes have to be circulated to members prior to approval at the AGM, and it doesn't matter whether it's in the earlier magazine or in the magazine issued immediately before the AGM. The minutes are not approved until the AGM, so are not 'published'. She also said that many people would not understand legal documents and they could be mis-understood. She saw no reason at all why the average member should be entitled to see privileged documents.

Mr Quick said that it was his right to receive answers and that legal documents should be accessible to members if requested. Mrs Walker responded by saying that Council should have access to legal documents but not members. Mrs Walker asked Mr Quick to put his request in writing and it would be dealt with by Council. Mrs Ashcroft said that if a member requested to see the legal document referred to earlier, then unless there was an extremely good reason she could not see why Council could justify withholding it.

Chairman's Report

Mrs Walker began by saying that in her report last year she had talked about all the challenges that she as Chairman, and the Society, had faced during the previous 24 months. Many of those things were out of her control and just had to be dealt with. This year she wanted to be more positive and explain some of the things that she is actively involved with.

When Betty Walker retired, Mrs Walker volunteered to look after the stallion service books and keep records on each licensed stallion in the UK and overseas. She offered to do this important role because of her interest in Fell pony breeding. During December and January each year she updates the database with the service records from that season. Members may be interested to know that at the end of January 2016 there were 432 licensed stallions on Society's records. A total of 456 coverings were recorded for 2015 resulting in 104 of those stallions being used (approx. 1/4). This supports the current popularity of showing stallions and proving that many stallions are kept for showing and riding / driving purposes and not for breeding. Mrs Walker hoped that members had all read in their magazine that the Stallion Grading Scheme discussed during 2015 came into practice in January 2016 and is available for all 2vr & 3vr old colts this year. The full details of this scheme and the application form are available on the FPS website under 'Stallion Listings'. She hoped that many members will participate in this scheme. It will be available to all colts and licensed stallions from the beginning of 2017.

During February Mrs Walker was involved in setting up a pension scheme so that the Fell Pony Society could offer its employees the opportunity to invest in a pension. It is now law that everyone in employment earning 10k or more must be enrolled into a work based pension. She discussed this with the Society accountant and researched several providers on-line before making the decision to enrol with NEST (National Employment Savings Trust). Not quite as enjoyable as the breeding records previously mentioned, but nevertheless, something that had to be done to keep the Fell Pony Society within the law.

Mrs Walker said she was sure that everyone was aware that the Society's Patron, H M The Queen, celebrates her 90th birthday later this month. It was the perfect opportunity to organise something special and as she was not coming up to Cumbria, Mary Longsdon thought it might be a good idea that we should go to her. Mary made a few preliminary enquiries and was given the date of 17th July as a date when H M The Queen would be in residence at Windsor Castle and would be delighted to see a few Fell ponies. So early in March, Mary and Mrs Walker travelled down to Windsor Castle to meet with Terry Pendry, the Head Stud Groom, and discuss the plan. It has developed into providing a 'Guard of Honour' for H M The Queen and Prince Philip as they drive down from Windsor Castle to attend a staff cricket match and BBQ on a Sunday afternoon.

This is a very, very special event and will be run with an extremely high level of security so if you've got a criminal record, do not apply! The Society will be the Queen's guests staying in her private grounds at Windsor Castle. This event will not be available to members of the public and press but we have been given special permission to film and produce a DVD and of course we expect you all to buy a copy before Christmas 2016. Mrs Walker has been told that The Queen is as excited about this event as we are.

The application form is almost complete and will be issued to those who have expressed an interest and sent in a SAE during the coming week. We have set a closing date of 30 April because there is so much red tape and security to get through before 17th July.

Finally, Mrs Walker thanked all members of Council for their continued support and particularly Katherine, Carol and Elizabeth who make up the office team. Team work is what it is all about and members are part of that team, helping out at many events throughout the year and sharing your love and commitment to our beloved Fell ponies.

5 Secretary/Treasurer's Report

With the 2015 registrations completed we have been able to get the stud book edited and printed and it's available for sale today, along with the 2016 calendar. Registrations have increased slightly, and we are still seeing a similar number of transfers of ownership. Over 1000 passports were despatched from the office for various reasons, during 2015. The number of Society members remains static at a little over 970 for 2016 to date and over 50 new members have joined the Society so far in 2016.

Schedules and entry forms for the Stallion Show and Breed Show can be downloaded from our website. Paper copies are also available today.

New EU Regulations relating to the identification of Equines and Minimum Operating standards for PIOs came into effect from 1 January 2016.

The main changes are:

- New passport layout and security standards, which apply to all new passports issued from 2016 and mean that the Society has had to purchase a riveting machine to meet these standards.
- The requirement to issue a duplicate passport for pre 2004 passports which have no section IX.

The regulations very much emphasise that the obligation as regards passports is with the keeper who must ensure that the passport is at all times up to date and correct, including ownership and food chain status and notification of death.

With regard to the forthcoming EU referendum members may wish to take into consideration that EU legislation states that the mother stud book should be based in the EU.

The accusations made against Council and the office relating to passport legislation at last year's AGM were totally unfounded. The information provided to members is to help comply with the law, and the Society wouldn't have given it if it was incorrect. Mrs Wilkinson reported that she was pleased to see that the NPS is advising owners and breeders, in their recently issued year book, the same information - and in addition that the maximum penalty for each offence is £5000.

The Horserace Betting Levy Board has issued the 2016 grant. We are very grateful for this and in 2016 to receive an additional £1250. This increase is due to the CEM testing voucher scheme ceasing as of 31 Dec 2015; the sum allocated to the scheme has been distributed to the five societies receiving the lowest grant. Council will discuss how this will be used in accordance with the HBLB Standard Policies and Conditions later in the year.

The Society has recently received information from the HBLB of the government's announcement that their aim is to introduce new funding arrangements for British racing by April 2017. This could affect how and if the grant will be paid in the future. We may know more when Mrs Wilkinson attends a meeting held by the HBLB in July.

The Society has received confirmation from the RBST that The Fell Pony has moved to Vulnerable (Cat 3) for 2016. (from At Risk, Cat 4). They also stated that currently data from 2 years prior to the Watchlist publication year is used, so 2016's list uses 2014's number of filly foal registrations. Ideally, they would like to use the previous year's data, so this may result in a slightly later publication date for the Watchlist in 2017, but they hope this will more accurately reflect the status of the breed.

The Society had made a profit in 2014/15 of £6,482.

It was good to see Subscriptions have remained steady. Over £1400 was raised from sponsorship, thanks to members' generosity. A reduction of £1000 in expenditure was due to a Government subsidy of Employer's NI for small businesses, introduced in April 2014, which has continued for the 2015/16 tax year.

Many of you will be aware of the Fell Pony Breyer model, named for Her Majesty the Queen's Carltonlima Emma. Breyer have very kindly agreed to donate a portion of the proceeds from the sales of the model, the first payment has already been received (almost £800).

Finally, thank you to Carol and Elizabeth who complete the office team, to Eileen who has been a great support and assistance, and to Council for their continued support.

6 Election of Council

Mrs Walker opened the envelope and read out the report provided by scrutineer, Mr Mandelson.

As of midnight on the closing date, 22 March, for receipt of ballot papers, 649 members were eligible to vote, 167 eligible ballot papers had been received, 25.7% of eligible members had voted, and 786 votes had been cast.

Four places for 5 year term on Council went to Mrs CH Robinson, Mr A Thorpe, Mrs E A Walker and Mrs S Millard. A 2 year term to Mr J Potter and the 6th place of 1 year to Miss Rachael Brunskill. Mrs Walker welcomed the 2 new members to Council and thanked the 3 unsuccessful candidates for standing. It had been some time since there had been 9 candidates. Mrs Walker confirmed the next Council meeting as 17 May.

Mrs Ashcroft asked when members would be advised of the numbers of votes each candidate received. Mrs Walker responded by saying that that information is not normally announced but as Mrs Ashcroft was a candidate then she could have that information at the end of the meeting if she wished. Mrs Ashcroft then asked if she could have a copy of Mr Mandelson's report; as she had stood as a candidate she was interested in having a copy. Mrs Walker then reported that Mrs Ashcroft had telephoned the scrutineer at 9.30pm the previous evening. Mrs Walker confirmed that she was willing to give Mrs Ashcroft the number of votes she had received, at the end of the meeting. Mrs Ashcroft responded by saying that she had been obliged to contact Mr Mandelson because of the lack of communication from Council: she had expected some explanation as to how the election would be run, but had received nothing. Mrs Walker responded by saying that if Mrs Ashcroft had attended meetings regularly she would be aware that the election results are always announced at the AGM. Mrs Ashcroft said that she knew that but the thing with the Society is that the absolute minimum information is provided.

Mr Thorpe said Mrs Ashcroft had no right to contact the scrutineer. Mrs Hodgson said that she had stood for Council in the past and would never have considered contacting the scrutineer. She questioned why Mrs Ashcroft could not have waited until the announcement at the meeting. Mrs Robinson, Miss Longsdon and Mrs Brunskill reminded members that a decision was made some time ago that the number of votes for each candidate was a private matter and that it should remain so. Mrs Thorpe said that any queries regarding the Council election should have been submitted to Council and not the scrutineer. After some discussion it was agreed that as in the past the number of votes per candidate would not be disclosed.

7 Adoption of Accounts for year ended 31 October 2015

There had been no questions received prior to the meeting from members. Adoption of the accounts was proposed by Mrs Brunskill, seconded by Mrs Cockbain and agreed by members.

8 Resolution to appoint Brosnans Chartered Accountants as Accountants to the Society

The resolution was proposed by Mrs Hill, seconded by Miss Chadwick and agreed by the members.

9 Reports from Sub-Committees

Mrs Robinson, Conservation Sub-Committee, reported that a meeting had been held that morning and that reports had been published in the latest magazines. This will be followed up with articles in wildlife and farming press. There are some conservation grazing opportunities out there, often for short periods and the ponies are usually required to be well handled. Anyone interested needs to be pro-active; these opportunities are often only found by word of mouth and are not necessarily advertised.

Miss Brunskill, Show Sub-Committee, told members that preparations for the Stallion and Breed show were going well but as always anyone willing to help as stewards or helper would be most welcome.

Mrs Millard, Overseas Sub-Committee, reported that she had received feedback in reports from branches in Denmark, FPSNA and Conservancy in the US. Anne Fishburn, from Germany, had written to Mrs Millard thanking her and the Committee for their support. She reported that Fell owners and breeders are still active in Germany, she is still being contacted via the FPS website when someone needs assistance with FPS procedures, and she thanked Mrs Wilkinson for her advice when needed. She also wished the Society a successful AGM.

Libby Robinson from France reported that there was a lot of interest in the Fell Pony but it was still not recognised as a breed; however, the Fell pony was well represented and therefore recognised through events, particularly driving. A small number of people are interested in breeding Fell ponies.

Judges Committee - Mrs Armstrong-Foxton reported that there is a healthy waiting list of those interested in joining the trainee judges scheme. There are 3 new candidates for assessment in October and 2 already on the scheme This year's assessment will take place on 15 October at Newton Rigg, when as always volunteers willing to bring ponies along will be much appreciated.

Scotland SG - Mrs Cheetham reported that members had taken part in a visit to the RBST and to World Horse Welfare Centre. The new Highland, Fell & Dales Scotland Show to be held on 15th May has affiliated to the Society. Planned events for 2016 include a Dales Pony Stud visit, and Working Pony Day. The presentation of the SEBA Horse/Pony of the Year 2015 awards will take place at the SEBA AGM on 13th April.

NWSG - Mrs Plank reported that events run by the group were well supported. A lunch and talk by Vyv Wood-Gee and lessons by Julie Robinson had already taken place in 2016. Thanks to Cath Wrigley, a camp has been arranged to be held in July at Newton Rigg, and a Beach ride in September. She reminded members about representatives for the Bewcastle Boy Blue Trophy, the final to be held at the Southern Show, so anyone interested in representing the NW please say.

MWSG - Miss Longsdon reported that the Derbyshire Fell, Dales and Highland Show had changed date to 19 June and to a new venue. The judge would be Mrs Ruth Eastwood.

NESG - Miss Parker reported that the group had held a Sunday lunch with speaker and a Beach ride followed by Fish & Chips, and some members had joined in on foot. The camp to be held at the Linnels was oversubscribed. The Native Pony Festival will be held in July and the group is planning a Le Trec event. The Performance Trials at the Linnels is planned for September.

MESG - Mrs Wilkinson read out a report from the group. 2015 finished with a Christmas show at Runington. 2016 began with the points awards dinner on 12 March at Lutterworth. Rosettes were presented and a new trophy, donated by Audrey Spencer in memory of her pony Sleddale Ruth III, was won by Ryden Barratt. The Eileen Davis trophy was this year awarded to Jean Bateson for her hard work running the Sandringham Show. Three Fell & Friends shows will be held at Gotham, the first qualifier for the Boy Blue Championship to be held on 12 June. Other dates - 1 May, Gotham Show; 7 May, Sandringham Show with the 2nd Boy Blue qualifier; 26 June, Blaston Show; 11 September, Southern Show. Further details on the FPS-MESG website or ME facebook page.

SWSG - Mr Goddard reported that Leanne Russell has taken over the running of the SW group; he had run the group for the previous 15 years. The Dorset Show will be held 1 May. Cornwall Show this year to be held on 26 June.

YPG - Mrs Bell reported on behalf of the Secretary. A meeting had been held earlier. In 2015 the group had held a successful Southern Convention, and Greenholme Stud and Ryehouse Stud visits. This year's plans include a Southern Fell pony weekend on 2/3 July and on 21 August, a Lownthwaite Stud visit. She thanked the committee and everyone who has supported the YPG. The group would welcome new members.

Promotions Team - Mrs Brunskill reported that the team would be putting on displays at Country Fest in June, Lowther in August and Black Combe Country Fair August Bank Holiday Monday. A new tent had been purchased for the merchandise and display boards, and its first outing would be at the Stallion Show. £500 had been raised from 'Just Giving' via Facebook enabling the team to purchase polo shirts and hoodies.

10 Approval of Honorary Member

Council proposed Mrs Margaret Murray to become an Honorary member. Mrs Murray has worked hard for the Society endlessly, running shows and organising events, everything possible to help the Society and promote the Fell pony. Members approved this with a show of hands, with effect from 2017.

11 Any Other Business

Miss Longsdon reminded members that a Promise Auction and supper is to be held at Stoneybeck on Saturday 15th October. Promises are welcome and tickets will be available, hopefully by the Breed show.

Miss Hallam advised members that this year celebrates the 150th Anniversary of Beatrix Potter and asked if the Society could be part of these celebrations. She agreed to pass on contact details to the promotions team.

Mrs D Slack reminded those present that she had raffle tickets for sale.

Miss Longsdon thanked Mrs Walker for her hard work as Chairman, and Mrs Walker thanked Miss Longsdon for being a good listener.

Mr David Murray gave a short presentation about his work to protect the 10 Native pony Breeds in the UK. In the last year he has been working on the issue of climate change. Mr Murray reported that climate change has an effect on the breeds. He has been invited to put on a more detailed presentation to the FPBA in the Autumn. He raised concerns that the National Trust advertise the Konik Polish ponies for conservation grazing. Research suggests that there are 1400 ponies being used in conservation grazing schemes across the UK. His research has concluded that the Fell Pony has by far the best genetic diversity and that this must be protected and the suitability for conservation grazing to be promoted.

12 Presentation of Awards

Mrs Robinson apologised for some mistakes in the points results: the 4th placed yearling was in fact a 2-year-old; the Champion Stallion award had been won outright by Heltondale Mountain Mist II; and the Champion Mare award had been

won outright by Wellbrow Carmen and not as reported in the magazine. Mrs Robinson and Miss Brunskill presented the awards and rosettes for the Points Awards.

Mrs Walker presented The Queen's Trophy to The Charlton Family - Sarah, Bob and Jenny were present to receive the trophy.

The Lownthwaite Rob Trophy was to be awarded to Carltonlima Emma, owned by HM The Queen and to be presented at the Windsor event in July.

The Edinburgh Prize was presented to Mrs Libby Robinson, in France, for her pair of ponies, Murthwaite Tonka Toy and Towford Harmarnie.

The Fell Pony Society Breeders Award in memory of Chris Thompson was awarded to the Wellbrow stud, with rosettes to:

2nd Lunesdale:

3rd Greenholme;

4th Bracklinn;

5th Severnvale:

6th Banksgate.

Mrs Walker announced the raffle numbers before closing the meeting and inviting members to have tea.

Parts of the AGM minutes have been withheld because of an ongoing legal dispute.

Obituary: Barbara Müller

The Fell Pony lost a good friend on 12 June when Barbara Müller passed away. In 1991, Barbara and her daughter Sarah founded the Narnia Fell Pony stud in Germany. Many of us know her best, however, for her online presence. First on the Yahoo group and more recently on Facebook, Barbara shared generously from her experience with the breed through pictures, stories, and commentary.

A friend and I got to know Barbara in 2000 after we purchased a son and grandson of her stallion Heltondale Black Prince III.

Prince was of course four times the Stallion & Colt Show Supreme Champion in the ownership of Bill Potter and Thomas Capstick (*above*). In 1992, Barbara went looking for a stallion that looked like a lion but behaved like a lamb. "Bip" was recommended to her, and after spending two years learning more about him, she purchased him. "The decision to buy Prince would turn out to be one of the best decisions we ever made." She kindly shared pictures of him, as well as stories of his time with her.

More importantly, though, Barbara instilled in me a curiosity about the Fell Pony breed, beyond the ponies on which I placed my hands each day. Her sharing of what she had learned and observed, both about the ponies and about the organizations working on their behalf, contributed immeasurably to my understanding of the context in which the breed exists.

I'm sure I'm not alone in my appreciation for Barbara's generosity.

We each work on behalf of the Fell Pony in a way that is uniquely our own. Barbara had her critics, but then who doesn't? I am grateful for the work that she did on behalf of our breed.



They drew visitors away from buying in the sales tent, but it was great for publicity - and as we were very close to the stables of the Devil's Horsemen, of course someone had to sweet-talk the stunt team into riding our Fells for a photo shoot. The Battle of the Bending Poles between Jack Halbert and Georgia Ellis has become more fiercely contested with each performance and has expanded from





Fell Pony Society 'Guard of Honour' at Windsor Castle

Under the 'Any Other Business' slot at a Fell Pony Society Council meeting, FPS President Mary Longsdon MBE announced, 'I thought we might take 90 ponies to Windsor to celebrate Her Majesty The Queen's 90th birthday.'

A few eyebrows went up! But the astonishment turned to smiles as everyone realised what a spectacular sight it would be. The suggestion was quickly agreed and Mary began to outline the planning that would be necessary.



The 'Guard of Honour' lined the route from Windsor Castle to the sports ground as Her Majesty drove past.

The procession was led by Carltonlima Emma. The carriage was pulled by four Fell ponies, Balmoral Nevis, Balmoral Test, Notlaw Storm and Heltondale Magic XI.

The Fell ponies owned by the Royal family and stabled at Windsor were ridden immediately behind. They were Balmoral Lewis, Balmoral Phantom, Murthwaite Taylor Maid, Murthwaite Dawn Chorus and Murthwaite Sarah.

The rest of the ponies fell in behind in ranks of 4 as the carriage and procession went by. Riders wore red shirts, and helpers wore blue. The list of those who attended is shown in full on pages 54 and 55.

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HM The Queen is presented with the Lownthwaite Rob Trophy by FPS Chairman Eileen Walker, for her Fell mare Carltonlima Emma.

A date was agreed with Windsor Castle: Sunday 17th July. Fell Pony Society members were then invited to apply for places in a 'Guard of Honour' to pay tribute to Her Majesty as our Patron. Although the original plan had been to take 90 ponies to Windsor, many more owners applied to attend. When HM The Queen was given this information and asked how many could be accommodated, she replied that she wanted to see ALL of the ponies who wanted to come—much to the delight of the Society. Everyone was bursting to publicise the event, but it had to remain private, and security was tight: background checks had to be completed before the list of those attending was finalised.

The FPS members and ponies would be allowed to enter the private grounds at Windsor Castle and camp in the beautiful parkland under the Castle. Temporary stabling would be erected for the ponies and the human guests could stay overnight in their horseboxes, trailers and tents. A generator, for the running of the toilets, was kindly donated by A Plant, Cumbria, and transported to Windsor by the Mallinson family. BEDMAX bedding was kindly provided for all the ponies to make their stay more comfortable.

Members travelled from far and wide within the UK, and many from Cumbria, but the people who travelled the furthest were Fiona Kramer who came from Germany with Wildhoeve Napoleon and the Cheetham family who

came from Aberdeenshire with their two ponies Greenholme Kirstie and Boyndlie Black Rose.

The event itself took place on Sunday 17th July, when Eileen Walker, the Fell Pony Society Chairman, led 125 Fell ponies to form the Guard of Honour lining the route from Windsor Castle to the cricket ground. It had been decided that riders would wear red rugby shirts, with a specially designed logo incorporating Windsor Castle and 'The Fell Pony Society Guard of Honour'; guests would wear blue rugby shirts. Combined with the impressive number of ponies, all of similar stamp, the result was a unique and fabulous display described by the Queen's Stud Groom, Terry Pendry, as 'making history'.

Her Majesty drove along the avenue in a carriage pulled by four Fell ponies, preceded by her mare Carltonlima Emma and followed by the Fell ponies owned by the Royal family and stabled at Windsor. As Her Majesty and her escort passed by, the members and their Fell ponies joined the procession in ranks of four.

At the paddock H M The Queen was delighted to inspect the large number of ponies and learn where they had all travelled from. She commented that she thought Fell ponies were a rare breed, so seeing so many together was a wonderful sight and one of her best birthday presents. Terry Pendry introduced FPS President, Mary Longsdon and FPS Chairman, Eileen Walker to Her Majesty, who asked Eileen about her own pony which was a homebred 4 year old gelding called Rackwood Hugo. Shelly Gilson, riding Rackwood Bonnie, was next in line. Shelly had made a special birthday card for Her Majesty on behalf of the FPS.

Eileen escorted Her Majesty around the paddock to look at the other Fell ponies assembled. Her Majesty spoke to Heather Mawrey about her bay pony, Wansfell Tobias, and said that she used to have a bay. She commented on the large moustache on Stennerskeugh Smoke and then asked Victoria Parker about the age of her grey pony, Thornbeck Andrew.

Eileen Walker presented Her Majesty with the Lownthwaite Rob Trophy, for Carltonlima Emma's achievement in raising awareness of the Fell breed during the last twelve months. Terry Pendry then escorted Her Majesty to look at the Fell stallions which were assembled outside of the paddock.

Everyone enjoyed the marvellous surroundings and appreciated how special this event was to all who attended in honour of HM The Queen. It was a once in a lifetime experience.

The sun shone and Judge Barry Mallinson thoroughly enjoyed placing the quality ponies, but was disappointed that so few were shown in the traditional stallion harness which seems to be a rare sight these days.

The overall supreme champion stallion and winner of the class for ridden stallions was the eight year old Lunesdale Black Ice bred by Bert and Carole Morland and now owned by Katie Raine. Katie's uncle, John Brougham, bought Black Ice when he was a yearling and Katie helped to care for him and handled him on a regular basis before breaking him to ride and drive. Katie's parents then bought Black Ice as a present for Katie's 18th birthday in 2015. Barry Mallinson explained that he had been following the pony's progress over the years and he felt that he had matured into a very good type and was outstanding on the day. He was also impressed by his good manners and how well he behaved for his young owner. The ridden class was particularly strong, with some exceptional ponies, and several experienced combinations producing polished performances, so all the more impressive that young Katie and her lovely pony headed the class.

Glenis Cockbain won the two year old class, the youngstock championship and reserve supreme with her homebred Carrock Stride The Nite shown by John Cockbain (*over page*). This super colt does indeed stride out very well and was tipped by the judge as 'one for the future'.

Hannah Lancaster won the class for three and four year old stallions with the four year old Murthwaite Mo Farah. 'Mo-Jo' was bought as a yearling from Tommy Capstick as a 21st birthday present for Hannah and Mum Donna says that he is a very special pony to the family. (Birthday presents have obviously improved since my 18th and 21st!) Mo-Jo has been lightly backed and Hannah hopes to bring him out under saddle next year when she has completed her studies.

Juliet Huddleston won the class for geldings four years and over and went on to win the championship for geldings in hand with Rosefell T Reg. Paul Metcalfe's Greenholme Dec was second and took the reserve championship; Dec then went onto win the class for ridden geldings with Bethan Lewis in the saddle.

Another young jockey in the ridden gelding class was ten year old Scarlett Marshall who did a superb job of showing Wellbrow Victor, both in hand and ridden; so much so that she was awarded a round of applause when the pair completed their individual ridden show. I think we will be seeing a lot more of this talented youngster in the future.

There were three grey ponies entered in the driving class, but unfortunately only two forward due to the fact that Greenholme Dec's traces had been accidentally left at home. Gilly Chippendale's very smart country turnout with Skennerskeugh Smoke took the class from Courtney Savage in second place with Murthwaite Icicle.

Kate Watson took the reserve championship with the novice Townend Fantasy, a pony with an excellent in hand record that had only been backed for a few weeks.

Sophie Jones took the junior championship with Lunesdale War Dance, from Ellie Mitchell with Greenholme Fiona, in reserve. Tracey was very impressed by the standard of riding in the junior classes, and particularly impressed when one young jockey knew the instant that her pony had struck off on the wrong leg and corrected it immediately; she explained that she was judging the junior's riding ability, as well as the pony and its way of going.

The working hunter ring ran all day, with clear round classes and the option to join a mini masterclass with Julie Robinson, followed by novice, intermediate and open classes which were judged by Vicky Wilson. 

The Fell Pony Society Annual Breed Show, Sunday 7 August

The Fell Pony Society held its annual Breed Show in the beautiful setting of Dalemain on Sunday 7th August by kind permission of the McCosh family. Not normally held on a Sunday, the date had been changed to avoid a clash with the Lowther Show where the Fell Pony Society Display Team were booked to perform, as several members of the Display Team are fundamental to the running of the Breed Show. The strong winds created quite a challenge in anchoring the marquees but otherwise the rain held off, and an increased number of entries enjoyed a bright blustery day.

The Tufton Silver Challenge Trophy for overall supreme champion went to Margaret Wilson with the homebred seven year old mare Townend Fantasy.



Fantasy (*above*) was ridden by Kate Watson and won the Greenfield Memorial Trophy for the novice ridden champion and the Toby Tankard for the overall ridden champion in this, her first season under saddle, and only her third ridden show. Fantasy is sired by the fabulously successful stallion Heltondale Bonzo Boy, who is sadly no longer with us, but who won the stallion progeny class and has four of his progeny representing him at HOYS this year. Fantasy impressed the judges with her free flowing movement and is a lovely example of the breed; I'm sure that we will see her progress further under saddle as her siblings have. Reserve supreme went to the three year old gelding, Lunesdale Captain, owned and bred by Bert and Carole Morland and shown by Lily Gaulton; another typey

pony with excellent action and a previous winner at both the FPS Stallion and the South Cumbria shows this season. Captain won the FPS Challenge Cup for the best three year old pony.

The Lakeland Cup for the best pony two years old and under went to David Thompson with the yearling filly, Drybarrows Another Chapter. It was a good day for the Drybarrows stud, as David also took the yearling colt class with Dybarrows Advocate. He then teamed up with the Smith family, whose yearling Drybarrows Authentic had taken second place in the filly class, and the three yearlings collectively earned second place for the Smith family's Carrock I'm Yer Man in the stallion progeny class.

Reserve champion pony two years and under went to Carrock Elsa, the Cockbain family's prolific winner; the family's 20 year old Townend Sugar won the veteran in hand class and the McDonough Shield for the oldest mare with her own foal at foot.

Winner of the Alan Shuttleworth trophy for the champion mare was the four year old Greenholme Georgy Girl, who had won the mares 4-7 years for Jane Steeples. Townend Skylark took reserve for Margaret Wilson.

Bracklinn Rosebud won the Heltondale Lucy X Cup for the best filly bred by a registered native heath breeder for the Smith family, and the Shawfell Silhouette Memorial Cup for the best foal went again to the Wilkinson family with Brackenbank Ruby.

Other class winners in the mares and fillies in hand include Banksgate Aisling who won the mares over eight years for Helen Rich, and Raisbeck Casino who won the class for mares with filly foals at foot. Amy Kinsella won the class for three year olds with Brackenbank Flicka, whom we look forward to seeing under saddle next season.

Nicola Chippendale won the Farleton trophy for the champion gelding over four years with the seven year old Rackwood Duke. Louise Younger took the class for geldings eight years and over, the reserve championship and the Skennerskeugh Joe trophy with Wellbrow Norman.

Other winners in the geldings and colts in hand include George Hutton who won the mare with colt foal and the foal class with Just Ebony and her foal Setmabanning Jacko; and Iysha Pitman won the two year old class with Bracklinn Travis.

In the ridden rings the hotly contested HOYS ticket went to Greenholme Caitlin and Miss T Bell Heather. Raisbeck Calico, owned and bred by Di Slack, won the ridden open mares class, the traditional ridden class, the open ridden championship and the reserve overall ridden championship with Amy Kinsella in the saddle. Louise Pearson's Bracklinn Dynamite won the class for novice geldings and stallions with Brian Williams and took the reserve novice championship. Courtney Savage won the open class for stallions and geldings with Deepghyll Lucky Touch while Amy Kinsella rode Di Slack's Raisbeck Calico to victory in the open mares.

Ridden veteran class went to Zoe Brain and Kerbeck Smugglers Fire. Wansfell Wandaran won the best turned out class and the Briar trophy for Lesley Bamforth.

The winners of the pairs class were sisters Lucy Jones with Dalefoot Rio and Sophie Jones with Greenholme Friar Tuck.

Juniors are very well catered for. Amongst the youngest riders was Hannah Wainwright, aged 6, who won the fancy dress class with Bess. The lead rein class was won by Katie Collins, 7, with Shadowcroft Jolston. Georgina Mallinson, 9, took the first ridden class with Wolds Red Kite.

Lucie Mason won the class for riders under 13 years with Murthwaite Barney Rubble. Sophie Jones won the class for riders between 14 and 18 years with Lunesdale War Dance, and went on to take the Littletree Trophy for the junior ridden champion, with Marianna Stephenson and Greenholme Buttercup in reserve. The young handlers class was won by 14 year old Georgia Ellis and Scotgate Midnight Rebel. Megan Wilkinson, 16, won the class for young judges.

There were good entries in the WHP classes and the overall championship went to Zoe Marsden's Wellbrow Diplomat, ridden by Ashley Bird, who had won the intermediate class—quite an achievement, as the stallion hadn't actually jumped a course of fences before, and had only been entered for fun on the day, after he had contested the HOYS class earlier in the morning. The reserve championship went to the winner of the open class, Murthwaite Barney Rubble, who was ridden by Millie Mason and had been second in the novice class with Millie's younger sister Lucie.

Other winners in the WHP classes were Farleton Fern who won the beginners with Kate Storkanova and Chesterman Dandy who won the novice class for Sonyarisa Duckhouse.

The dressage ring ran for most of the day and competitors in the three classes were able to fit their tests around their other activities. The seniors BE 90 Test 95 winner was Louise Younger with Wellbrow Norman; Ellie Mitchell won the junior class with Greenholme Fiona. The Introductory walk and trot test winner was Wansfell Wandaran ridden by Lesley Bamforth.

Gilly Chippendale won the driving class with Skennerskeugh Smoke. Greenholme Dillon and Kate Storkanova won the Packway Bellman Trophy for the pony gaining the most points in riding, driving and dressage classes.

There were good entries in the foot classes with the trophy for the best set of feet shod going to Barbara Dunne's Skennerskeugh Gregory, farrier William Moore. The trophy for the best unshod foot went to Caroline Dean's Linnel Frostie.

Most Versatile, Fell Pony Breed - Judged by UK Platinum judge Robin Avery. Most Versatile Pony in Dressage - Judged by USDF accredited dressage judge. Most Versatile Pony In Show - total points from Ridden, In-Hand, and Dressage.

Jane Rawden's all rounder Murthwaite Looks Promising took fifth place from H.M. The Queen's Balmoral Fashion in sixth.

Later in the week it was thrilling to see the Murthwaite ponies taking part in the live performance to celebrate the Queen's 90th birthday; which included young Kinvara Garner (13), skilfully riding the stunning Townend Schubert, and doing a fabulous job of playing a young Princess Elizabeth learning to ride her pony. Well done all!

FPS Judges' Training Day

The FPS held a training refresher day for judges at Newton Rigg E.C. in April. Around 50 people attended, including judges of other M&M breeds.

Peter Boustead and Russell Sutcliffe stressed the importance of breed type and Fell pony characteristics, as good conformation is similar in any breed. Peter emphasised the importance of movement in ridden classes and explained that he is concerned that judges and competitors seem to be turning ridden classes into dressage or equitation tests. Much emphasis is placed on the correct canter lead, correct bend etc, but not enough emphasis on whether the pony's movement is correct for a Fell, with, for example, the knee and the hock action and the reach that would allow a pony to move through bracken on a fell.

All too often ridden shows follow the same set pattern with ponies going into canter showing almost no walk and hardly any trot, especially on the left rein. Peter is worried that we could end up with a universal native pony that can canter beautifully on a flat surface, but would not be able to traverse mountain or moorland. He would like to see a 'movement according to type' mark factored in to the ridden show mark to help focus attention on this important point.

The ridden ponies present to assist with the demonstration were from the Ryehouse Show Team, all very good examples of the breed that move very well.

Sue Millard discussed the driving turnouts who had kindly attended. They were Gilly Chippendale's Skennerskeugh Smoke put to a varnished Ralli Car; and Paul Metcalfe's Greenholme Dec put to a Polish pleasure wagon. Two very different

vehicles that provided a nice contrast of how to turn out for Private Driving and Pleasure or Exercise Cart classes. Sue explained the line of draught, and how well the traditional full collar serves for low four wheeled carriages and for two wheelers with axle draught. Sue also discussed some positive guidelines on the judging of driving classes, that categorised various minor and more serious faults that may be encountered by a judge.

The Society hopes to hold a judges' training day every two years in the future and it has been suggested that the next session may concentrate on working hunter pony classes.

Fell Pony Society Auction of Promises

The FPS will be holding another auction of promises this autumn. The event will follow the same format as 2014, an evening meal followed by the auction, and will again include some fantastic opportunities and spectacular lots that should result in some keen bidding. It will take place at Stoneybeck, near Penrith, on October 15th, and electronic bidding will be available before the event for anyone who cannot attend in person. Stallion Grading

The Fell Pony Society has introduced a new free and voluntary stallion grading scheme. It will not affect current FPS stallion licensing rules.

In this first year the grading scheme has been open to two and three year old colts, and took place at Newton Rigg E.C. Penrith and at the FPS Southern Show venue in September. During 2017, stallion grading will be available to all who wish to take part, and other suitable venues will be added to meet the demand.

Grading will be undertaken by a panel of assessors and marks will be independently awarded as per the Fell Pony Breed Standard (Breed Type / General Characteristics & Scale of Points). The marks awarded by each assessor will be totalled and an average mark will be calculated from their score sheets.

There will be three grades:

Gold: will be awarded to ponies who achieve 80% or above. These will be of the highest quality and the ones which breeders should be encouraged to use.

Silver: will be awarded to ponies who achieve 65% - 79%. These will be of slightly less quality but still have an important role to play.

Bronze: will be awarded to ponies who achieve 50% - 64%.

Mikado is by the Wellbrow stud's foundation stallion Heltondale Mountain Mist II who is now 21 years old and has had a major influence on the quality of the Wellbrow ponies. Mikado is set to take over from his sire in the future.



Reserve champion was Margaret Wilson's lovely six year old mare Townend Skylark, shown by Penny Randell. Skylark is another pony sired by the extremely

successful sire Heltondale Bonzo Boy; both the champion and reserve are a credit to the work of Greta and the late Sarge Noble at Heltondale.

Other winners in hand were Mrs C Boardman with the yearling colt Banksgate O Boy by Banksgate Johnny Doran; and Rob Briggs with the six year old stallion Greenholme Elect by Greenholme Warbler.

As usual, the HOYS qualifier ridden class, judged by Mr. D. Blaire and Mr. T. Best from Fife, was very well supported with many very successful ponies contesting the ticket and Fells taking six of the top eight places. The winner, confirming the initial placings, was Miss D Garner's nine year old stallion Greenholme Hairy Harry ridden by Becki Penny; Harry is another pony by Greenholme Warbler. Third, pulled up from the middle of the class, was Anna Metcalfe with Lunesdale Warrior Queen, one of very few mares entered. Fourth, fifth, seventh and eighth places were all taken by stallions: Zoe Marsden's Wellbrow Diplomat; Miss C Clare's Lunesdale Dixie; Miss K Mark's Hardendale Ray and the Smith family's Bracklinn Jackpot respectively.

Dalewin Beauty — Fell Pony Extraordinaire!

My wonderful Fell pony, Dalewin Beauty, born May 1998, has turned a hoof to many things with great success. An 'old fashioned' Fell at 13.1hh, she has been a show pony both in hand and ridden to County level, in hand mounted games, ridden fancy dress, hunting, and as an endurance (long distance) pony. Her life has been varied but at 18 we are settled on the odd day hunting and endurance. She has completed many a pleasure ride and competitive graded endurance ride. She likes nothing more than a distance ride be it locally on her own or better still with her equine friends at a ride organised by Endurance GB (EGB) throughout the country. I am sure she enjoys the variety of countryside, fields, hills, valleys and open spaces and the tremendous views. She does occasionally like to stop and stare at a particularly wonderful view. We have ridden in contrasting places, differing rides in Sherwood Forest and Nottinghamshire, Tebay and other venues in Cumbria, in lots of locations in Lincolnshire, and all over Yorkshire and County Durham. We have managed to get to only one of the Fell Pony Society organised rides but I love the Fell Pony Society (FPS) rosette we were given at the end. Of course Beauty had to march on at the front striding out as though we were on a mission. She does like to be at the front and overtake. A very determined lady.

Endurance riding can be anything from 5 kilometres for the young or those new to the sport, up to 100 kilometres for the experienced, organised by the EGB Groups with stewards and vet checks to ensure the wellbeing of the animals taking part. We have taken part in day rides and up to 5 days rides from centres such as the Lindum Spirit rides held at Market Rasen racecourse annually. Beauty is well known at these events taking part in rides up to 40 kilometres (25 miles) she usually covers the route in just over 3 hours. Most years our 'holiday' is to take part in these 5 days rides. She loves the company and laps up the daily work; in fact I think she is sorry to come home.

She suffers from Equine Metabolic Syndrome (EMS), diagnosed after suffering from a bout of laminitis. Once diagnosed and on restricted grazing to lose weight, the right drugs and getting back into work, we have had no problems. For the last few years I have ensured that she is always on a restricted winter diet of hay, HiFi Lite, with Simple Systems Metaslim and a small quantity of soaked Lucie Nuts. She comes into spring quite lean (ribs covered and not thin) and with some work once the weather improves she has no problems regaining fitness, always looks very well and acts like a youngster. Her grey facial hair is the only thing that shows that she is an aged lady.

Her days in the show ring may not yet be over but when entered in the in hand veteran class last year at our local show, Egton, she leaped around and misbehaved so much that she was placed well down. She acted more like a 2 year old at its first show. I think she was telling me she is NOT a show pony.

These days because of my old age (not Beauty's) we are sticking to the shorter Pleasure Rides (10 or 20 km). Beauty bounces about at the start as she wants to

get going and is just as fit when she returns to the venue after the ride. She tries to tell me we are only part way around, but usually I have stiffened up and am glad to stretch my legs. She then likes to stand tied to the wagon for a couple of hours and take in the scenery and equine company and of course, being a Fell, grab any grass she can reach.

Beauty has won awards many times in the FPS Endurance section, both Pleasure and Competitive and I keep all her numerous rosettes together with those won elsewhere including the wonderful rosettes at the Lindum Spirit.

Beauty and I love our Endurance riding, and the people we meet and ride with are so friendly. At our level we are only competing against ourselves and so it is just fun and an enjoyable outing. Road crossings and awkward gates are often manned by stewards and helpers and medical help and vets are on call so both riders and

horses can be attended to guickly should something untoward happen.

There is often a photographer out on course so you can obtain a photo of you and your horse. The riders seem to come back with the most smiley faces and horses and riders go home happy.


I would encourage anyone to try an organised Pleasure Ride and those with a registered Fell pony to enter the FPS Endurance Awards. The majority of natives love to work and long distance riding is just the job for these hardy types. For the more elderly riders a native pony is a lot nearer the ground so a lot easier to get on and off independently than the larger horse you may have ridden in your younger days, so if you still have an urge to go riding then get on a native, especially a Fell. If you have half of the fun and pleasure I have, then you will find it very rewarding.

The Society's Silhouette Logo

I am delighted to see your Society continue to use a silhouette drawing by my late father, Deane Skurray, as your letter heading and logo.

I have been asked to give a background to the artist and how he became involved in your Society.

He was born in 1901 and brought up in Abingdon, just as the motor car started to appear in Berkshire, but the horse and trap were still the main form of transport. History does not relate from whom he inherited his incredible eye for the horse and its conformation, which he showed in drawings as early as the age of seven.

Articled to an architect in 1919 until 1928, he did not have enough time to pursue the subject, so it was after this that his love of silhouettes and weather vanes began. In early 1930 the first sales literature was produced, for hunt kennels and house clients with stables. Each silhouette order was cut out with his hand fretsaw, and the frame made to his drawing. As he was a director of a brewery, looking after public house properties, if a pub happened to be near a racing establishment their most prominent winner was depicted in the pub sign.

Bertram Mills' Circus had its winter quarters at Binfield in Berkshire when not touring. In 1934 my father was commissioned to produce drawings of all their acts that involved the horse, for publicity.

The opportunity arose in 1936 for him to purchase a property in North Hampshire with 56 acres to set up a stud for pony and hunter breeding, but the War came in 1939, which meant much land being ploughed up for cereal growing. It wasn't until 1946 that he had time to revert to his interests of pony and horse breeding. He was extremely concerned by the decline in stocking numbers, by the end of World War Two, of the national pony breeds in the country. Exmoor ponies for example, were down to a handful of breeding mares, with the demand for


meat and lack of care of the moors etc. Thus he was instrumental in the setting up of the society to promote these breeds, The Ponies of Britain Club, with its annual show held in the Paddock at Ascot Racecourse, by kind permission of Major "Crocker" Bulteel, The Manager, with the hardworking character, Glenda Spooner, as Secretary.

His design for Ponies of Britain's letter heading was accepted, and its 1953 Show Catalogue had 22 drawings depicting their activities, which included The Fell Pony. I imagine he was approached by your Society to do the same, for in March 1954, nine drawings were presented, which include your letter heading. Fortunately the originals have still survived, so they have been copied and reduced for your members to enjoy.

There was also a need to build up the stock and quality of the hunter after the War, hence his involvement with the Hunters Improvement Society in its early

beginnings. His articles appeared in various equine papers on breeding, and after the War requirements to plough for food came to an end he set up a stud at his home. For example the Cleveland Bay, a light draught horse, he considered good stock onto which you could put your thoroughbred stallion, to combine their joint features and produce the ideal hunter. To prove his point, there were 19 stock in the stud at the time of his death.

He admired and was influenced by horse artists such as Cecil Aldin,



'Snaffles' (Lionel Edwards) and Alfred Munnings, who were his slightly older contemporaries. I believe he met them and it definitely shows in his work.

When Princess Elizabeth stood in for her Father, George VI, at The Trooping of The Colour Parade in 1952, riding side saddle on Police Horse Winston, the temptation was too great for my father, and in Coronation Year 1953, he obtained permission from The Palace to produce a weather vane of her. Sadly he was unable to find a way to cut out the silhouette on a production basis. A label for 'Monarch' Coronation Strong Ale, however, was approved for Morlands Brewery.


In July 1954 he approached a London horse book publisher, J.A. Allen and Co., "The Horseman's Bookshop", with a proposal to produce a book incorporating nearly a hundred of his chosen drawings and silhouettes. This would have been very timely, when his name was becoming known in the horse breeding world, and he might have received some recognition for his amazing eye for horse conformation and being able to reproduce it so accurately. Even this publication would have represented only a fraction of his output of horse drawings, quite

apart from his detailed architectural drawings, with hand coloured elevations, each a picture in its own right.

The book was never produced. He was killed in a car accident on 28th November 1954.


Fortunately, his extraordinary eye for the horse was passed on to his daughter Susan Chance, whose achievements in pony breeding with her "Spinningdale Stud" would have made him very proud.



Above, left: Deane Skurray's "Fell Stallion". Right: "Fell Pony Mare and Foal."



"One Fell Swoop": NPS Novice Dressage Team Champions 2016

Our team has been a year in the making, starting at the 2015 competition when Jane Rawden was disappointed to find only 2 Fells taking part in the championships. She ended up in a very mixed team named Lastminute.com. Knowing the versatility of our Fells she got in touch via the Fell Pony Group on Facebook and a plan for 2016 was formulated. I and Mother/daughter duo Vicki and Holly Brown were part of the successful BD Team Quest Fell team named Bounced Back, so we agreed to do qualifiers to allow us to compete in 2016. The fourth member of the team was initially Elizabeth Wilkinson, who had been competing superbly in BD affiliated competitions.

After much discussion as to a team name, we narrowed it down to GrandFELLa's or One Fell Swoop and there was no better place to decide on it than putting it to the members of the Fell Pony Group. Close to unanimously members decided One Fell Swoop was the winner - highly fitting given the success of Sue Millard's book and relevance to our plan to swoop down and take the competition by surprise with our 4 Fell ponies. After competing the 2015 season in the Team Quest competition we felt it important to establish a team identity so a uniform was agreed on and a matching banner design created. The team were keen to fly the Fell Pony flag and the Fell Pony Society kindly gave their permission to use the logo on the banners.

Qualifiers in the North East are few and far between. Given that 3 ponies were from the area and needed to qualify at only one competition, we set about



approaching venues to host qualifiers for NPS. Elizabeth contacted Manor Grange Stud who kindly agreed to add the qualifiers to their schedule. Jane Rawden was first to qualify at Bakewell Fell and Dales Show, followed by Elizabeth Wilkinson. I was next to qualify Prelim, travelling an hour and a half to Manor Grange in January. Holly Brown qualified at the same venue in February. That left me to qualify in the Novice at HPEC North East at Seagold Centurian. We now had a team of 4 dressaging Fell ponies and were all set for NPS National Finals 2016.

During the qualifying period Elizabeth Wilkinson had been competing in affiliated British Dressage competitions and was heading to Regional Finals at Bishop Burton. We were thrilled to find out that she had qualified for the Prelim Winter National Finals - a huge, once in a lifetime achievement and on a FELL PONY. However, due to the competitions being on the same day Elizabeth now couldn't compete as part of team One Fell Swoop, so the search for a new team member began. Luckily we didn't have to look far. Elizabeth knew Sally Baker based in York, the owner of Wellbrow Dewdrop, a pony already qualified for finals and being ridden by Amy Small who had already competed at BRC championship, being part of the winning team. With this fantastic new addition to the team we were once again all set for the National Finals.

The team comprised myself (Vicky Parker, photo below) riding Thornbeck Andrew, Holly Brown riding Townend Stardust, Amy Small riding Sally Baker's Wellbrow Dewdrop (right) and Jane Rawden riding Murthwaite Looks Promising. The team made the long journey down to Addington Manor in Buckingham on Friday 8th, the journey taking 4 and 3/4 hours for the team furthest north. By the



evening we were settled and enjoying wine and food along with chief grooms Samantha Audley and Vicki Brown.

Saturday came, and first up bright and early in the main arena was Amy Small with Dewdrop, also known as Robert, who rode a lovely first Prelim test for a 5th



place in the Juniors - a great start to the campaign. The other three ponies were on in quick succession a few hours later. Thornbeck Andrew a.k.a. Drew struggled to settle at only his second championships, and the occasion got the better of him, but Holly Brown with Stardust a.k.a. Will was on fine form, producing a huge score of 76.46% to come second in her section, only missing a win by 1 mark. Lastly, Jane on the Promising lovely Looks a.k.a. produced a solid test, coming 8th in her section on 65.21% This left the team placing 7th out of 23 teams, a fantastic start to the day; however we all felt the Prelim section was our most realistic chance of winning.

In the afternoon's Novice tests, Amy again was up first and produced a superb test to gain 71.15% and win the overall Novice Junior section against a range of breeds including Welsh and Riding Ponies. Amy had

qualified to the Supreme Championship to Music that night. Thankfully Drew remembered to bring his sensible head, and in what was a difficult test for only his second attempt at a Novice he scored a pleasing 68.85%, placing 5th in the section. Holly and Will again produced a consistent high quality test to gain 70% and 3rd place. Jane and Cappy scored 65.19% against the smaller breed ponies.

Despite our scores we had no idea of where we would place against the extremely high quality competition with many affiliated combinations. The top 10 teams were invited forward to the presentation. It got down to the top two teams, a battle of the hairies, Fells vs. Dales. We were shocked and thrilled when they announced the Dancing Dales in 2nd with One Fell Swoop WINNING the first place rosette and a book courtesy of Master Dressage.

The Fell team beat 19 others including all the other native breeds and riding ponies. For the whole team which had been over a year in the planning we were just ecstatic to demonstrate whatever the need a Fell really can succeed. Even in dressage. The night however wasn't finished there.


Amy Small still had the Supreme to Music to go. The team gathered to watch the fabulous combination of Amy and Robert strut their stuff in the music against some very tough competition. The Fells had already done so well it was hard to

Penny commented: "Candyman, Schubert, and Barley Sugar all competed last year at HOYS; with Schubert winning the Fell & Dales class. to repeat their qualifications in 2016 is Townend Fantasy and Kate Wilson winning the a tremendous achievement, to have four aualified this unbelievable-all credit is due to their

Bonzo Boy continued to shine at this year's Fell Pony Breed Show winning the Stallion Progeny class and the Lady Yule Silver Challenge Cup. The group bred and owned by Margaret were: Townend Fantasy (above), Townend Fancy and Townend Skylark. Townend Skylark was also Reserve Champion Mare and the greatest accolade of all; Townend Fantasy taking the Overall Supreme Championship. Townend Fantasy is a 7 year old mare, out of Townend Bridie II, she was Champion Novice Ridden, Overall Champion Ridden and then Supreme Champion, ridden by Kate Wilson from Dalton-in-Furness. Fantasy has seen much success as

an in-hand pony, shown by Penny including the best 3 year at the Breed Show. Margaret said, "We always knew she would have potential as a ridden pony, but she needed to mature. She has spent the summer with Kate Wilson and her mother Heather Watson and they have quietly brought her on. The Breed Show was only her third ridden show, and we were all so proud of how hard she tried."

The Townend Stud was established by Eddie Wilson, who registered the first pony with the Townend prefix around 1945 from ponies bred by his father. Eddie sadly died in 2003 but his wife Margaret continues to successfully breed and show the Townend line with her daughter Penny.

Eddie's daughter Glenis Cockbain, and her children and grandchildren, are also successful breeders of the Carrock Fell and Dales ponies, and both studs have seen considerable success over the years.

Our normal routine involves hacking out most days, having lessons, and riding out with our local Bridleways group, but we also get involved in lots of other events all over the country. Early on in the year we were in a team for the Heather Lucas Memorial Mounted Games at Rodbaston Equestrian Centre. The Heather Lucas games are for adults only, with a few specific rules to make life easier for the riders. For example, one team member is always unmounted, and if a rider drops something in a race, the unmounted team member has to pick up the item, so that the rider doesn't have to dismount and remount! There were bending, sock and bucket, flag, pony express, quoit and pole and milk races. Our team was steady rather than spectacular, but we did win our heat in the bending race! Roo loves mounted games and I was thrilled when he was awarded Charlie's Cup for the Best Effort Made by an Individual Horse and Rider at the games.

July saw us at Windsor for the Oueen's 90th Birthday Fell Pony Society Guard of Honour. What a weekend! We were so honoured to take part in this event, and I was very proud of Roo who was calm and sensible throughout the parade when other ponies were finding it hard to keep their feet on the ground. At the end of July, Roo and I competed at the TREC GB SEIB National Championships of Great Roo and I have been competing together at TREC since 2013, sometimes as a pair with a friend, and sometimes on our own. We travel all over the country to compete most weekends over the summer, and have been competitions in places as far afield as Scotland, North Yorkshire, Wales, Devon and Suffolk, TREC (Technique Randonnee Equestre de

Competition) is the ultimate test of the versatility of a horse or pony. TREC originated in France, hence the name, and in its early stages it was a test to demonstrate the competence of a horse and rider combination to lead trail rides. There are three phases to a full TREC competition; orienteering, control of paces and obstacles, which is like a cross country course, but with a wider variety of obstacles, not just jumps. The idea is that all of the phases together test the skills of a horse and rider in planning and executing a long distance ride in unfamiliar country. The orienteering phase can be up to 40 km at the highest level, and the obstacles course can also be up to 5 kilometers to be completed at speed, so the fitness of both horse and rider is also tested. Each year there is a British Championship, organised by the sport's governing body, TREC GB. Qualification depends on being placed 1st 4th in a qualifying competition, and at the lower levels in particular, classes are very hotly contested. This year 107 riders attended the national championships at Poplar Park Equestrian Centre in Suffolk, of whom 66 were competing at the same level as us, either as pairs or individuals. Roo and I qualified earlier in the summer by being placed 3rd at a competition in Gloucestershire. During the orienteering phase, we didn't make any errors of course, but occasionally we were a little slower than the speed specified for a stage of the route. At one point we had to ride along a bridleway which ran directly between 2 fields full of pigs with piglets, which Roo found quite alarming, and this definitely caused us to be a bit slow on that section as Roo took a lot of coaxing to keep going and not run back the way we had just come. We finished day 1 with a score of 208 out of a maximum of 240 points. Day 2 saw us completing the control of paces phase first. The object is to canter as slowly as possible along a set route of 150m, and to walk back along the same route as fast as possible. Maximum scores are obtained by taking over 33 seconds in canter and less than 97 seconds in walk, which is a lot harder than it sounds! We scored 18 out of a possible 60, which isn't our best score, but was better than nothing. We are relatively competent at cantering slowly, but we do find it difficult to score more than a few points for the walk test. Finally it was our turn on the cross country obstacles. First we had to negotiate low branches, then a narrow corridor, followed by bending then a ridden immobility test. We then had S bend and figure of 8 to ride, a couple of jumps, a step up, a water crossing, rein back, a ride up a slope to negotiate and a mounting exercise. All of the obstacles are designed to demonstrate the obedience and calmness of the horse, and often an obstacle that requires immobility will be positioned at the end of a long canter section, which makes the exercise more challenging! The course ran over a couple of kilometers, and we had 15 minutes in which to complete it. Roo and I made it round in just over 13 minutes, and we scored 116 out of a possible 160 in this phase, which I was really pleased with. Often judging is more strict at a championships and courses are permitted to be longer, obstacles higher and generally more difficult. Roo and I usually score in the region of 120 for this phase, so to be near our average score at the championships was very pleasing. Overall we were 7th in our class, which is our best result yet at a national championships. We had a fantastic weekend together demonstrating how versatile Fell ponies are. The competition requires stamina, speed, obedience and teamwork between pony and rider, and Fell ponies have the lot!

Ponies Past: Breatherdale Hal (1997 - 2016)

After several years of horse-sharing I decided in the summer of 2000 that I should acquire a horse of my own. A visit to Keswick Show convinced me that I



needed a Fell pony. Many valuable phone conversations with incredibly helpful people followed, and February 2001 saw me once again in UK with a list of ponies to visit. Hal and I just clicked on first sight, even though I later realised he would never be a show pony. In fact it wasn't my intention to buy a show pony. I just wanted a companion to discover the local countryside and to help me improve my riding skills.

Over the last 15 years he became my best friend and was an extremely popular member of our horse community of up to 17 horses and ponies. He loved all other animals and children and was incredibly gentle with them. Through him I was also introduced to the wider Fell-owning community here in Bavaria and further afield in Germany. He represented the breed on several occasions locally and many were impressed by his coolness and generally unperturbed attitude to new situations. This photo of him in the rape field was used in one of the FPS calendars, maybe 2003 or 2004, it's one of my favourite photos of him.

No-one will ever know what exactly happened overnight in the field but he was found the Sunday before Christmas 2015 with an injured right hind leg. It was obvious that he had sustained a heavy fall resulting in severe internal bruising and damage to the pelvic region. He seemed to be making a good recovery, resting in the stable and going for short walks of gradually increasing length and we had hopes of taking him back to his companions. Then one morning he had been lying down and couldn't get up again, panicked and had to be helped up. It was feared that further damage had been done. We took him to the University Veterinary Clinic the next morning and it was obvious from the X-ray that the right pelvic bone was shattered. There was no hope of mending it. I had to take the heart-breaking decision to have him put to sleep there and then. The kindness of the staff there was wonderful.

So ended a fantastic partnership which should have lasted much longer had it not been for this unforeseen accident. Fell pony Murthwaite Keep Looking (Norman) now gets my undivided attention but I miss Hal every day; he was funny, good-natured, laid-back, kind, undemanding (except where food was concerned) and handsome.

Goodbye. Good boy.

Goytvalley Magic Minstrel (1992 - 2016)

Goytvalley Magic Minstrel, affectionately known as "Mini", passed away peacefully on May 13, 2016 at Last Dime Ranch LLC in Floresville, Tx. The Supreme Champion stallion had a prolific show career in England and in 2002 was imported by Shannon Albert and Karen Sorensen of Stonecreek Farm Fell Ponies in Denison, Tx and became one of the foundation stallions in North America. Minstrel sired over 65 pure bred Fell Ponies in his lifetime; half being produced by Stonecreek Farm. Minstrel was crucial in promoting the Fell Pony in North American through showing and exhibitions at Equine Affaire.

Minstrel was a gentle soul, kind to his mares, foals and to people. He was gentle enough for a beginning rider yet athletic enough to enthusiastically embrace cross country jumping. He was a one of a kind stallion who will be greatly missed.

At the end of February we lost our very special Fell Pony Aylestone The Merry Monk. Merrie was our pony of a lifetime. We bred him from our beautiful mare Oldmill Mystique and he was born at home on 13th May 2002.

We broke him in ourselves and it was with Anna that he really shone; they adored each other from the very start. Together they won the Children's Ridden Championship at the Southern Breed Show twice, the Shilstone Rocks Blackberry Trophy twice, the Fell Pony Annual Awards for Performance twice, Dressage 3 times and the Junior section 4 times! He was also awarded The Lownthwaite Rob Trophy for a Fell Pony who has promoted the breed outside of the show ring. He had a very varied ridden career, showing, jumping, all Pony Club activities including camps, dressage and dressage to music. He was even a guinea pig pony three times for the Horse and Pony Care Final at the Pony Club Championships, allowing 20-plus teams of children show off their practical horse care skills.

But it was his talent for Mounted Games that set him apart from the rest. When Anna outgrew her Welsh B we took Merrie to practice simply so Anna could 'keep her hand' in while we looked for a new pony. Merrie loved it and with Anna's hard work within two years he went from a complete novice to the Pony Club England Mounted Games Team, competing at Royal Windsor in Diamond Jubilee year. They took part in the Final and were presented to HRH The Duke of Edinburgh on Merrie's 10th birthday. He was also the first pony we have competed internationally, crossing to Ireland for a Windsor rematch.

His sudden loss has left us devastated, but the huge number of kind messages from literally all over the world and across the equine spectrum has been overwhelming, humbling and very



comforting. Family and some of his closest friends are dedicating trees to him at The Queen Elizabeth Diamond Jubilee Wood in Normanton Le Heath in Leicestershire close to where we live. We have also named a star after him so we can look up at night and he is still shining bright above us somewhere in the Pegasus Constellation 'Forever flying the Flag'.


