## Chairman's Report

Royal Windsor Horse Show saw the official launch of the Centenary Celebrations with a parade of 40 Fell ponies from throughout the country, led by Lady Louise Windsor driving the late Duke of Edinburgh's carriage drawn by a pair of Fell ponies and carrying the FPS Centenary Pennant. It was a very proud moment to witness such immaculately turned out ponies walking so purposefully around the main area and then saluting to Her Majesty the Queen. The society awarded the Queen with a specially commissioned silk scarf, a copy of the centenary book as well as a perpetual trophy awarded to the person who has done so much to promote the Fell pony during the year. Her Majesty was amused to see that the Duke of Edinburgh was the first recipient of this award. In return the Queen presented the society with a signed copy of her photograph taken on her 96th birthday with the grey ponies Bybeck Katie and Bybeck Nightingale. She spoke so knowledgeably about the ponies and the fun they had planning the photo, waiting for the magnolia buds to just begin opening.

The next day saw the Stallion Show, where the Centenary Pennant featured again along with a performance by the FPS Display Team and a Parade of Stallions.

In August the Breed Show welcomed several FPS past presidents and overseas visitors who enjoyed tea and specially baked centenary cakes made by Megan Wilkinson. Also in August stud visits to Carrock, Lownthwaite, Helmside, Brackenbank and Greenrivers produced some very positive feedback from attendees and thanks go to all those concerned. The exhibition, workshops and talks given at the Courthouse in Shap were also a great success and again the FPS expresses its gratitude to Janet Wood and all those who helped in any way. The Ball proved to be a super evening, with a great atmosphere and a few sore heads the next day. Particular thank you to Eileen Walker and Victoria Parker who worked so hard to make it an enjoyable event and Megan again for making such a beautiful cake.

Throughout the year the 100 miles event has been a huge success enabling Fell pony supporters worldwide to take part in the Centenary celebrations.

September saw the passing of our patron for the last 40 years, Queen Elizabeth II. Many FPS members throughout Great Britain paid a fitting tribute by attending, with their ponies, special services the day before the official funeral.

One of the most moving scenes on the day of the funeral was to see Her Majesty's groom, Terry Pendry, bowing his head on the Long Walk Windsor holding the reins of her favourite pony, Carltonlima Emma, with her riding headscarf looped through the saddle.

## Trophies and Awards for 2022

If you think the achievements of a person or pony should be recognised with an award, please send your nomination to the FPS Secretary before 31st December.

The Queen's Trophy is presented annually to a person or persons who, in the opinion of the current chairman and approved by Council, has promoted the breed by work, recreation, or study.

The Edinburgh Prize is awarded internationally to a single or multiple turnout of registered Fell ponies, for achievement in Driving.

The Lownthwaite Rob Trophy is awarded annually to the pony that has done the most to publicise the breed outside the show ring.

The Peahill Basil Award is awarded internationally to a single registered Fell Pony for achievements as a veteran 15 years and over.

The Horserace Betting Levy Board grant is used to give premiums to breeders and owners through the Premium & Performance Points Award Schemes.

All In Hand exhibits at the FPS Stallion & Colt Show, the FPS Breed Show and FPS Southern Show are automatically entered for the Breeders' Trophy.

The FPS Endurance Awards Scheme collates points for distances achieved by long distance riders of Fell ponies.

There will be a new award for Trec in 2023 (see p90). Details of all trophies and awards are at http://www.fellponysociety.org.uk/awards.htm - do enter the Points Awards if you are able.

## Secretary & Treasurer's Report - Autumn 2022

I was greatly saddened to hear that Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth had passed away. As our patron of 40 years and a huge supporter of our ponies and the Society, she will be sadly missed.

The Society received a mass of interest from the press asking for interviews, statements and photos following the announcement, and these continued until after the State funeral took place.

Several donations have been received in memory HM The Queen. Thank you to all who have donated and sent messages of condolence, it is very much appreciated.

It was very special to see the launch of the Centenary celebrations at Windsor Horse Show with a parade, in front of the Queen, of members with their ponies, and the presentation by Peter Boustead and Jane Rawden. The celebrations have certainly promoted added interest in the breed. Thanks to the committee for all their hard work arranging it all.

The FPS office has undertaken additional work this year for various reasons, so we would like to thank you for your patience when we have perhaps been unable to respond as quickly as usual.

Our Stallion Show and Breed Show were a huge success this year, well supported by exhibitors, and enjoyed an increase in spectators and visitors at both events.

The Society is categorised as "At Risk" on the RBST Watchlist for 2022/23. At Risk breeds represent "those breeds with lower numbers than ideal and with a degree of inbreeding that gives cause for concern". When compiling the Watchlist the RBST compares effective population size with measures of inbreeding, moving away from the previous focus purely on female registrations. This gives a more accurate reflection of a breed's true conservation status. Many thanks also to the Horserace Betting Levy Board for receipt of the Rare Breeds grant; their continued support is very much appreciated. The Board is supporting a RBST project aimed at improving the conservation status of our native equine breeds.

Membership for 2022 is at just over 1100. This figure is up on last year and we are delighted to have processed 345 new memberships, some coming back to us after a break and some completely new members. We also have new memberships waiting to be processed for 2023. We are happy to take renewal payments from November to avoid the January rush. If you wish to set up a Standing Order to pay your membership, make sure this is done in time for renewal date of 1 January.

The Society does not take card payments, therefore payments cannot be taken over the phone, instead you can send a cheque/PO made payable to 'The Fell Pony Society' or pay by bank transfer (please ensure your name is used as the reference). Please try not to phone for these details as they are in the magazine and on the Society's website.

I would like to thank President, Christine Morton, and Chairman, Peter Boustead, as well as Council for their continued support, also thanks to my colleagues Kirsten, Chris and Elizabeth. Chris is recovering from a spell in hospital and we wish her well with her recovery.

## From the Office

- Registration / Passport application forms cannot be downloaded from the website, they are only available by applying to the office. Do not photocopy the form. We are receiving a number of forms where the description is very difficult to read and the location of the chip has not been recorded by the vet. Occasionally the vet has not included a stamp. The description must be printed in block letters. All whorls must be recorded in black ink, and all white must be recorded in red ink. Please read the guidance notes carefully prior to completion of the forms and check before sending in to the Society. Any forms incomplete or incorrectly completed will be returned.
- FIS sample packets Please make sure that the full registered name with correct spelling is recorded (stable/pet names are not acceptable). The results are issued directly from the lab to the owner, by email. Please make sure your email is legible, if the lab cannot read your email address it will cause delays in you receiving the result.
- The current Equine Identification regulations require the applications for foal passports to arrive with the Society within 6 months of birth or 30 November whichever is the later. However in addition to the above, FPS regulations require applications to be received by no later than 31 December (irrespective of age) or the application will be treated as late and will require late registration fees and confirmation of the sire and dam by DNA. Double fees may also apply if applications are received during December.
- Service books are not issued automatically, if you need a book you must request one. Service certificates / notifications of coverings online must be notified by 31 December in the year of covering, if not any resulting foal will have to be DNA typed to confirm the sire prior to registration. If you choose to input the details online you will receive an email acknowledging the successful receipt. If you don't receive an email the information has not been received and you should contact the Society without delay.

When completing stallion service certificates please complete all the details fully, including full name and registration number of stallion and mare and full dates of covering to include at least month and year. Month on its own with no year is unacceptable.

• Any changes to a passport should in the first instance be notified to the Fell Pony Society. Please do not notify the Central Equine Database, the Society will do this once the changes have been verified.

#### For example

- change of address/contact details of the current owner
- castration
- change of ownership
- notification of death
- change in 'food chain status'.

If you are unsure of the procedure then please ask.

- Payments by BACS please always include your name (even if it's just your surname) as the reference, when sending payments this way.
- Passports are returned by Royal Mail 'Signed For' in the UK and with a proof of posting overseas. If you wish to have your passport posted by 'Special Delivery' in the UK or 'International Track and Sign' overseas, please add £5.00 to the fee and let us know you wish to have it returned this way.
- Prior to export If at all possible, please have the passport updated with the new owner's details prior to the pony leaving your holding. As a member the cost is only £10, but it saves the purchaser having to send back the passport from overseas once the pony arrives with them. If you are in this position, get in touch, we can usually turn around the passports the same day in these circumstances.

The above rates have applied since 2021. If you pay by Standing Order, please check with your bank that the Order is for the correct amount.

The range of overseas membership types mirrors the UK types, with an additional charge to cover the cost of overseas postage.

An associate member is unlikely to own a pony and therefore will not wish to take advantage of the pony related privileges of membership.

Family membership may be applied for by married or co-habiting couples and their children under the age of 18 years, all residing at the same address. The two adult members enjoy the rights and privileges of full membership, and the children the rights and privileges of junior membership. Full details are in section 2 of the Articles of Association. Please note that Family membership does not apply to adult couples without children; in these cases the membership is for 2 Full memberships (separate membership forms required).

#### Membership Renewal

Society memberships fall due on 1 January annually.

No member is entitled to vote for the election of Council if his/her subscription to the Society has not been paid on or before 15 February, or to vote at an EGM / AGM if his/her subscription has not been paid by the date of the meeting. Please have your membership card ready to show on arrival.

If subscriptions have not been received by the time we send out the Spring Magazine, a reminder slip is enclosed with it. Alternatively, members can arrange to pay their subscription by standing order on 1 January each year; or pay by bank transfer.

If either the FIS test or DNA typing has not been done through the FPS then a letter will also be required from the vet who took the sample, confirming that the identity of the pony was checked.

## Enquiries from EU owners and breeders

Please contact the FPS office by email if you have any queries regarding the issue of and updating of passports for Fell Ponies in the EU, such as foal registrations, late registrations, duplicate passports, transfer of ownership, transfer to gelding etc.

#### We can:

Issue Stallion Licences, stallion service books and accept service details online.

Accept FPS membership applications - for new EU members and renewals

Issue FIS test kits to EU members

Issue DNA test kits to EU members

Issue prefix applications for EU breeders to register a prefix with the Central Prefix Register in the UK

Owners of ponies in Germany, Belgium and Hungary can apply to the NFPS for passports and/or duplicates. With regard to new passports, these ponies will receive Fell Pony passports with full pedigree information. The NFPS requires that the DNA of both parents of a foal is sampled and where possible verified. DNA testing can be done in The Netherlands (Van Haeringen Laboratories).

### **Fditorial**

#### Tributes to Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II - Thank You, Ma'am

The celebratory aspects of the Magazine this year, our Centenary, the Queen's Platinum Jubilee and Her Majesty's 40th year as Patron, have been heavily overshadowed by her passing. You will find many photographic tributes to Queen Elizabeth in this issue, and I have collected them into a dedicated section.

I have been deeply impressed by the way that Council members and members of the Society have responded to countless demands from the broadcast media since 8th September, or have organised events to remember Her Majesty, or both.

"Thank you" as well to all our contributors who make the Magazine what it is - who have written, collected and sent reports, photographs and articles - and especially to those stalwarts who proof read it for me.

#### ISSNs for the Magazine

On a quite different note: International Standard Serial Numbers (ISSNs) for print and online will appear on the cover of this Magazine and of future issues.

You may ask: why does it matter? Well, professional writers, artists or photographers like being paid, but the Society doesn't pay for any material in the Magazine although we do credit wherever possible. However, members of Authors Licensing and Collecting Society (ALCS) and/or the Design and Artists Copyright Society (DACS) can receive a share of a "secondary uses" payment from the Copyright Licensing Agency for their published work, and that can be worth a considerable sum to them each year. To keep their claim alive they can cite International Standard Book Numbers (ISBNs) and ISSNs as evidence that their work is currently published in books, magazines or journals. The more numbers, the bigger their share.

Our ISSNs for the FPS Magazine in print and online will now enable professional contributors to cite our Magazine issues in their claim. It seems an appropriate move in our Centenary year to become a "proper grown-up publication."

Mr Boustead asked for a proposer and seconder for approval of the minutes

published in the Autumn Magazine. Acceptance of the minutes was proposed by Mrs Slack and seconded by Mrs Morton and approved by members.

#### 3 Matters arising from the minutes of the Annual General Meeting 2021

There were no matters arising.

#### 4 Chairman's Report

Mr Boustead began his report by reminding members of some events of 1922 in comparison to 2022:

Back in 1922 the Country was recovering from Spanish flu, today we are in the midst of Covid-19; both the USSR and the BBC were formed in 1922; and The Fell Pony Society was formed in 1922 and continues to go from strength to strength. In 1922 there were 100 ponies registered compared with 323 in the last year. 54 brown/bay ponies were registered in both 1922 and 2021; 5 greys in 1922 and 32 in 2021; 40 black ponies in 1922 and 235 last year. One piebald was also registered in 1922! It was reported that there had been a dispersal sale of ponies at Uldale where foals had been sold to 19gns and mares to 50gns, an exceptionally good price in 1922, and bidding was described as 'spirited, which testified to the popularity of the breed', and the same could describe the sales held over the last year or two.

Mr Boustead also reported on how interesting he had found everyone's reports on the '100 miles challenge', particularly from one owner in Hendon, whose pony was not worried at all by frequent London buses but was frightened by the quiet, electric 'Deliveroo' scooters!

Mr Boustead had written to the BBC regarding the promotion of Konik ponies on their Winter Watch programme, and it was interesting to see that although the Koniks featured in a recent Countryfile programme they were not promoted to the same extent.

The BSPS had recently proposed to increase the height and width of the WHP fences, as too many ponies were getting clear rounds. This would have penalised the heavier native breeds. In response to our concerns the BSPS said that they would be reverting back to the height and width of fences in the 2021 rule book.

Mr Boustead thanked Mrs Slack for her term of office on Council. He also thanked Council and the FPS staff.

#### 5 Secretary/Treasurer's Report

Mrs Wilkinson reported that it was 2 years since the Country was in lockdown at the beginning of the Covid pandemic, but thankfully we were able to meet today for the AGM.

It was agreed to donate any proceeds from today's raffle together with any donations made, to 'The Red Cross Ukraine Appeal'. Recently donations have been sent from the 826 Stud Book committee and the Central Prefix Register, to the British Equestrian fund for Ukraine.

Registrations for 2021 are now complete, however we are behind schedule for having the stud book ready for today, all being well it will be available at the Stallion Show. Total Registrations for 2021 are 323, plus 34 ponies registered by the Dutch Society, in comparison to 302 in 2020, and 26 ponies registered by the Dutch Society. The number of foals registered to the Hill bred herds as agreed by Council, increased again in 2021 by 24 on the previous year, to 126.

Membership currently stands at 898. A reminder in the magazine for outstanding membership fees has resulted in a steady flow of payments coming in over the last few weeks. Around 300 who were members last year have still to renew and there have been 143 new members so far in 2022.

621 were eligible to vote for Council election as their memberships were renewed by 15 February. Disappointingly only 124 voting papers were returned.

Schedules and entry forms for the Stallion Show can be downloaded from our website. Paper copies are also available today. The schedules for South Cumbria and the Breed Show will be available very soon.

The annual return has recently been submitted to The Horserace Betting Levy Board and the Society has been notified that this year's grant will be no less than the previous year but hasn't been notified of the exact amount yet; we are very grateful for this.

Council have agreed again this year that applications will be accepted for the Learning With Fells Scheme from adult as well as junior members, with priority given to those aged 10-18. If anyone is interested in joining the scheme let the Society know as soon as possible. The visits will be arranged when Council meet in May.

There are lots of plans being made for Fell pony events to celebrate and commemorate the Society's Centenary, throughout the country. Our Display Team will again be attending events this year to promote the breed to the general public as well as part of the Centenary launch at the Stallion Show.

The accounts show a loss of £10,628 for the year ending 31 October 2021. If the upkeep of the ponies is taken into account (£13,766) from the legacy received for this purpose, and payments for the making of the film, (£7,500) as part of the Centenary celebrations, we are left with a profit of £10,638.

Mrs Wilkinson thanked our Patron, Her Majesty The Queen, for her kind annual donation received recently together with her warmest wishes for the forthcoming year. She wished Her Majesty the very best in her Platinum Jubilee year.

We are also grateful to other donations received throughout the year together with continued support of sponsorship for our shows and continuing quarterly Royalties from the sale of the 'Carltonlima Emma' Breyer model.

Finally, Mrs Wilkinson thanked Council for their continued support, Christine our President, and Chris, Elizabeth, and Kirsten who has recently joined us in the office.

#### 6 Election of Council

Mr Boustead reported that there had been 5 candidates for 4 places. He announced that Miss Brunskill, Mrs Rawden and himself as well as Mr Greener had been successfully elected to Council. He thanked Miss Meikle for standing.

Mr Boustead reported that 3 out of the 6 meetings would continue to be held via Zoom and that he hoped this would encourage those from further afield to stand in the future.

#### 7 Honorary Members

Council had voted on 4 members, with it being the Centenary year, to be recommended as Honorary members: Miss B Bell, Miss J Glass, Mr C Richardson and Mrs M Wilson. Mr Boustead asked members to vote, with a show of hands, en bloc. The vote in favour was unanimous.

#### 8 Adoption of Accounts for year ended 31 October 2021

Adoption of the accounts was proposed by Mrs Charlton, seconded by Mrs Walker and agreed by members.

#### 9 Resolution to appoint Dodd & Co as Accountants to the Society

The resolution was proposed by Mrs Robinson, seconded by Mrs Cockbain and agreed by the members.

#### 10 FPS Centenary Committee Report

Jane Rawden reported.

18 months ago a committee was drawn up to -

- i) Celebrate 100 years
- ii) Continue to educate about the heritage of the Fell Pony
- iii) Celebrate anyone with a connection with Fells

100 miles challenge is a real motivation for Fell owners to get out with their pony.

Windsor, 13 May - a parade of around 30 ponies, special presentation of the Queen's trophy to HM The Queen together with surprise gifts.

Stallion Show 14 May - Display team, parade of stallions.

Pennants and flags kindly donated by Sarah Charlton.

Centenary book "A Century of Fells" - on sale today.

Educational film - thanks to Tom Lloyd and those who provided ponies.

Ball - Tickets on sale from today.

Courthouse Shap - organised by Janet Wood, workshops, displays etc

Jane reported that she had an amazing committee who have been working together to spread the word.

#### 11 Reports from Sub-Committees

Conservation Grazing - Mrs Robinson reported that the recent survey had been aimed at all breeders to see how people manage their ponies, not just on the open fell. The results will be used to provide information to government bodies as well as to provide guidance to new breeders.

Display Team - Various events to be attended throughout the year, with the stand and display and with the stand only. Events include Country Fest, Coniston, Torver and Blackcombe Country Fairs and Penrith Show, Westmorland County Show and Sandringham. Thanks for sponsorship received, very much appreciated to help keep the team on the road.

Judges Committee - Mrs Charlton reported that 3 new judges had been approved to be added to the FPS Judges panel, Mr A Thorpe, Mr B Thorpe and Mrs G Cowell. New applications had been received for 2022 and candidates would be attending an assessment day at Inglewood EC on 3 April.

Show Committee - Ms Fairburn reported that schedules were now available for the stallion Show, where the launch of the Centenary events would also take place.

The Breed Show schedule will be available soon. Ms Fairburn reminded members that there are some changes to the timetable, the showfield will open at 7.30am and the HOYS class would be held at lunchtime. 'Not before' start times should help exhibitors when planning their classes. As always the committee welcomes any feedback regarding the changes.

A financial incentive has been offered for ponies to take part in the Young Judges Class. There is to no requirement to be flu vaccinated at either the Stallion Show or Breed Show but exhibitors are reminded to be sensible.

Next Generation Group - Katie Curwen reported that the group had been established in 2021 and had set up a bank account with funds from the previous Young Persons Group. 2 events to be held in 2022 are currently advertised on the group's Facebook page 'FPS Next Generation Group': 9 July a conformation discussion event and 10 July a Fun Ride, both to be held at Breaks Hall, Nr Appleby and hosted by Stacy Longrigg.

NESG - Mrs Walker reported that following a quiet 2 years, events are arranged for the coming year. She had recently taken part in a ride at Escrick near York, adding 7 miles to the 100 miles challenge. A Dressage Training Day had taken place in March.

The Hairy Pony Camp takes place 29 April to 1 May at Linnel Wood, places still available. Eileen will be holding a social day at her home on 18 June, to include a Hog Roast Lunch, booking required. A training day will be held in September, to include flat, jumping etc and a pleasure ride is to be arranged for later in the year.

North Scotland SG - Mrs Cheetham reported that a visit to Touchdown Memorial Home for Horses had been held in March. A demo is to be arranged and a meet up at the Highland Show.

South Scotland SG - Ms Fairburn reported that there has been an increase in Fells in the area but that it is difficult to get people together. It is hoped to arrange a ride at Drumlanrig Castle in September/October, which will be advertised on the Facebook page and booking will be required.

MESG - Looking forward to Centenary Celebrations. A travel grant has been awarded to Lunesdale Warlord so that he can attend the FPS Stallion Show in May. Sandringham Show will be held on 24 April. A book on ponies and people from the ME area is hoped to be available at Sandringham. A beach ride will take place later in the year and Gotham Shows will take place on 29 May, 10 July and 4 September. The Southern Show will take place at Berkshire College on 11 September with judges Barry and Tracy Mallinson.

Overseas committee - Mrs Millard reported that that she has received reports as follows: The new Swedish Branch is active and healthy.

Fell Pony Society and Conservancy of the Americas - for the Centenary, kindly sponsored waterproof jackets for the Display team.

Fell Pony Society of North America - producing commemorative leather bridle discs for the Centenary. Hoping to have a Centenary meet up in 2022.

Fell Pony Connection - an American group not wanting branch status but are celebrating the Centenary with pictures and videos.

Danish branch - working on Daughter Society status.

Netherlands Fell Pony Society - celebrating 25 years in 2022.

#### 11 Any Other Business

i) Questions received by Council prior to the AGM.

Mr Boustead reported that the following questions had been received from a member.

- Q1. Querying the uneven distribution of the two FPS magazines. Could a third magazine /newsletter be considered for July?
- A1. Mr Boustead reported that the latest magazine had cost around £3500 to print and post. Very few societies produce more than one magazine per year. It would not be cost effective to produce a 3rd magazine/newsletter. The Spring magazine carries the notice of the AGM and the Autumn magazine contains show results, often including HOYS in October.

Magazine editor Sue Millard does a sterling job and Council agreed that the 2 magazines should remain as they are.

- Q2. Was it intentional or an oversight of the Council to disregard our long serving, hard working Patron in the Spring Magazine?
- A2. Our press officer has been including the Royal Connection in all the recent reports. Fell Ponies will be featured in an ITN production covering the Queen's Horses, a recent article in Country Life, and a link to the article can be found on the FPS website. A presentation at Windsor on 13 May will include the Queen's Trophy (awarded in the opinion of the FPS Chairman to a person who has promoted the Fell Pony breed by work, recreation or study) and a special surprise gift to have preempted this with announcements in the Magazine would have spoiled the surprise.
- ii) Janet Wood reminded members about the exhibition to be held at the Courthouse in Shap; anyone interested to see/speak to Janet.
- iii) Mr Kelly reminded members/FPS Council that if anyone has any concerns with BBC features relating to Konik ponies or any other matter they should write directly to the Director General, Tim Davie, who is obliged to write back.
- iv) Members were reminded that hay nets were for sale at £5, proceeds going to the FPS.

Taking part in the parade of Past Champions at the Stallion Show, Tanisha Barlow's Murthwaite Look At Me who was champion in 2002, 2003, and 2004 and was still looking good at the age of 23.

## The Fell Pony Society Annual Stallion & Colt Show 2022

The Fell Pony Society held its annual Stallion & Colt Show in the beautiful setting of Dalemain near Ullswater, by kind permission of the Hasell-McCosh family. The strong wind the day before had made putting the tents up quite a challenge, but the weather on the day was glorious, and many people went home with an unexpected Cumbrian tan.

The day was a spectacular success for the Potter family who either owned or bred all the three ponies that took the championships on the day; and all of whom were sired by their Greenholme Diego.

Judge Penny Randell of the Townend Stud was very pleased with the quality of the ponies forward and chose Heltondale Prince V, bred by Greta Noble, and owned by John Potter, as her champion stallion. Greta has only bred a handful of ponies over the last 10 years and it was wonderful to see this old established stud still at the absolute top and breeding champions. Skilfully produced and shown by Courtney Savage, the five-year-old Prince caught the judge's eye from the outset with his excellent movement and being an outstanding example of breed type. Penny commented that he was a credit to all associated with him. (*Photo on p76*)

The reserve championship went to the four year old Drybarrows Dynasty, bred by David Thompson and well presented by Tom Pearson. This striking grey impressed the judge with his excellent action, showing plenty of lift.

The youngstock section had several super ponies forward, which made picking the champion a difficult decision, but it was the lovely typey two-year-old, Greenholme Orlando, who took the top spot for the Misses RJ and BK Potter. Reserve was Matthew Fearon, whose homebred yearling, Setmabanning Poldark, impressed the judge as an overall nice type of pony, with good joints and silky feather; showing the potential to develop into a good stallion; and one to watch for the future.

Greenholme Hot Rod, a nine-year-old, bred by the Potter family and owned by Nicola Chippendale, also impressed the judge with his super movement and true Fell pony type and repeated his 2019 success by winning both the class for ridden geldings and the gelding in hand championship. Penny was impressed by the way in which he had been turned out and said that he and Nicola made a pleasing combination in the ridden class.

Rob Relph-Briggs with his lovely home-bred three-year-old Birkettbank Fergie took the gelding reserve championship.

The 2014 champion Lunesdale Warlord won the class for ridden stallions and 2015 champion Boutime Wooster won the class for the best set of feet shod; the unshod class went to Mrs Cowsill's Helmside Harrier.

Winner of the driving class was Gilly Chippendale with her immaculate grey Stennerskeugh Smoke put to a quality traditional vehicle.

In the lunch break the FPS Display Team portrayed the story of the breed in times past and present along with its links with the Queen and her family, and this was followed by a parade of past Champions of the Stallion Show.

Grateful thanks to the Hasell-McCosh family, Penny Randell, competitors, stewards and all the volunteers who so generously gave their time to make it such a successful and enjoyable day.

The Society, celebrating our Centenary this year, held our 49th Breed show in the beautiful surroundings of Dalemain House near Ullswater, Cumbria. We welcomed members from Denmark, Sweden, the USA, and the Netherlands, whose daughter Fell Pony Society (NFPS) is celebrating its 25th anniversary this year. This was marked by a presentation of a beautiful commemorative rosette and the Centenary book 'A Century of Fells'; the NFPS in turn presented FPS President Christine Morton with a beautiful hand-painted plate to record the joint celebrations. The Society also invited all past Presidents to join the celebrations. There was a happy celebratory atmosphere, and many tourists joined the crowd to watch the ponies competing in the afternoon sun.

This much admired, very typey mare came out on top in the very strong class of in hand mares 4-7 years old, judged by Roy Ottink from the Netherlands.

His decision was entirely ratified by the award of the supreme championship later in the day.

Gilly Chippendale's lovely yearling, Lammerside Hazel, took the overall reserve supreme. Gilly also won the class for two-year-old fillies with Hazel's elder sister Lammerside Eclipse.

Other winners in hand included Frances Hoggarth and Banksgate Elidor who took the geld mares over eight years and reserve champion female. John Cockbain won the class for three-year-old fillies with Carrock Daenerys, and Edwin Winder won the trophy for the best three year old bred by a native heath breeder with Dalewin Willow. Dalewin ponies also ensured that Lunesdale Black Ice II won the stallion progeny with Uptown Jen, Uptown Girl and Willow all representing this lovely stallion. Eileen Walker's prolific Rackwood Magic won the group class for mare progeny, represented by Rackwood Aurora, Black Magic and Magic's Finale. A previous champion, the beautiful Murthwaite Magic Moment won the veterans in hand for Joanna Minns.

It was lovely to see six foals forward on the day, and the Potter family won the classes for the mare with colt foal at foot with Murthwaite Westerly, and the best overall foal with her colt foal. Eileen Walker won the class for the mare with a filly foal with Rackwood Black Magic, whose foal Rackwood Hermione won the filly foal class.

The in hand classes for geldings and youngstock were judged by David Wilkinson who awarded the in hand gelding championship to Sally Atkinson's ten-year-old Catterlen Gary's Lad with Courtney Savage's four-year-old homebred gelding Deepghyll Mighty Joe in reserve. Matthew Fearon's colt Setmabanning Poldark won the yearling class and the youngstock reserve championship. Patsy Drake's Crowtree Gideon won the class for three year old geldings.

In the ridden rings the overall championship went to Olivia Swales, who had a fabulous day with Dalefoot Amber II. This lovely twelve-year-old mare won the open riding class for mares and the HOYS qualifier under judges Beverley Hodgson and Chris Grant, but as Amber had already qualified, the ticket went to Townend Faithful and Belle Errington-Anderson. Reserve champion ridden, and best young handler, went to Hollie McGauley and Rundales Trooper, winners of the class for juniors under 18 years and the junior ridden championship, with Georgina Mallinson and Cargenwater Casanova in reserve.

Other juniors winning their classes included sisters Sarah and Mary Bell who won the best turned out and lead rein classes with Lownthwaite Heidi under judge Melissa Kreuzer, who had travelled from the USA. Imogen Cockbain won the first ridden class with Carrock Elsa. Emily Cheetham won the under 14 years class with Bracklinn Sam and also won the young judges class.

Ivy Wrigley at just three years old made everyone smile by winning the fancy dress class with Murthwaite Ripley.

The novice ridden championship went to Anna Metcalfe with Unwins Storm, who had also won the traditional ridden for stallions and geldings; with Bethan Lewis and novice mare winner, Lunesdale Forget Me Not, in reserve.

Other winners in the ridden classes included Moathouse Jack The Lad who won the nursery novice for Mandy Jackson; Townend Elfin and Abby Cockbain who took the mares traditional walk and trot; and Rosefell T Reg and Alex Robinson who won the open stallions/geldings.

## Tributes to Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II

In September over 100 Fell ponies gathered throughout the UK, from Aberdeenshire to Somerset, and everywhere in between, to say Goodbye and Thank You to the Fell Pony Society's late Patron, Her Majesty The Queen.



Her Majesty had a life-long love of Fell ponies, and the Fell pony community collectively came together to pay our respects, to demonstrate our affection and to provide support to each other as we mourned. Joined by other representatives of the equine world, many riders, drivers, handlers, and ponies attended church blessings, while others gathered together and took part in memorial parades and longer rides in their local area in honour of Her Maiesty.

Her Majesty the Queen was a wonderful ambassador for the Fell pony. She graciously agreed to become Patron of the Fell Pony Society in 1982 and remained an active supporter and benefactor until her sad passing. It is testament to her love of our local native ponies that she chose her beloved Fell ponies to feature in her official photographic portraits to mark both her emergence from Covid lockdown and her 96th birthday.

In 2016, the year of Her Majesty's 90th birthday, Mary Longsdon, President of the FPS, had the wonderful idea to take 90 Fell ponies to Windsor to celebrate with our Patron. Interest from members exceeded all expectations and 135 riders and ponies applied to attend. The Society considered having a ballot to reduce the number to the planned 90, but when this was mentioned, The Queen said that she wanted nobody to be left out, and all who wanted should be able to attend. The members, who had travelled from all over the country and some from Europe, provided a Guard of Honour through Windsor Park and The Queen took the time to talk with many of the members and admired their lovely ponies. She smiled throughout and after the event she said that this had been one of her most special birthday presents.

In May this year forty ponies, one for each year of Her Majesty's patronage, paraded at Windsor Horse Show to celebrate her Platinum Jubilee and the Centenary of the FPS. The parade was led by Lady Louise Windsor who drove a pair of Fell ponies and carried the Society's Centenary pennant.

The Society was deeply honoured that, despite Her Majesty's much-reported mobility issues, she was able to attend the show and appeared delighted by the Society's tribute. Society representatives Peter Boustead and Jane Rawden presented her with gifts to mark the celebrations, and Her Majesty presented the Society with a signed copy of her Platinum Jubilee photograph featuring two of her Bybeck Fell ponies.

We hope that Her Majesty's Fell Pony legacy will continue well into the future with the involvement of Lady Louise and her family, and we await the news on who will pick up the reins of Patronage.

May she rest in peace.





# **CENTENARY CELEBRATIONS**

The Society has celebrated its Centenary with an exciting variety of events and we were thrilled to be sharing our anniversary year with two anniversaries of our Patron, Her Majesty The Queen.

Not only was it 100 years since the Society was founded and 70 years since Her Majesty ascended the throne, it was also exactly 40 years since Her Majesty agreed to become Patron of the Society; and she had honoured the Society and its members with her continued support ever since. Additionally, the late Duke of Edinburgh competed in horse driving trials for many years at National level with a four in hand team of Fell ponies, and presented the Society with The Edinburgh Awards which are presented by the Society each year for excellence in driving.

The Centenary officially launched in the middle of May at The Royal Windsor Horse Show, where the FPS was honoured and delighted to be part of Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee celebrations. Forty ponies travelled from around the country to parade in front of Her Majesty and thank her for her generous patronage. The parade, led by Lady Louise Windsor in her late Grandfather's carriage, included youngsters in hand through to seasoned veterans with a variety of skills - from showing, to cross country and hunting, dressage, carriage driving and side saddle; as well as all-round family ponies.

Her Majesty was presented with specially commissioned gifts to say thank you for all the support that she has provided as Patron; and in celebration of the Platinum Jubilee and the Society's Centenary year. These included Sue Millard's celebratory book 'A Century of Fells' which provides a fascinating history of the Fell pony and the Society's first 100 years, compiled from material generously made available from private collections, and in the County archives. The Queen also received a silk headscarf, depicting a painting of Her Majesty's Carltonlima Emma by professional artist Laura Pennell, taken from a photograph by Bob Langrish. To add a decorative centre to the scarf, the flower of the Grass of Parnassus, the County flower of Cumbria, was placed on a background of lilac blending into scarlet and edged with gold, to represent Her Majesty's racing colours. The scarf was printed and hand finished in Worcestershire, and the Society is grateful to Laura and to Bob, and to Samuel Petty of David Watson Silk Printers for his design expertise and help in providing such a fitting and beautiful gift; and for allowing a limited edition of scarves to be reproduced for sale. Her Majesty also received the Society's 'Queen's Award' for her ongoing promotion of the Fell pony breed. In return, Her Majesty gave the Society a signed copy of her Jubilee portrait photograph with the two grey Bybeck ponies, Katie and Nightingale.

Society members were over the moon to be part of the parade. Stacy Longrigg, who made the long journey from Cumbria with her pony Conway Carole's Legacy, described it as overwhelming, emotional and a once-in-a-lifetime experience that she was thrilled to be part of. Helen Gallagher had a nearly 600-mile round trip from South Shields with her homebred Hillhead Whiskey, stopping off on the way with Gaynor Wareham who has Hillhead Port Ellen. Helen said that there was a fabulous atmosphere at RWHS and she felt very privileged to be part of it; adding that she had enjoyed herself so much that she now plans to make the trip to Windsor every year.

On the following day the FPS Stallion & Colt Show took place at Dalemain, Ullswater, where the Society's Display Team entertained the crowd with a very enjoyable and educational performance with commentary by Sue Millard. The display covered the history of the Fell pony from being the 'Maid of all work' on Cumbrian farms, mounts of both Border Reivers and Knights, and the pack ponies essential in the distribution of goods throughout the UK; to today's versatile all round, multipurpose family ponies. Also of great interest was the commentary on the history of the Society including the early support of King George V, who donated money to the Society to cover the withdrawal of the War Office's Stallion Premiums scheme, and bought Fell mares in the 1930s that formed the nucleus of the Balmoral Fell ponies bred by Her Majesty.

During the Display the Team formally received the Centenary Pennant, which had been on the royal carriage at Windsor the previous day. It was presented by the FPS President Christine Morton, and Sarah Charlton, and their grandchildren. It was Sarah who came up with the original idea for the pennants, after seeing a local news article about a firm making flags for the Euros; and also for the headscarf, because she had seen Her Majesty on TV observing a special rose being planted at Windsor and noticed she had a folded up headscarf in her hand.

Another very special part of the Stallion show was a parade of past champions led by the 2022 champion Heltondale Prince V. The six past champions looked absolutely stunning as they trotted around the ring to a commentary that provided details of each pony. They were: Murthwaite Look At Me, champion in 2002, 2003, 2004; Carrock I'm Your Man, champion in 2005, 2006, 2007; Lunesdale Warlord, champion in 2014; Boutime Wooster, champion in 2015; Lunesdale Black Ice II, champion in 2016, 2018, 2019 and Murthwaite Wanted Man, champion in 2017.

May also saw the launch of an educational film, "The Fell Pony: Type and Conformation" that has been created to study breed requirements of the Fell pony. It provides an insight into why it is so important to continue to uphold the original aim of the Society to 'keep pure the old breed of pony'. The Society is very fortunate to have within its membership the Film Producer and Director Tom Lloyd, breeder of the Hades Hill ponies. Tom has done a fantastic job with this film, going well beyond the initial brief, to create a timeless and magical piece of work that the Society can be proud of for the next hundred years.

The Stallion Show also officially launched the Society's '100 Mile Centenary Challenge', which provides an opportunity for anyone with access to a Fell pony to join the celebrations over the year by completing 100 miles with their pony, either riding, driving, or walking. The only stipulation is that the mileage is completed by 30th November 2022. Some senior members with older ponies have joined together as a team and they and some of the Endurance riders had already managed to clock up the required total by the date of the show. Many of those who completed the challenge by July received celebratory rosettes at the grand celebratory ball at The Castle Green Hotel, Kendal, on 13th August. Area Groups will be awarding rosettes at their own events later in the year and all other completers will receive theirs by post, when time permits the FPS Office staff to pack them up.

To the delight of the Centenary Committee the Challenge has been a massive success, and everyone is enjoying the camaraderie and motivation that it has inspired. A dedicated Facebook page - FPS 100 Miles Centenary Challenge, has been

set up for participants to share information and photographs of the glorious rides that are taking place in the beautiful countryside of the UK and beyond.

Emma Tilson, who usually rides alone with her pony Murthwaite Frost but loves exploring and meeting like-minded people, invited other riders to join her at Escrick Park Rideways in York. The response through the Facebook page was immediate, and 13 riders met to hack around the beautiful estate route and clock up another 7 miles. It was a fabulous way to catch up with old friends, make new ones and enjoy lots of Fell pony chat, and now other rides are planned.



## Fell Pony Society Centenary – Stud Visits

As part of the Centenary celebrations, several Fell Pony studs and owners opened their doors and invited guests to come along and visit their ponies. As well as an opportunity to learn more about our wonderful breed, the visits proved to be great social events and provided an opportunity to enjoy lovely days out in the beautiful Cumbrian countryside with like-minded people. Many thanks to all the hosts.

### Visit to the Brackenbank, Rundales and Peepings Ponies

The visit to see the Brackenbank, Rundales and Peepings Ponies (photos, p52-53) took place on what was probably the hottest day of the year in Cumbria.

The visit started at the Wilkinsons' at Brackenbank, in the beautiful village of Murton near Appleby, where we were able to meet in the village hall and enjoy a picnic lunch before wandering through the fields to meet the Brackenbank ponies in their beautiful, peaceful setting, nestling under the peaks of the Pennines.

The mares and foals were in super condition and appeared to enjoy the unexpected attention from all the visitors. Lots of photographs were taken of the foals as they frolicked in the sunshine.

Due to the heat, and the demanding walk required, several visitors chose not to make the trip up onto the fell to see the semi-feral Peepings and Rundales ponies. Some of those who made the journey up the long stony path reported that they had felt like they needed oxygen, but, as well as seeing the ponies, they were rewarded with the most magnificent view of the Lake District mountains. Fortunately, the whereabouts of the ponies had been established in advance and they had been secured in some old sheep pens where grass was plentiful, so they were in a convenient place for the visitors who braved making their way up onto the fell in the searing heat.

David Howe identified each of the ponies in turn and discussed their breeding and their progeny. Most had lived on the fell all their lives and had had very little handling but didn't appear to be troubled by the visitors. They were all in excellent order, including Rundales Betty who was the oldest at 27 years old. Some of the visitors were delighted when David was able to identify the dams and other relatives of their own ponies. Several of us were in no hurry to leave such a beautiful peaceful place and those who remained until the end witnessed the most wonderful, magical, sight of the ponies returning to the fell, single file, led by the older mares who dictated the route and the pace.

#### **Carrock Stud Visit**

The Cockbain family welcomed visitors from as far as the USA, Denmark, Holland, Sweden to see their ponies as part of the Centenary celebrations (p51). Imogen Cockbain (14) said, 'It was lovely to meet so many passionate pony people and I hope to meet them again one day.'

Imogen added that she thoroughly enjoyed participating in the 100 miles with a Fell Centenary challenge, and said, 'It has been a lot of fun and has got me out riding my pony even more. Through the 100 miles challenge I got the chance to meet other members like Jo Abrahmson and Flo Lloyd who came to our farm on the Jubilee weekend for a ride around our farm. I feel like I have really achieved something by completing the challenge and would like to say a big Thank You to all those who helped come up with the idea and make the challenge possible.'

#### Lownthwaite Stud Visit

Liz Whitley was amongst those who attended the Lownthwaite stud visit (p54), which is run by FPS President Christine Morton and her family. Liz reports that Christine and her daughter Alison greeted the guests at their homes in Gamblesby with refreshments and

gave them time to peruse the displays that the family had created. These included lots of information about the history of the Lownthwaite stud, along with Fell pony breed history. There were three competitions - name the bit; name the artefact; and a judging competition.

The visitors spent time wandering among the mares and met the stallion Waverfoot Warrior who was inside the building and talking with anyone who spent time with him. They then travelled to the farm at Lownthwaite, where they were able to see Greenholme Icarus and more of the mares; after which some of the visitors ventured up the fell to see the young ponies, though they could only be viewed through binoculars as they sensibly remained very high up the hill, keeping cool and away from the flies.

Christine's chosen charity this year is The Moredun Foundation Equine Grass Sickness Fund, which is the only registered charity in the UK raising funds specifically for research into grass sickness. The charity plans to make use of new modern technologies to research this dreadful disease, that still has no preventative vaccine or cure, despite being first recorded over 100 years ago. Due to the generosity of her guests Christine was able to donate £60 to the appeal.

### Helmside Fell Ponies Open Day

Nicola Evans and her cheerful gang of helpers brought 15 of her Fell ponies home from their various conservation grazing sites to meet Fell pony enthusiasts at her Open day (p51). As well as seeing the ponies and enjoying lots of Fell pony chat over refreshments on a baking hot summer's day, visitors were able to look around the family's beautiful garden, enjoy artwork in the barn, and admire the spacious view of Kendal and the mountains beyond.

Visitors were able to have a go, or spectate, with a horse agility course laid out for the ponies in hand or under saddle and a fun time was had by all.

## FPS Display Team 2022

The Team has had its busiest year to date, starting with practices early in the year then attending a total of 10 events, a couple of which were over two days.

Two of the Team attended the Sandringham Fell Pony Show in late April, on behalf of the Society, with the Sales and Information Tent. We were given a very warm welcome.

The Stallion Show in mid May was next, where we were proud to be part of the Centenary Launch. The end of the month saw us all at Country Fest, performing 2 Displays each day over the two day event, as well as manning the Information Tent.



In June a few of us provided pony drawn transport and Escort for the Anthorn Jubilee Queen and her attendants. The Information Tent went to Penrith Show in mid July, then it was down to Coniston Country Fair the following week with the whole Team.

We were invited to take the Tent to Cartmel Show in early August, appropriately, as it was their 150th Show. The last two weekends of the month saw us at the Lakeland Country Fair at Torver, and Blackcombe Country Fair - and then came September!

We had been invited, quite out of the blue, to attend Burghley International Horse Trials, held on the first weekend in September. Huge excitement, huge panic, and as it turned out, a bit of a nightmare. Communication with the Event Office was scant, and although emails were sent and messages left, we got no reply. A couple of days before the big day we emailed to say, "Sorry, if you can't give us more information, we're not coming," and within minutes we were told they wanted us but there was no stabling! Luckily a message came in reply to our pleas on the Team's Facebook page, offering us not just amazing stables and parking at Oakridge Arena, but also use of the indoor arena which was massive, and the horse wash, solarium and, importantly for the humans, showers and a Bar. So off we went.

Burghley was all it promised to be. We had a short wait before our turn in the ring and were inundated with people asking if they could stroke the ponies and/or take photos. We were asked lots of questions in that short time and it was lovely to see the interest that people had in Fell Ponies. Once in the ring the ponies all behaved impeccably while Sue Millard gave the commentary.

Actual Ring Time was very short, which only allowed a parade of several laps instead of our usual Display performance, but the wave of applause that followed us round, and the many comments afterwards, made everything worthwhile.



After Burghley we had literally one day to turn round and repack, before heading to the Westmorland County Show for three days, one to set up the Tent, then two days at the Show, including a Display on the Wednesday. That brought us to the end of a fun packed summer of promoting our wonderful ponies, talking to hundreds of people about their own ponies and their memories of ponies, and helping them in some cases with information about possible future purchases. Sadly, the news of the Queen's death tempered the euphoria as we all returned home.

So who are the Display Team? We are 20 like minded people, aged from late teens to 70s. 4 of us are Fell Pony Council members and the rest are ordinary, or rather, "Extraordinary" Society Members. The newest Team members have gained in confidence and bravery during the season, often stepping in at short notice to understudy roles when the original human or equine actors were ill or unable to travel with us. The ponies, as you would expect, have displayed great versatility as most of them played at least 2 roles, and on some occasions more.

This year we have travelled a total of 19,222.4 miles - if we'd set off directly west from the FPS Office we'd have gone one and a half times round the world! We have worked a total of 274 days on behalf of the Fell Pony Society and Fell Ponies. That equates to an average of 961.12 miles and 13.7 days per person, with one individual spending 30 days (probably more) and covering 2595 miles (again, probably more).

Our social media posts are usually seen by around 1,500 people, and based on press releases by event organisers and their own web sites and social media we've calculated that the number of show spectators with the opportunity to see the Display this summer and learn more about the ponies was an amazing 102,500.

And guess what, we already have four events booked for 2023. If you feel brave after reading about our exploits: we welcome new members!



### **Breeders Survey**

I would like to remind everyone about the Breeders Survey.

We would like to hear from ALL BREEDERS, not just the hill breeders: if you breed, we want to know how you keep your ponies and the kind of land you're using. It is not a "head count" but an attempt to gather first-hand facts and figures about the type of ground our members keep their ponies on and how they manage their ponies.

Your responses will enable the FPS to give much more accurate information during discussions with Government bodies and environmental organisations, not only how many ponies are running on the fell commons, but how many are kept on fell allotments and intakes and on other types of enclosed fell or rough grazing areas, and at what times of year, and also any other types of grazing systems that they use.

We would like to know more about the types of problems and also successes that breeders are having, and in turn we can use that information to help other breeders in similar situations, or indeed, people who are just starting out as breeders.

Repeat: I would ask that all breeders complete the survey. Your information and experiences are as important as those of anyone else who breeds Fell ponies. Sharing that is your way to help FPS to help you and others.

### **Conservation Grazing Sites**

Lastly, I would ask you all to keep an eye out for any possible grazing sites that might be suitable for our ponies to go onto. Grazing sites don't usually come looking for us, it is a matter of being proactive and finding suitable areas and projects.

### Meres Jamboree - A Rescue Fell's Tale

In August 2021 I found myself looking for a rescue companion after losing my 33 year old veteran 'Toby' whom I'd had for 21 years. I was looking for a small older gelding who would stay home alone when I take my ridden cob out.

Happily, the Blue Cross had a pony that fitted the bill. Unfortunately he was also called Toby. After some soul searching, I decided to take this as a sign that he was meant to find us - and so began this little rescue's tale.

This Toby is a registered Fell, who was being rehomed as a companion only, due to a history of bolting both when ridden and driven. While home checks were booked and handling videos were made, I browsed the internet in search of his history and information on the breed.

2022 was to be the Fell Pony Society's Centenary, with a host of events being organised including a 100 mile challenge to be completed ridden, driven or inhand over the year. A parade of Fells at the Royal Windsor Horse Show was planned because the Queen is patron of the Society and Fells are a Royal family favourite. I'd never had a registered pony before and the FPS website and facebook groups were full of interesting stories and pictures. Wouldn't it be fun to join in some of the 2022 events with my new little Fell!

Toby Fell had EMS and laminitis when he was handed over to the Blue Cross, but they worked hard to get weight off him, and I knew from experience with my old Toby that working him would be the best way to keep him a healthy weight. I started my bonding with him by taking him for walks inhand around the field, where he behaved impeccably so off out we went, round the block to explore.

On Fell's third day with us Marion from Equestrian Bowen came to give Alfie cob his regular back treatment. Fell got a quick MOT. Marion's approach is holistic, and firmly based on the theory that a healthy gut equals a healthy horse. She recommended feeding him Ocean Feed, a seaweed balancer perfect for fatties, fed soaked with just a handful of Thunderbrooks hay cobs - a mix of lots of grasses needed to maintain/create a healthy gut. Some herbs were also recommended to give his kidneys a helping hand, because he was drinking more than Alfie and was touchy around his kidney area.

By day 8, with sensible Alfie cob by his side, Fell managed a ride and lead hack out with us. As with his inhand walks he was interested, rational and well behaved. Maybe I wouldn't have to walk all those 100 miles of the centenary celebrations on foot alongside him...

8 weeks later Marion was back for a double appointment this time, and Fell watched Aflie have his back done - something I also did with the farrier and later the dentist too. Fell watches Alfie, learns it's ok, then gets his turn. Pleased with changes she could see in him from the Ocean Feed and herbs, Marion treated him, recommended he saw the equine dentist, and they were both booked in for another treatment.

By his second back treatment Fell had been doing ride and lead and inhand walks sensibly for 4 months. He loved his outings and hadn't put hoof wrong; I was daring to dream that maybe I could try riding him. Marion saw nothing wrong with him physically so I had a chat with Sally our Blue Cross home visit lady, who liaised with the centre at Oxford, and we all agreed if he could be ridden it would help keep him a healthy weight.

My riding was assessed by the Blue Cross and a vetting was booked. Fell flew through his lameness trot up, flexion tests and a physical examination. My trusted saddler found us a well-fitting saddle.

Then super slowly, day after day we made progress, tacked him up, walked him around, leant over him, sat on him, got led around the field, rode him around the field, sensible

Alfie escorted us down the track, and by the end of 2 weeks we were doing half hour hacks in walk and trot around the local woods solo. I was elated and so proud of all our work

We'd joined the Fell Pony Society in January 2022, and started the 100 mile challenge on foot. By March we'd clocked up 50 miles, most of them ridden, without any incidents.

I trailered him to my instructor's with Alfie there holding his hoof, and we worked them together in her arena. As always, his nervous excitement was containable, he relaxed with reassurance from me and Alfie and worked sensibly. Next was a little local in hand show, then an in-hand agility clinic, followed by a ridden pole clinic with just

one other young horse. Every single outing, I would come home beaming as he tried his hardest, took reassurance and never put a hoof wrong. Every single outing, he got better and better.

By now I was starting to dream bigger. Entries opened for the Royal Windsor Horse show, so I decided to enter the inhand Fell class that would take place on the same day the Parade of Fells was planned.

We went to a showing clinic to learn some ring craft, started planning our tack and clothing,



then went to a bigger inhand show and he came away with a first! Almost more importantly, he behaved with all the hustle and bustle and even a rearing pony in our ring.

That evening I had a phone call with the organiser of the Fell Parade at Windsor, and after hearing our story she kindly allowed us to try joining the parade into the Castle Arena, to be one of the Fell ponies that get presented to the Queen to thank her for her support and patronage of the breed.

All that's left to do is make it past the carriage driving class (?!) all the scary screens and trade tents, and then finally the naughty-pony steward on the gate into the Castle Arena!

This little Fell has helped fixed a couple of broken hearts and taken me to shows I would never have dreamed to enter before.

Every time I say I am lucky to have found him, I get corrected that he was lucky to find me, but I have absolutely loved our journey so far and honestly do feel lucky he came into our lives. I wasn't really into showing and would never have been brave enough to enter a show like Windsor without this little Fell coming into my life.

We both got lucky to find each other, thanks to the Blue Cross trusting me with him, he's got a new ridden life ahead of him beyond Windsor. We're now at 70 miles out of our 100 challenge for 2022 and I can't wait to see what else we get up to together.

# Fell Pony Harry excels at RDA National Championships

at Hartpury College Gloucestershire, on 15 and 16 July 2022

When the Team from Riding for the Disabled Isle of Man flew in with two riders who had qualified to compete at the Riding for the Disabled (RDA) National Championships, a whole team of heroes went above and beyond to achieve fantastic success.

One of these heroes was Annie Wordley's beautiful Fell Pony Brackenbank Flash Harry (or "Harry" to his friends) who was kindly loaned to rider Sarah Kelly, who has Cerebral Palsy, for her dressage class as it was not feasible to bring their own horses. Sarah had never ridden Harry before and, although every effort is made to match horses to their riders (including their disability), no-one can be totally sure of suitability until they try the horse.

Despite concerns that Sarah only had less than half an hour to get to know her ride, everyone was delighted and relieved that Harry and Sarah clicked instantly with both taking everything in their stride. "Riding new horses for dressage can be difficult because you don't know the horse or how they'll react and this can affect my tightness, but riding Harry was honestly the most relaxed I have ever been while doing a dressage test," commented Sarah. They went onto achieve a fabulous score of 65.27%. Harry is known to be a lovely pony but he proved himself to be "an absolute dream to ride", as Sarah said afterwards.

Gwen Wordley (Harry's owner's mum) further explained, "Cerebral Palsy causes Sarah to have some involuntary sudden movements and she doesn't have much leg or wrist strength. Harry had never experienced this before. Unfortunately, Sarah didn't have her usual ladder reins, which make a massive difference. Luckily Harry has been schooled from the ground. Sarah got on Harry 20 minutes before her test. I told Sarah to use her voice so "Harry Walk", "Harry Trot". For the 10 metre circle, we asked her to put as much weight as she safely could to the left and then use the command "Harry Over" and then "Harry Walk On." Gwen was clearly so proud of both Sarah and Harry.

Sarah said she worked so well with Harry because "he listens to voice commands and wasn't distracted by anything. He had such a calming effect on me that I finished my competition with a huge smile" and that "If I could take Harry home I would. I can't thank Gwen and Annie enough for Harry, and all the hard work they have done with him really shows, thank you again."

Ben, a hearing impaired and autistic rider from the Isle of Man, also rode Harry in May for the North West Qualifiers. Due to the heatwave, Ben wasn't able to compete on Harry for the Championships, but had this to say about earlier this year: "I finally got to meet Harry two days before the National Qualifiers in Southport. I was excited but nervous about riding a new horse. However, it was also the most relaxed ride I've ever had. I felt like I had a really good connection with him." Ben was disappointed to miss out on another chance to ride Harry, but feels "I would love to own a Fell Pony, and would recommend them. I look forward to riding Harry again."

The trip to the National Championships was an enormous success and it was great to see a Fell Pony excelling in an RDA role.

# The Greenholme Shandy Annual FPS Trec Award



The purpose of this award is to encourage Fell pony owners to have a go at Trec and prove how our versatile ponies can hold their own against all breeds.

Trec is a relatively new discipline which was originally called Le Trec but is now known in the UK as Trec. The governing body is Trec GB. Full summer Trecs are usually held over two days and can be competed solo or with a friend as a pair. I started competing in 2016 with Fiona Dillon (see us above) on the fabulously named Carsington Nethermost Pike II.

A Trec competition comprises:

POR - orienteering through the countryside on your Fell once you have copied a master map by eye within a designated time, usually 12 minutes. The route varies from 12 - 18 miles depending on the level of competition and has checkpoints to find along the route. The catch is that you don't know where they are and will only find them if you have accurately navigated your way around the route!

MA - control of the paces, basically slowest canter up a marked corridor of up to 150 M in length and 2 -2.5 metres long, and fastest walk back. The corridor may be straight, curved, uphill etc. it is trickier than it sounds!

PTV - the obstacle phase with 16 obstacles all designed to reflect the hazards you might meet when hacking out, with up to 10 points awarded per obstacle. All obstacles are optional so you can opt out of one or more if you wish and still complete and sometimes win.

Winter Trec only requires 10 obstacles and no POR phase.

It is great fun and I am quite passionate about Trec's benefits, especially with green ponies. I would have sold Shandy if I hadn't discovered Trec as we didn't gel at all for two years. Trec training has led to my success with her in affiliated dressage and long distance and I can genuinely say that it has helped make her the pony of a lifetime.

# 'Celebrating Fell Ponies' at The Old Courthouse, Shap

The Old Courthouse at Shap staged an art exhibition and other events throughout August in celebration of the Centenary of the Fell Pony Society. Fifteen different artists displayed their work in a variety of media including felt and glass work. Also on display was a large reproduction of a scene circa 1920 at Brough Hill Fair, kindly on loan from John Dunning. It shows Robert Dunning, centre left, who was a childhood friend of the local artist Donald Wood who painted the original. This was the horse sale at the height of its importance. Before mechanisation, the Army and the coal mines were the principal buyers for the small working horses from the fells.



The exhibition attracted many visitors, some of whom had travelled from the USA and Europe for the Centenary events. Visitors were particularly impressed by the Fell pony artwork from pupils of Shap Primary School (*previous page*). In addition to artwork there were information boards relating to Fell ponies and a display of Packhorse Poetry, with poems written by the Old Courthouse Writing Group to accompany the images. The images included a series of souvenir postcards featuring pack horse routes that have been produced as part of the Westmorland Dales 'A Way Through' project and funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund. There was also a space for visitors to sit down and chat or watch Fell Pony related DVDs and see the series of photographs taken by many of those who had taken up the Centenary 100 mile challenge with their Fell ponies.

Local artist Christine Longmire, who had several artworks in the exhibition, spent a couple of afternoons at Shap working on a new painting. The Fell pony themed workshops proved popular. Jane Bardgett showed participants how to create an animal portrait in

needle felt. Artist, Alex Jakob-Whitworth, who also had artwork on display, held two workshops; 'Drawing a Fell Pony in Charcoal' and 'Tackling the Colourful Darks of a Fell Pony'.

The talks that took place were also well supported. Author, Sue Millard, was joined by fellow Fell pony enthusiasts Barbara Bell, Sarah Charlton and Clive Richardson to chat about the making of the "Centenary Book" A Century of Fells. The book is dedicated to the Society's Patron, HM Queen Elizabeth II, and celebrates both her Platinum Jubilee and the Society's Centenary. It uses sequences of vintage and modern photographs of many families of ponies to show how the breed has developed over the past hundred years. Many attended the evening with Peter Boustead, Chairman of the Fell Pony Society, who discussed what he looks for when judging a Fell pony in a presentation that aligned conformation, type, and the way of going with the ponies' natural habitat and purpose.

An appreciative audience gathered for the final event, a Social Evening, where Bill Lloyd, musician and raconteur, compered 'A Way Through - pony travels through Westmorland told in story, poetry, music and song'. Bill spoke of the vital role that pack horses had played in the economy of the country throughout the Middle Ages and up until the industrial revolution, being used to transport produce and goods including wool, salt, slate, graphite and lead ore. Evidence remains of a network of packhorse routes across Cumbria and some of the pack horse bridges are still intact.

He recalled his boyhood home on a hill farm in Rossendale and described how his father, Walter, was always interested in the Fell pony as a working animal. He used a packsaddle and hessian sacks on his pony to carry coal home from a drift mine a mile away. He also used a pony and cart to spread muck and built a sledge (North American Indian pattern) to haul cattle feed and groceries up the hill to the farm in snowy weather.

Bill told of the eccentric but respected pack-woman, Ailse o' Fussers, who drove a string of up to 20 ponies (galloways) along the ancient trackways of Limer's Gate, carrying coal one way and lime on the return. He brought with him several artefacts that had belonged to his father Walter Lloyd including Ailse's bell and a replica of one of Ailse's pack saddles that Walter had made.

Jean Scott-Smith read 'The Song of the Packhorsemen'. It was written by W.T. Mcintyre for The Westmorland Pageant performed in 1927 by Westmorland Federation of Women's Institute. She then spoke about the two Corpse Roads, one from Mardale and the other from Hardendale, that were used to bring the dead for burial, carried strapped to a pony's back, to Shap church.

Sue Millard read her own poem 'Voices in the Stones' from her *Galloway Gate* collection which alludes to a long drovers' route that ran from Scotland through Shap and past her house in Greenholme en route to the Lancashire towns. Sue followed this with a light-hearted song she had written extolling the virtues and otherwise of a Fell pony she had owned, known as 'Mr T'.

Bill told of his father establishing the Hades Hill Fell pony herd when he bought two mares from Sarge Noble in 1957 and how he had asked for a terrier for 'luck'. Bill picked up the theme of working ponies with examples of the Hades Hill ponies being used for logging, coppicing and to pull the Whitworth rushcart. Walter and the herd moved to Cumbria in 1985 and Bill's brother Tom now uses Fells as pack ponies to trek with visitors on the high fells, such as High Street and the Howgills. Bill closed the first half with a powerful rendition of his emotive poem 'Pennine Horseman'.

Vyv Wood-Gee opened the second half with an insight into three of the many rides she has done in the area of Westmorland with her Fell ponies; travelling over Gatescarth Pass into Mardale when she rode the Coast to Coast route, riding the Corpse road from Mardale over into Swindale and on to Shap, and riding a circuit on the Crosby Ravensworth Fell with its limestone outcrops and pavements. Her enthusiasm and excitement for riding Fell ponies and connecting with the history of these old routes was obvious, always wondering, "What was their purpose? Who rode there centuries before?"

Ray Alderson shared his memories and pictures of Cowper Day horse sale held in Kirkby Stephen, which was at the height of its popularity in the 1960s when he worked for horse dealer and farmer Walter Tuer. Ray was one of those who on horseback helped to round up the ponies from the surrounding commons ready for the sale. On sale day they created a spectacle as up to a hundred ponies were led by Walter on horseback and guided by his outriders down through the main street of the town, causing many holdups with the cars and coaches passing through from the northeast en route to Blackpool Illuminations.

Two other colourful fixtures of the Westmorland events calendar, Appleby Fair and Brough Hill Fair, were brought to life by Bill in his final set. He sang a song about the road to the fair and shared memories of his father travelling by horsedrawn caravan pulled by Fell ponies from Rossendale up to Appleby Fair, accompanied by colourful images of Walter on the road.



Bill concluded with a song called 'Brough Hill Fair' accompanying himself on the banjo. The original version was written as a poem by Dorothy Una Ratcliffe with verses added by Bill to reflect more recent times. It was very apt that the large reproduction picture of 'Brough Hill Fair' by artist Donald Wood and on loan from John Dunning for the exhibition was hanging on the wall behind.

Janet Wood, Trustee at The Old Courthouse, Shap, thanked the Old Courthouse volunteers and everyone for their involvement in the evening and the exhibition, and



also acknowledged the Westmorland Dales Landscape Partnership Scheme, grant funded by National Heritage Lottery Fund, for their support.

Bill brought the evening to an end by piping the haunting 'Lament for Billy Alway'.

Many thanks to Janet, and the team at the Old Courthouse, for all the months of work behind the scenes that created such an impressive and enjoyable focus for the celebrations during the month.

# A busy month of May!

Preparations for Royal Windsor Horse Show got underway for later in that week. Bella and I had been invited in late January to join the FPS parade of 40 ponies to follow Lady Louise driving her Fell ponies that were formerly owned by the Late Duke of Edinburgh and had been bequeathed to her. This parade was to celebrate 100 years since the FPS had been formed as well as the Queen's Jubilee and her 40 years of Patronage. Our

invitation came about due to Bella and I being successful in the 2021 Pony Performance Awards. The parade was made up of Fell ponies from varied backgrounds, not just previous ridden show champions. It was a very well put together mix of ponies and Jane Rawden did a great job in getting us all organised.

I was torn between laughing and howling at her! So, after some work, we went back to the box to clean up properly and have a quick cuppa. Time soon went and we had to assemble, being informed that Her Majesty had indeed arrived on the showground, and told where we had to salute her.

My partner for the parade was the lovely Lesley Cook on her black mare. We had a short time walking round in our pairs in the collecting area and then quite quickly we were asked to assemble in our right order. We all moved up towards the main ring, made a circuit or two in the smaller collecting ring just outside, then we were off! Lesley and I grinned at each other and away we went.


