A Fell on Countryfile

Wellbrow Desperate Dan (Danny) became a t.v. star in February when he was ridden by BBC *Countryfile* presenter Matt Baker. In a feature on the Mary Towneley Loop of the Pennine Bridleway, Matt was seen riding Danny on a short section of the trail. En route he met up with Cosima Towneley, daughter of Mary,

Lady Towneley whose vision inspired the creation of the Pennine Bridleway. Julie Thompson of Natural England described how the ancient packhorse trails were now being opened for equestrian tourism. and Matt "bumped into" a mountain biker to show that this is a multi-user right of way. Matt finished his journey at Peers Clough Farm, which offers B&B for horses and riders on the Loop, and is the home of Peers Clough Packhorses.

Peers Clough Packhorses are a team of Fell ponies (Wellbrows Dan, Jake, Jim, Target and Bobby, and Heltondale Duchess) providing trekkers with an experience of moorland riding over ancient ways.

Despite having just been plucked from his winter field, Danny looked smart and eager, and behaved with the utmost patience and professionalism during his day of filming. Matt Baker was very impressed and said Danny felt

The Highland and Fell Pony Camp is great fun and very good for the ponies and their riders! This was the second annual camp to be held at The Linnels and generally agreed by all to have been a terrific success, which was undoubtedly due to the organisation by Jan and Chris Grant and Sarah Charlton. Jan and Chris started the camps four years ago for the North East area of the Highland Pony Enthusiasts and an invitation to the North East Area Fell Pony Group to join the second one resulted in Sarah Charlton so enjoying herself that the Charlton family offered the use of The Linnels for the following year's camp. An indication of the popularity of the camp is that the 25 places were fully booked within a day of the booking opening.

Camp was a bit of misnomer this vear everyone was fortunate to have a bed in a house. horsebox caravan or had found campers previous year that the nights can be rather chilly.

The camp starts with a ride on the Friday evening then instruction there is Saturday and Sunday morning culminating in competition on Sunday afternoon. The lucky twenty five assembled at The Linnels on the evening of Friday 30th April for the ride, which was split into three groups: a fast group for those eager for a

gallop Linnels' lovely fields, a slow group for young green ponies and those not used to group rides and a middle group happy to canter on and hop logs, but not flat out! We had lovely rides through the woods thanks to our leaders, Sarah, Ann and Juliette, and happy riders returned for a delicious supper provided by the Highland group.

Saturday morning saw everyone assembled in the barn (camp headquarters/ dining room / recreation room) for the briefing and to be divided into five groups of similar standard. Instruction covers flat work, show jumping and cross country, with each group managing to fit in a bit of everything over the day. Jan and her fellow instructors are very encouraging and helpful so that most people

find themselves doing more than they thought they were capable of. A look at the main field would show a group working at the dressage arena, another doing pole and grid work and a third at the show jumps. The fourth group would be in the manege and the fifth down on the cross country course. After the morning's work the ponies had a well earned rest in stables or paddocks while the riders tucked into a great lunch of freshly made sandwiches provided by a friend of Jan's, Also over lunch we had an informative talk from Eddie Scott of Virbac Animal Health on current trends in worming. The second lesson followed and in the early evening those of us staving were lucky to be able to listen to Vyv Wood Gee's memoirs of her epic trek along the route of the old drove roads from Skye Supper this evening was provided by the North East Fell Pony to Smithfield. group, namely by Eileen Walker and Ruby Williams who laid on a great spread. Afterwards we had a ceilidh, which is definitely the best way to spend a chilly evening in a barn and no one was allowed to sit around. I'm not sure if the dancing loosened stiff muscles or just finished them off.

Sunday morning we had the third lesson and prepared for the Fun Camp Competition in the afternoon, which is in the format of a one day event. Everyone competed within their own group at the level they were comfortable with so that some were doing the highest choice of jumps and others delighted to clear the smallest. The more capable groups completed a Preliminary dressage test while the others just did the walk and trot part. Before the camp Chris had sent an order form for clothing with the camp logo and ponies names - we were delighted to find that nearly everyone had ordered a polo shirt or hoodie with their pony's name on the back so we all wore them for the competition. Finally there was a prize giving with everyone receiving a rosette for their place in their group as well as a lovely commemorative rosette stamped with their pony's name.

It had been a great weekend in a very happy atmosphere and we had all learned a lot, even the weather had been kind to us. I know everyone was very appreciative of the work put into the weekend by Jan and Chris Grant and the Charltons, as well as the instructors, people who prepared meals and all the others who helped out to make the weekend such a success.

News from Overseas: Hessen Day 2011

Every year a different town in Hessen, a state in the centre of Germany, organises a festival or country fair which lasts for 10 days. You can find everything there. For example, this year in Oberursel there was an agricultural trade fair, exhibitions by universities, concerts by Brian Adams and Linkin Park, guests from all over the world and all local clubs, associations, schools, kindergartens, local government, armed forces, trade and industry were represented. Hessen Day in Oberursel attracted a total of 1.37 million visitors.

Fell Ponies were promoted at the section called "Nature Trail" with a herd of 15 ponies and 2 foals. In collaboration with the Hessen Pony Breeders' Association and Andreas Ruppel, whose ponies are well-known in Oberursel, we did our best to inform everyone in Hessen about the breed for 10 days solid. The Fell Pony has now

definitely got some more fans. Never before have so many Fell Ponies been presented as a herd to the German public.

The highlight for the kids was the baptism of the 2 foals. All children were invited to handin suggestions for their names.

At the end of the week we had over 600 sheets of paper in the barrel bearing names, and on the Day of the Horse 2 little girls became proud godmothers of Hochtaunus Ronja and H. Rocky.

Germany is still a developing country when it comes to knowledge about Fell Ponies. The two most frequently asked questions were:

"Why are they called Fell Ponies - do they have a different kind of coat?"

(The word "Fell" in German means coat or fur of an animal!)

"Wow, they look like Friesians. Are they related?"

Don't worry. We soon put people right on that score!

People and Ponies: Castlerigg Prince II

My childhood holidays were spent in Keswick, where I first met the Harrison family who bred registered Fell ponies under the prefix "Castlerigg." My "job" was to help catch and halter the mares and foals and to teach them to trot 'inhand' up and down the lane. Aged eight and not very tall, my little legs learnt to go quite fast with John Willie Harrison behind me with a shepherds crook and a loud "Geeedd-oop" encouraging foals to follow the mares. Over the years my sister and I competed in many Fell pony classes with the various progeny, both 'in-hand' and ridden. Ronnie and Gordon Harrison continued to breed a couple of foals a year and Prince came into the world in 1981. We met when he was 1 week old - a brown fluffy big eared bundle of fun - and I fell in love.

Meanwhile my mum and I had bought some old farm buildings at Wrea Green near Preston to renovate and create a riding school. Prince came to live with us in the bad winter of 1981/1982. I showed him in hand in all the youngstock classes - always in the top ribbons, but due to his boisterous and strong personality had

him gelded at 3! Keeping a stallion is sometimes not a good idea on a busy riding-school!

30 years later, both of us are still going strong - still have our own teeth and have not yet gone grey, but moving a little slower these days. It was decided to have a joint party for Prince and the Centre so Prince, wearing a flower garland around his neck, greeted his 150 guests in the indoor school - complete with bouncy castle, bacon butties, face-painting, games, competitions and pride of



place, a sponge cake 4ft long decorated as a carrot. The highlight of the day was Prince picking his favourite "Fairy Princess" from 20 little girls all dressed up. The winner, aged 2, wore a tiara and wings, a Snow-White lookalike dress and carrying a large wand, whilst the crowd sang "Happy Birthday" and he was showered with confetti.

He is still doing lessons, and has taught many riders many skills. Over the years I think everyone has worked with Prince in some way, his talents including side-saddle, teaching young instructors to lunge, vaulting, collecting for charities (dressed as a reindeer with antlers and red nose) and in his more serious life he excelled with our Riding for Disabled Riders and working on a daily basis. Prince could probably instruct the lessons without me - he knows every sound, word, action and is there for me at all times whether happy or sad and has always been a truly reliable friend. FIS Testing 2011

Council have agreed that the Society will continue to fund the FIS test for newly-licensed stallions, and for affected foals, in 2011. Owners must be members of the Society.

The original cost of the test, £40, has been affected by the increase in VAT from 17.5% to 20%. The new cost is £40.85. The Society will absorb the 85p increase for the rest of this year, so the cost of the test to owners remains at £40.

Amendments to FPS Regulations

The following Regulations have been amended by Council in 2011.

Regulation 1.1.6

Section (X) - contains ponies that have registered and licensed sires and registered dams but are of a colour other than black, brown, bay or grey and /or have an excess of white markings. Mis-marked ponies in this section may not be shown in In hand, Ridden or WHP classes at Fell Pony Society affiliated shows, but may participate in Fell Pony Society performance events (eg dressage, driving, endurance, performance trials etc.) They may also participate in the relevant sections of the Performance Points schemes but are not eligible for any premiums paid from the HBLB grant. Any foal by an unlicensed but registered sire and registered dam will go into Section (X) but, after proof of parentage by DNA testing, may transfer to the main section, subject to Council approval. Progeny of ponies in Section (X) may be registered in the main section provided they conform to the breed standard and have registered and licensed sires and registered dams. NB Colts are not eligible for an FPS stallion licence.

Regulation 3.1

Colours are black, brown, bay or grey. Other colours must be registered in Section (X). Ponies with white on the front feet and/or a blaze or stripe must be registered in Section (X). If in doubt, breeders should include a photograph of the foal with the application for registration. If it is subsequently found that a breeder has omitted to declare white markings, Council have the right to move that pony from the Main section to Section (X). This regulation to apply to foals born in 2011 onward and not to be applied retrospectively.



In the Media

Submissions for the Magazine

Photographs

The Magazine uses colour photographs for the covers, inside covers, or centre pages. I reduce photographs to black and white for the main pages.

Many new digital cameras can produce images that would print at the size of a daily newspaper, BUT bigger is not always better! Although large images are needed for the Calendar Competition (see next page). The widest image we print is 5.25 inches (13 cm) at 300 pixels per inch, and lots of others don't get the full width of a page, so your digital photograph does not need to be wider than 1600 pixels.

Please DO NOT send your digital image in a word-processed document or PowerPoint slideshow. It ruins the quality and makes a huge file for me to download and then throw away! Just send me a .jpg please—and only send it once. If I need a further copy I will ask for one.

Hard-copy commercial prints, from 5 inches wide up to A4 size, can be posted to me to be scanned. <u>Please</u> enclose an SAE if you want them returned.

Too-close photos with a huge head and tiny feet will not be used. They don't give a true impression of what a Fell (or a person!) should look like!

If you are taking a photo of your pony yourself, step one pace towards the quarters, and stand well back—remember that the camera can zoom

in—then the pony will stay in good shape in the picture.

Text

We would like informative articles to be around 1500 words. Pony news pieces should be about 400 words, usually with one good photo. We can be flexible about both, but your submission may have to be cut to fit the Magazine's content into 100 pages or less. Repetition, padded prose with very involved sentences, and multiple exclamation marks, will always be edited out.

Please double-check facts before sending, especially unusual names. I am constantly surprised by people who mis-spell their own pony's name.

There are very specific settings for the Magazine text which keep its "look" consistent, so please don't spend time on special layouts or fonts, because they won't fit and I will just remove them.

In particular, don't use tabs to create columns of show results, because they do not translate into the Magazine's shape and size. Simply list the items in a normal page of text. I will apply column formatting if it's needed. Don't include show entry numbers; they are meaningless in the Magazine. When you send me text or images, please indicate whether they are meant for the Magazine or the web site. It will save time for both you and me.

Our regular Magazine contributors, fortunately, are very good—thank you!
