

Both Ailie and Chris were huge supporters of our Society, serving on both Council and committees, and giving their time and expertise so generously to help us all.

The recession continues to be of concern to everyone. Our Society has made a loss for the second year and we need to be more careful with our housekeeping. We are extremely grateful to our Treasurer, Elizabeth, who has given a great deal of thought as to how we can create a more even balance of our finances.

On a brighter note, I would like to thank HRH The Duke of Edinburgh for his year as our President; we are very grateful for his generous support and enthusiasm. We have another excellent copy of our magazine, so many thanks to Sue Millard who also manages our website and helps with the publicity which is very ably organised by Claire Simpson, who keeps the Fell pony well to the fore on the national front.

I realise I have said this before, but the help received from our membership in various and vital ways that keep our Society and our ponies flourishing, is something of which we can all be extremely proud. My very sincere thank you, not only for this previous year, but also for the last ten years when I have had the great honour to be your Chairman.

Secretary's Report, Spring 2013

I'm writing this on 28 January and, as usual, we still have unresolved foal registrations from last year - maybe next year we could have them all sorted by the end of December? The number of registrations has fallen again with 348 foals registered and 3 still to complete. We have recently been notified by the RBST that we remain in Category 4, At Risk, for 2013. We have also recently received our grant from the HorseRace Betting Levy Board and are very grateful that we are still eligible for this.

DEFRA are still looking at the issue of quality and robustness of passports and we expect to hear from them about this later in the year.

Gwen Williamson has stepped down from dealing with our affiliations and I am very grateful to her for doing this job for so many years. I am also very pleased and grateful that her daughter, Helen Jones, has agreed to take over from her, keeping it in the family and being a big help to the office.

Borrowdale Shepherds' Meet and Show have written to the Society to say that they have decided not to include any Fell pony classes in future shows. They thanked the Society and members for their support over the years since the show was reintroduced in 1988, and wished members and the Society a successful 2013.

You will see from the accounts enclosed with this magazine that the Society has again made a loss in the last financial year. While this is perhaps to be expected in a time of recession, I have made some suggestions to Council about areas where we need to make changes and these are reflected in a new scale of fees and charges published in this magazine and effective from 1 March 2013. We have been charging an additional £5 on overseas transfers to cover the cost of posting passports for several years and this £5 postage fee is now added into other overseas transactions to cover the postage costs which increased substantially last year. Some years ago, before I started dong this job, the Society took the decision to claim Gift Aid on member's subscriptions - this entailed there being no financial benefit to being a member of the Society and so registration and transfer fees were made the same for members and non-members. There was a poor take up for the signing of Gift Aid forms and the amount claimable has been decreasing steadily over the years. Consequently, Council have agreed that we should revert to the previous system where members have preferential rates for business transacted and we will no longer claim Gift Aid on subscriptions. It should also be noted that although we made a loss in 2011/12, our reserves are still in excess of those recommended in our Reserves policy.

Council agreed last year that registration costs for 2013 should be reduced by £5 per foal - this will be in the form of a rebate which will be paid to members only for foals that are registered within the appropriate timescale.

We received a letter in the autumn from Langdales, our accountants, to say the practice will be having a change of ownership, as Geoff Langdale moves towards retirement. The firm is merging with a Chartered Accountancy practice called Brosnans, based in West Yorkshire, but the team at Langdales will stay as it is and Geoff will be there three days a week for the time being, so I don't anticipate there will be much change for us.

MINUTES OF THE AUTUMN GENERAL MEETING

MINUTES OF THE AUTUMN GENERAL MEETING OF THE FELL PONY SOCIETY Held at Tebay Club on Sunday 28 October 2012

Miss Longsdon opened the meeting and thanked everyone for attending. It was intended to hold a short general meeting followed by a buffet lunch and a talk.

1 Apologies for absence

2 Approval and adoption of Annual General Meeting Minutes of 24 March 2012

Approval of the minutes was proposed By Mrs S Brunskill, seconded by Mrs M Murray, and the minutes were approved.

3 Matters arising from the minutes of the Annual General Meeting held on 24 March 2012

Miss Longsdon told members that because of delays in completion of the new mart, the Society Sale at Kendal had had to be cancelled, so there had been no Society Sale this year. It was sad, but hopefully things would be better next year.

Miss Longsdon then thanked Mrs Millard for another excellent magazine for our 90th Anniversary.

Waverhead Ted had been Reserve Overall Champion at the NPS Supreme Dressage Championships—it was very creditable that a Fell had done so well.

Anna Meadows had also done very well on the British Pony Club Team—it was not usual for a Fell to excel in Pony Club Games. Anna will attend the AGM in spring and give a short talk about her experiences.

The Southern Show had been a successful day. The Olympia class had been measured by David Sykes, former chief steward for the NPS.

Miss Longsdon reminded members that nominations for Council should be received by the office by 1 January 2013. She asked members to please make use of their postal vote and to encourage others to do so—It was the way to get the people they wanted onto Council.

The Breed Show had been relocated to Barnard Castle in 2012 because of the dreadful weather-the weather had actually been kind on the day and the show

had gone well. The venue had been provisionally booked for 2013 as a reserve in the case of extreme wet weather.

Mrs Newall had suggested at the AGM that we send a card to HM The Queen, congratulating her on her Diamond Jubilee. We had received a reply thanking us for our good wishes, and this was on display today.

4 Chairman's Report

Miss Longsdon thanked members for a very successful Anniversary week, especially Eileen Walker and her team of workers who had organised the event and those people who had hosted days. The weather had been mostly good and everyone seemed to enjoy it. A lot or work had gone into organising the event, it had been well attended and thanks were due to all. Mrs Walker said she felt it had gone generally well and we had managed to please most of the people most of the time! She said a huge thank you to those who had given their time to help organise it and to those who had donated prizes. The week's events had raised sufficient funds to proceed with the publication of the proposed Anniversary book. It anyone who had attended any of the events would like to write an article about their experiences, please would they do so and send it in by 30 There was still time to enter the writing competition and more November. entries would be welcome. Mrs Walker was also contacting all those studs who had bred a foal in 2012 to offer them a free stud advertisement in the book, with a view to creating a historical document that could be referred to in the futurein ten years time, when the Society celebrates its centenary, the record could be updated to record the changes. Overall she thought that the Anniversary week had been very worthwhile, if exhausting!

Miss Longsdon had attended the Rare Breeds Heritage Show for equines, organised in conjunction with the Hackney Horse & Pony Society and held at Bury Farm, Slapton in September. Janet and Georgina Blair had organised the ponies and the Fells did their display five times. The event went well but unfortunately was not well supported by the general public. The report in the latest edition of The Ark said 'Highlights this year included a great display from the Fell Pony Society...' Miss Longsdon thanked all those who had helped to make the event a success.

Last year's ridden bursary was awarded to Heather Mawrey and Wansfell Tobias. This year it has been awarded to Courtney Read and Carrock Stormbreaker. Miss Longsdon expressed the Society's gratitude to the donor of the bursary—it was an excellent opportunity for the recipient.

Miss Longsdon spoke of our President this year—HRH The Duke of Edinburgh. He was a great support to the Society and as he had not been able to attend any of our events, Mr Charlton had deputised for him and attended in his place. Mr Charlton was due to go into hospital for an operation later this week and Miss Longsdon wished to record the meeting's best wishes for him.

Finally Miss Longsdon thanked Mrs Parkin and Mrs Wilkinson for their hard work in the office, all members of Council and everyone in the room - they were the heart of the Society and it wouldn't run without them. She then reminded members about the merchandise stand and encouraged them to buy their Christmas presents before leaving.

5 Secretary/Treasurer's Report

Mrs Parkin told members that she and Mrs Wilkinson had attended the M & M Sale at Penrith on Friday 19 October so that they could do transfers if required and any other Society business. There were 98 Fell ponies in the catalogue. 75 were forward on the day of which 45 were foals. 38 foals and 15 older ponies were actually sold through the ring. Prices fell again for the fifth consecutive year. The foal prices ranged from 15 to 230 guineas with the average being 73. Older ponies ranged from 80 to 1,060 guineas, the average being 342. The overall average price was 150 guineas, compared to 219 guineas last year. Of the 53 ponies sold, 30 were transferred by their new owners and a further 4 ponies that were sold later were also transferred. Sue & Rachel Brunskill ran the merchandise stand and took £673 which was good as the Sale was much less well attended than usual.

In the office 237 foals have been registered so far this year. More were still expected but it was anticipated that numbers will have fallen again this year.

The latest figures from the Animal Health Trust on FIS testing in 2012 indicated that 149 Fells had been tested, of which 76 were clear, 72 were carriers and one had been affected.

On the Finance side, there was over three thousand pounds in the current accounts, £35,000 in the deposit account, and almost £9,800 in the Trust Fund. Next week was the end of the financial year and the new one had already started with some members paying their 2013 subscriptions at the Sale.

6 Any Other Business

A new member of the Society asked why breeders took their ponies to the Sale when prices were so low and suggested that the Society might consider using the money in the bank to pay the breeders not to breed. She felt that it belittled the ponies to sell them for so little. This provoked considerable discussion. It was pointed out that the low prices were not particular to Fell ponies-the recession was affecting all breeds and Shetlands and New Forest ponies had been selling for as little as £5. The Society's registrations had been falling over the last three years and people were encouraged to breed only from their best. Mares on the fell wintered better if in foal and older mares might not start breeding again if not put in foal regularly. It was not the Society's responsibility to tell breeders what to do-if breeders chose to breed, it was their decision, and if they didn't want or were unable to keep their ponies through the winter, the Sale was where they went. Many ponies sold at the Sale went to good homes, and selling a pony direct from the stud did not always guarantee a good home. There was a feeling that the quality of the foals had been poor, with a high incidence of white markings. The condition of some ponies had been poor - this might have been due to the bad summer and it was pointed out that the condition of a pony straight from the fell would improve quickly once it was moved elsewhere. It was mentioned that another native breed society had adopted a scheme where unregistered foals could go straight to slaughter without papers. Some ponies had sold at better prices out of the ring and people could be reluctant to bid in the ring if not familiar with that environment. Members were reminded that the Penrith Sale had not been a Society Sale this year and that Council were aware of the problems and were trying to get it right.

There was a short discussion about the Society's shows. A question was asked about the possible inclusion of gymkhana games at one of our shows and Mrs Robinson confirmed that it had been suggested as an option for the South Cumbria Show. It was pointed out that the Southern Show had much more variety in classes—it was both a fun show and a Breed Show. Mrs Robinson replied that when working hunter classes etc had been included in the Breed Show there had been no support for them. To the question of why there had been no entrant from the North West in the Inter Area Competition at the Southern Breed Show, Miss Longsdon said that was entirely down to the North West Group—they were invited to compete along with the other groups and the issue should be taken up with them.

7 Presentation of the Lownthwaite Rob Trophy

This was deferred to the Annual General Meeting next spring.

Miss Longsdon closed the formal meeting and members enjoyed a buffet lunch before settling down for a fascinating talk on laminitis by vet Karl Collins and farrier Graham Harland, illustrated by the dissection of a foot to enable members to see the internal structure of the hoof.



FIS Testing

Council have decided that should owners so wish, their pony passports can be endorsed to indicate that the pony has been FIS tested. The result of the test may also be indicated if the owner wishes it.

Passports will be endorsed by the Secretary who will need to see the relevant FIS certificate.

There will be no charge for this, but if passports are sent in to the office for endorsement, a contribution to the cost of return postage would be appreciated.



The following retire and are eligible for re-election: Miss B Bell, Mr T B Capstick, Mrs M C Murray and Mr D Wilkinson. They are all willing to stand again. One new candidate has been proposed - Mr J Greener. There is an additional vacancy on Council due to the sad death of Mr T C Thompson. Therefore there are five vacancies and five candidates, so there is no need for a vote.

Election addresses are printed below for members' information. Numbers in brackets represent the number of regular meetings which have not been attended by those Council members serving over the last five years.



MISS BARBARA BELL - prefix 'WAVERHEAD' (8)

I was born in Cumbria alongside the Caldbeck fells on the edge of the Lake District, into a family steeped in knowledge of Fell pony breeding. I was born with Fell ponies in my blood - my father lim Bell established the Waverhead stud and my grandfather had previously bred Fells under the Bankhouse prefix. I have lived at Waverhead all my life; Fell ponies have always been part of it. I am still breeding Fell ponies and judging at local shows. I have been on the Council since 2003 but have been working with Fells and Society members as long as I can honestly remember. I hope I have contributed to the Society during my time on Council and that you will support my re-election.

MR THOMAS CAPSTICK - prefix 'MURTHWAITE' (12)



I have been breeding Fell ponies on the Howgills for 40 odd years. Influenced as a boy by Ted Benson of Adamthwaite, my first Fell was only an inspected mare but I soon purchased some fully registered stock which was the foundation of the Murthwaite Stud. Another major influence on the Murthwaite breeding was Sarge Noble. His Heltondale stallions helped greatly to improve the quality and conformation of my herd.

The Murthwaite ponies run as a semiferal herd on the Howgills all year round and I hope to promote this natural and traditional breeding for as many years as possible.

With the help of some special friends, my ponies have won and represented

the Fell breed at many prestigious shows throughout the UK.

If fortunate enough to be re-elected to Council, I will endeavour to do my best for both the Fell Pony Society and the Fell Pony as a breed.

MR JOHN GREENER - prefixes 'THORNLAW', 'KINKRYHILL'

I have been a member of the Fell Pony Society for 27 years and for the last 5 years have been an active member of the Fell Pony Show Committee, erecting show rings and taking responsibility for Health and Safety risk assessments ensuring that the Society complies with current legislation.

Over the past 25 years I have bred Fell ponies under the Thornlaw and more recently the Kinkryhill prefixes, attempting to retain the movement, substance and durability of our true native pony. My ponies run at 900 feet above sea level on sparse ground and as such are extremely hardy but rarely mature to more than 13.2hh.

Over the years I have gained a great deal of pleasure from showing, driving and



endurance riding, promoting the versatility of our ponies across the country and would hope to continue to do this for many years to come.

After having 27 years of fun from ponies I feel that I would like to give something back to the Fell Pony Society and the ponies. I would like to stand as an active Council member supporting not only our traditional high ground semiferal herds but all members and especially encouraging young people to enjoy the Fell pony as much as I have. I believe strongly in maintaining the traditional breed standards and shall continue to promote the Fell pony as the good all round family pony that it is.

MRS MARGARET MURRAY - prefix 'BALDERSDALE' (3)



I have been a member of the FPS since the late 1960s when I first moved to the North of England. I bought my first pony from Molly Laing and ever since then I have always had at least one Fell. I was fortunate to have had Reuben Tunstall as my neighbour and I am grateful to him, others of the older 'pony men' and to the succession of ponies I've lived with for teaching me so much.

I have been a Council member for a good many years and I am also the FPS Show Secretary and have been involved with the running of the shows since 1975.

Over the years, the Fell pony has been my abiding interest and pleasure. I am happy to continue working for the Society in whatever way I can.

MR DAVID WILKINSON - prefix 'BRACKENBANK' (10)

I have owned, bred and shown Fell Ponies for just less than 30 years. Together with my wife, Katherine, and daughter, Megan, we breed & show the Brackenbank Fell Ponies. I am a FPS Panel judge and have served on the FPS Council since 1999.

I believe that all Fell Pony owners are equally important and all relevant to the success of the Fell Pony and in turn, the Society, whether a one pony owner or an owner of several ponies.

I am particularly supportive of the younger members within the Society, as after all they are our future and am keen to encourage them to take part in young handlers and young judges' classes at FPS shows. I will do my best to attend as many Council meetings as I am able and continue to help with the setting up of the show field prior to the Breed Show and other events as required. I am now part of the Show Sub-Committee.





Election of President

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Obituary—Mrs Ailie Newall

The Society is sorry to report that Mrs Ailie Newall, a past President of the Society; a Council member for 40 years; and breeder of the Dene ponies in Northumberland, passed away on 21st December 2012.

Ailie was a tremendous ambassador for the Fell Pony over the years. She was a very competent judge; and bred ponies that travelled all over the country and were a huge advertisement for the breed.

Ailie was born in 1921, nee McCosh, and was the sister-in-law of the late Sylvia McCosh of Dalemain, near Ullswater. Her father was a senior 'Writer to the Signet' - a Scottish Judge. He was not very supportive towards her interest in ponies. Ailie often spent time at a neighbouring farm as a child helping with the work ponies; and it was from here that she got her first Shetland pony. From there her craze for ponies grew and she began breeding Shetland Ponies.

She did not become involved with Fell Ponies until she married Gerald Newall who lived at Shepherd's Dene (hence the Dene Prefix) near Riding Mill in Northumberland. Gerald had been breeding Fell Ponies for several years before

The other rider is Bob Charlton's sister Mary Ormrod. they married, having been influenced by his near neighbour Roy Charlton (Bob's Grandfather, who wrote the book *A Lifetime with Ponies*). Soon after they were married they bought Todridge Farm where Ailie then lived for the rest of her life. They had two children, Robert and Geraldine. Sadly Gerald died 2 months before Geraldine was born, so Ailie was widowed for 57 years.

Ailie was an excellent rider, and rode to hounds regularly with the Tynedale Hunt. In the 50's, 60's and 70's she showed her ponies extensively up and down the country.

She was very instrumental in improving the popularity of the Fell Pony in Post War years. She continued breeding and showing, selling both breeds from Todridge all over the world, and her customers included the Royal Family. In 2012 Ailie was absolutely thrilled to receive the Society's Queen Elizabeth trophy in recognition of her work with Fell ponies from Bob Charlton, FPS Vice President, and be made an Honorary Member of the FPS.

Obituary—Mr Chris Thompson

Many of Chris Thompson's friends have contributed memories of him as a Fell pony breeder and judge.

In an interview in 2005 he said: "My father had Fell ponies all his life; and his father before him. There was a farm sale at Town End at Helton. He bought 3 ponies there—very early on before the First World War, before the Society was founded. He just left them on their own ground where they'd been taken from.

"My grandfather would keep one or two for trap ponies and they would use them for shepherding, probably working the hayfields and suchlike. And then in 1917 or 18, they gave that tenancy up and came down to Askhamgate. I can remember father buying three and four



year old geldings to go the collieries—and as milk ponies—for Ashington Colliery in County Durham.

"My father gave me one when I left Askhamgate and went to Drybarrows in 1961. I only had the one from home and I bought one or two from Sarge Noble."

Chris was very good friends with Sarge Noble. The two were near neighbours and went to Horse Sales together. Mrs Greta Noble said, "I've lots of happy memories of Chris and Sarge. About this time of year (January) we'd go looking for the ponies and bringing them home off the fell. Chris was a good neighbour and friend and he would always give you a hand to do the fell work. We were dealing with wild ponies, but Chris knew how to handle them. The Drybarrows and Askhamgate people would stand in road ends to turn them the right way."

Judy Fairburn remembers, "He just seemed to get on with things in his quiet way. It is typical of Chris' kind nature that after I had paid for a pony he counted back some of the cash enquiring if it would cover the insurance costs." Ellen Jones showed Moorhouse Crispin for Chris in 1994. "I had no transport and Chris lent me his Landrover and Trailer to get to the Shows. He would warn me that it might be needed for farm work, but somehow Chris swapped his jobs about so I could go. He was such a lovely, kind and generous man. He started me off with Fell and Dales Ponies and I will always be grateful to him. We are all much poorer for his passing."

His funeral tribute ended fittingly with the words "the gentleman of the Fells."

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FPS Southern Show Report 2012

The twenty third annual Southern Show took place on Sunday 9 September 2012 at Crown Farm, Ascott-under-Wychwood, Oxfordshire, Strong entries meant judges David Wilkinson. Stella Hore and David Lee were kept busy in the in hand classes. The 20 year old veteran Sunnybrowe Jack, shown by his owner Sarah Prior, made a triumphant return to the show ring by standing top of a full stallion class. The 4-8 years in hand mare class was won by long distance traveller from Scotland Towford Harmanie, owned and bred by Mrs M Hall, Roddlesworth Dot, owned by Jane Glass and Janet Copeland, won the 9 year & over mare class and went on to be reserve in the mare championship. but it was winner of the broodmare class, breeder George Guy's Severnvale Gypsy Rose, who took the mare championship under judge Stella Hore. David Wilkinson chose the two year old Hemleyhill Genesis, owned and bred by Lorna and Christina Brooks, as his 'Thomas' is the first homebred foal for Lorna and voungstock champion. Christina, and he won the foal class at this show in 2010. David Lee judged the in hand geldings, and chose Wendy Bloor's homebred Hesworth Topaz as champion, over reserve Townend Emperor, owned by Kevin Light. Thanks are also due to Katherine Wilkinson for judging the children's classes.

Sunnybrowe Jack was chosen as in hand champion, with Rebecca Lock's two year old Wellbrow Dodger as reserve. Dodger is Rebecca's first foray into Fell youngstock, and she's had considerable success with him, including winning the yearling class in 2011. Rebecca is obviously enjoying the change from scrubbing white patches (her main job is breeding and showing coloureds) and she's since acquired a second Wellbrow youngster.

The show also hosts the final of the Inter Area In Hand Champion, for the Bewcastle Boy Blue Trophy, and this year we welcomed representatives from the following support groups: Scottish (Towford Harmanie and Mrs G Rae's Bracklinn Melissa), Midlands East (Sunnybrowe Jack and Roddlesworth Dot), South East (Mrs S Petritz's Richmond Cosmos) and South West (Mr & Mrs PA Schwarzin's Fairlawn Dominic and the late Mrs BC Hall's Hollyhouse Opal. It would be great to see representatives from all the support groups at the final - we haven't yet had a pony representing the North West Support Group. Stallion Fairlawn Dominic, representing the South West Support Group, took the championship, with Sunnybrowe Jack in reserve.

The in hand championships took a very long time to judge, which meant everybody not involved got a chance to eat their lunch, but the show secretary started to get very twitchy about the timetable. Fortunately our new approach to scheduling, which involves not allowing the judges to have lunch at lunchtime (don't worry, we feed them well before and after) meant we were able to start the Olympia semi-final qualifier roughly on time. All ponies in the Olympia qualifier were measured this year, a process which went off without a hitch, in no small part due to commentator David Sykes' advice to competitors 'to go and practise their handy pony' on the measuring mat beforehand. Other pearls of wisdom from David included a recommendation to set off for the toilets before you needed to go 'because you'll need to go by the time you get there.' One of the problems was that the wind direction meant it was hard to hear David in the lorry park, something we will try to improve next year.

Stella Hore and David Wilkinson judged the Olympia semi-final qualifier and chose Darrenvale Dambuster, owned and ridden by Jo Bearcroft, as their winner. Jo has recently acquired her Fell after years of riding thoroughbreds, and was expecting to settle for a quieter riding life but has discovered that Fells can be just as exciting to ride. Mrs C Booth's Murthwaite John Tom, ridden by Helen Pearce, was second, and took the second qualification card. A very close third was the promising combination of 12 year old Holly Mayling with her mother's Greenholme Yabadabadoo. Holly and Bill have formed a great partnership, and went on to win the Children's Championship, the Novice Working Hunter Pony, and along with Nicola, the hotly contested Two Generations class.

The driving class took place after lunch, and judge Fiona Bonney was delighted with Alison Morton's Lownthwaite Fingerprint. We'd love to see more driving turnouts at the show, so if you've got a driven Fell why not come along next year?

The afternoon always poses a challenge with ponies moving through a range of ridden classes. Sybil Lee joined David Lee and Stella Hore to judge the ridden rings in the afternoon, and all three judges were assisted by hard working stewards who kept the chaos under control. Each ridden class produced a different first and second place winner, which meant the judges had a wonderful choice in the ridden championship. The stallion Townend Moonshadow, owned and ridden by Hannah Miller-Burton stood ridden champion, while Darrenvale Dambuster stood reserve. Veteran Sunnybrowe Jack took the supreme championship, with Townend Moonshadow as reserve.

As well as the main showing classes, the Southern has a range of classes to suit all competitors. Children are well catered for, with a range of ridden classes, a voung handler competition (this year won by Anna Meadows with Aylestone The Merrie Monk), handy pony and fancy dress. The handy pony was a closely fought competition won by Judy Hill's Shepparton Kim, ridden by her niece Caroline Handy pony is of course not only for kids, and Wendy Bloor with Barbour Hesworth Topaz was a close second. Sunnybrowe Josh, who lives at the nearby Kingham Hill School, carried several members of the same family round the course. The fancy dress was won by 'war horse' Shilvinghampton Rosanna May with twins Melissa and Kiara Edwards. Catriona Paterson got into the Olympic spirit with Meres Just-a-Mo to take second place. Judge Fiona Bonney was most impressed at how good both ponies were with the flapping plastic and flags that were part of Catriona's costume. Dressage and working hunter classes are going and dressage judges Sharron Camp and Jocelyn from strength to strength Robinson were kept busy with full classes. Tamsin Hughes with her young stallion Banksgate Tamlin won the walk/trot test, and Kevin Light's stallion Clarmount Bengeman, ridden by Claire Sheehan, won the prelim. Veteran Ludworth Donna, owned and ridden by Sam Bloomfield, won the novice. Del Dewdney judged the working hunter classes; stallions once again showed their versatility with Townend Moonshadow winning both the intermediate and open working hunter pony classes, and going on to be WHP champion. Hesworth Topaz was reserve.

There is only room to write about the winners, but the aim is for everybody who comes to the show to enjoy competing with their pony, whichever class they do. As competitor Catriona Edwards says, "I remembered the dressage test, didn't fall off jumping and we won the Fancy Dress - all the important stuff!"

The show is lucky to have a hard working committee, dedicated helpers who turn out year after year, and generous sponsors. In particular we are grateful to Roger and Sue Muttitt of Seatallan Engineering Ltd who have supported the show for many years. Mary Towneley Loop 25th - 29th July 2012

My youngest daughter Suzy says that the Mary Towneley Loop is like life itself, full of ups and downs, triumphs and challenges, pain and joy, tears and laughter. In the ten years that the Loop has been open, and in the twelve years that I have lived and worked on this 48 mile circular bridleway it has certainly become a mirror and metaphor for my own life.

In that time I have lost my mum and my dad, but I have gained 2 sons-in-law, a daughter in law and four beautiful grandchildren. I have been forced to give up a teaching career but have created my own business; I have lost two ponies but gained eight more; I have fallen many times, but always got back up. I have met extraordinary and interesting people, many who have become friends. I have worked so very hard but loved every minute of it. We have survived deluge, heat wave and sub-zero temperatures. My husband, with whom I was going to grow old, left me. But if, when riding the Mary Towneley Loop, or indeed going on life's journey itself, you have a faithful horse as your companion, you can endure and surmount all obstacles. In our case we have developed a relationship with our locally bred Wellbrow Fell ponies which is very special. They share our life, our land, our work and our love in a unique and fulfilling way.

We were determined to mark the 10th anniversary of the MTL both to celebrate and raise the profile of this fantastic ride. The Mary Towneley Loop of the Pennine Bridleway, is a 48 mile circular ride which runs through the Rossendale and Burnley boroughs of East Lancashire, and Calderdale in West Yorkshire. It meanders along ancient packhorse trails of worn causey stones, across wild open moorland, through wooded valleys with tumbling streams and past remote and peaceful reservoirs. This scenic and historic route has brought many outside visitors to the area in the last 10 years, to walk, ride or cycle over its historic and rugged terrain.

Those who have experienced this trail will understand the vision and commitment of Mary, Lady Towneley, in whose honour it is



named, and who campaigned so hard to open up ancient and forgotten ways for the benefit of all users. At Peers Clough Farm we feel a great affection for our stunning landscape and the visitors it has brought us. My eldest daughter Cia suggested a charity ride, with us escorting our ponies on foot with a team of sponsored riders taking legs of the journey. How easy to say things, how much harder to organise. The enterprise was a year in the planning and a great learning curve. How do you attract riders? What do you do if they drop out? Will they all meet up in the right place? When is the best time to do it? Who will we raise money for? How annoying is it when your printer doesn't work? Will it rain? Will the ponies cope? Are we capable of walking that far? Do we take children? Do we take novices? What if one of the ponies dies?

We had planned to take our four Wellbrow Fell ponies - Danny, Target, Jimmy and Jake (the Peers Clough Packhorses). In May, Jakey died following an impaction. Suzy nursed him so lovingly during his last days and he died in as dignified and humble a way as he had always conducted himself. We were devastated to lose such a dependable, reliable and genuinely honest pony—a trusted work colleague in our team—but we decided that Freddie the Welsh cob should step into the breach, which he did in his own inimitable style.

We chose charities to cover a wide spectrum of needs, hoping that this way noone would have an excuse not to give! We also wanted to aid groups who supported the needs of the local community.


Being girls one of the most important things was to organise our clothes for the trip. Cia is excellent at merchandise and ordered smart polos and t shirts and fleeces with our MTL2012 logo to make us look professional. Special anniversary rosettes proved popular with the riders and also those riding the MTL on their own horses throughout the season.

We were delighted with the response to take up places on the ride, and although inevitably some people had to drop out we had around 40 varied and enthusiastic riders taking part.



The youngest riders w e r e m y granddaughters Evie (20 months) and Alex (2 and a bit) who rode the final proud mile home to the farm; the oldest were in their 60s.

Some were very experienced, some were novices; there were families, couples, friends, mums and daughters



and strangers, united together for a challenge, for fun, and to support our enterprise.

Our ride was launched by the Mavor of Rossendale and by Mikey, an autistic voung man who rides regularly at the farm on our wonderfully patient pony. Mikey always has a team of Dannv. three carers to support his complex and challenging needs. We had decided that Mikey would complete his usual short ride at the start of the bigger expedition and he had received overwhelming support and sponsorship from family and carers. We intended to keep excitement and fuss to an absolute minimum so as not to upset Mikev's finely balanced equilibrium.

The photographer from the local paper had his own agenda - that the mayor would shake Mikey's hand and pose obligingly for his camera. As it

turned out this is what happened, but the carers said afterwards that their hearts were in their mouths as the mayor stepped out to ambush Mikey with a warm

smile and attempt a handshake. Mikey looked uncomprehending but thankfully stayed mounted and Danny carried on his way to the relief of all.

The Mayor was a great sport, talking to and encouraging apprehensive riders and fascinating Evie with his chain of office. When the ride was completed he sent a message of congratulation to Mikev saying how proud he should be of his achievements and that he was a role model to other young people. Mikey will never understand these words, but they touched and gladdened the hearts of his family and carers and were much appreciated by everyone at the farm. Like little Evie and Alex, Mikey showed us that the shortest rides were actually the biggest achievements.



Each day of the ride had its own unique character, governed by the mix of riders, weather and terrain. At no time did we wish it other than what it was at that moment and for a teacher who failed in being a good planner, the logistics were a credit to me and Mark and Brent, the back-up team.

Once back at the farm after a rainy final day, the weather brightened and we held a celebration pervaded with a buzz of relief, affection, pride and quiet satisfaction at a job well done. Excellent food was provided by middle daughter Caroline and her husband Adam. Certificates were presented and a slide show run of the hundreds of photos Cia took during the week.

Everyone of our riders, and everyone who travels the Mary Towneley Loop has their own story to tell—and we always say that one day we will write the book...

For now I would like to say a huge thank you to all our riders and their sponsors who raised an amazing £4,000 for our charities, my wonderful family and above all our brilliant ponies, especially Jakey, who would have made it if he could.




FPSNA Performance Premium & Awards Open Driving winner Laurelhighland Duke owned by Peggy Shuford and driven by Nicole Cable

We wish you all well, and we are looking forward to a drier and better 2013.



Judges' report

The Prose sections were judged by Jackie Moffatt, columnist for Cumbria Life magazine and author of "The Funny Farm" and "Sheepwrecked." The Poetry sections were judged by Sue Millard, FPS Editor, poet and author of "Hoofprints in Eden," "One Fell Swoop" and "Coachman."

There was a total of 40 entries, which was very pleasing. All the classes were blind-judged with writers' names blanked out, so it was very strange to find after judging that out of the first six entries to arrive, five either won or were placed. Evidently the really dedicated writers pitch in and get on with it.

What we looked for in all sections were stories or scenes described so well that we could forget the nuts and bolts and trust the writers to carry us into their "Fell Diamonds" world.

We were impressed with the quality of the writing, especially in the **adult Prose section**, where some entries were more poetical than some of the verse. There wasn't one of the 15 that was unpublishable. The winners not only got their message across effectively but had very distinctive voices and ideas.

We read a wide range of interpretations of the title "Fell Diamonds." Some writers went for the factual approach, some went for made-up stories and many used humour, but they all wrote with strong understanding of Fell pony nature.

In the **adult Poetry section** we had 21 entries, by far the biggest class. (During the early part of the entry period it had even looked as though we might receive nothing but poems for the competition.)

We were hoping to find a little gem in here—coal compressed into a diamond, or wine distilled into a perfect spirit. Many entries attempted rhymed and metrical verse which is extremely difficult to do well. Of these, the winning entry stood out for its amusing narrative, its regular, conversational metre and well-managed rhymes which supported the story rather than being added just because they fitted.

The two equal-second placed poems were free verse, and they were so well written that we could not put any of the other poems above them. It was no surprise to find they were by the same writer. If either of them had touched on the Diamonds theme as well as "Fells", it would probably have won.

We only had one entry in the **junior Poetry section**, which is curious given that we had so many adult poems; our Fell pony poets must start late in life. This was a cleverly presented and well written piece and a worthy winner.

In the **junior Prose section**, we took age into account, so younger writers came out equal with an older one who told a good story but whose spelling and grammar needed more care.

We were able to award some equal prize money and a Commended prize within our competition budget, and all winners receive a cheque (1st £20, 2nd £10, 3rd £5), and a copy of the Anniversary Book FELL DIAMONDS in which the winning and placed entries are published.

Mysteries of the FPS Archive




Above: This photograph of a Fell driving turnout was probably taken at a British Driving Society Meet at Lowther Horse Driving Trials in the 1980s. Clues to the venue are the wooden ring-fence, the obstacle cone in the arena beyond the pony's back, and the policeman in shirt-sleeves near the announcer's caravan. Discussion on a driving forum has suggested that the pretty carriage may be a C-spring road cart, which is either American or a copy of an American vehicle. Since that is unusual, it may help in identifying the pony, driver and passenger.

Top Right: Sarge and Thomas Noble with—presumably—a Heltondale gelding. Probably at Keld Head, Heltondale, and possibly taken by Helen Dobie. Can anyone date the photo, name the pony or confirm the location?

many Pleasure rides. including one year being oldest ponv the to complete at Tebay; riding holidays over the Fells: the Mary Towneley Loop, and in Scotland: and. Banner's highlightgalloping across Morecambe Bay on several occasions, the last being when he was 28 years old.

He loved that. I just dare not take him any more in case he had a heart attack out there with the excitement.



He has been a wonderful pony. He has taken me places I would never have dreamed of and he has taught me most of what I know about ponies, Fells in particular. He has also given me such a love of Fells in general. In fact he has shaped my life since I met him. A real stalwart with a true stickability and determination. Thank you, Banner.

Wildhoeve Boy FP50598C* 1996—2012

Saturday night, March 24 1996; the birth of the 4th foal of the Wildhoeve stud. The first impression is still with us; a good looking colt foal, lots of bone and looking around the world, a bit arrogant. At that time we didn't know that he would grow up as an important stallion of our Fell Pony stud. He has an impressive list; in1998 youngstock champion at breed show, 2003 champion over all at stallion show and 2004 reserve champion. In 2005 champion at the overseas branch stallion show in Belgium. 2006 in Great Britain he was second in veteran class and 5th overall. Champion again at the stallion show 2007. With 61 descendants he has made a big contribution to the Dutch Fell Pony population; 8 first premium mares and foal champions. But he left also his footprints abroad with licensed sons in Denmark, Germany, Switzerland and even in Great Britain. We lose in Boy not just a stallion but we lose the corner-stone of our Fell Pony stud. Wildhoeve Boy died October 25 2012.

Heather found the lessons extremely helpful and said that she really saw an improvement in her pony, Wansfell Tobias's, way of going. She also became much more motivated herself and was up early each day, schooling Tobias before work. The evidence came at the FPS Breed Show in August 2012, where Tobias took the in hand gelding championship and was 5th, and the first gelding, in the male open ridden class behind four top class show stallions. Well done to Heather and Tobias!

Heather urges others not to be shy and to enter the Bursary competition in 2013, as it is such a great opportunity to get the individual assistance that can make all the difference to the performance of pony and rider.

2012 - Courtney Read and Carrock Stormbreaker

The 2012 Bursary has been awarded to 19 year old Courtney Read, a student from Leyland near Preston. Courtney's pony Carrock Stormbreaker (Teddy) is a 6 year old gelding whom Courtney bought from the Crane family as a two year old colt. Teddy was bred by the Cockbains out of Townend Sugar by Towerview Spirit of Joy.

Courtney and Teddy had a very successful in hand career before Courtney backed him as a four year old. They had a very successful first season under saddle qualifying for NCPA pony of the year show, Equifest and NPS Spring festival for 2011 where they won the Underwood's young rider of the year 16-21 year old section and received lots of excellent feedback from judges and spectators. They were also the highest placed home produced in the Pure Novice M&M class against seasoned campaigners.

In 2011 Courtney and Teddy started competing in working hunter, and it soon became apparent that jumping was Teddy's forte; Courtney reports that people were often shocked by the scope and ability of her small chunky pony. Their greatest achievement that season was winning the BSPS heritage novice M&M working hunter at Aintree show where they also took the championship. By the end of the season they had qualified for the NPS summer champs in WHP and flat classes. They also had a very good day at the Westmorland county show winning



their in hand class; taking 3rd in the ridden Fells and 2nd in the BSPS WHP class against tough competition.

During 2012 Courtney and Teddy have entered RIHS and HOYS working hunter qualifiers; qualified for the NPS area 25 M&M working hunter championships at NPS Summer champs; and the North West Working hunter championships. They also attended the Holcombe Hunt show were they won their working hunter classes and got through to the championship in the evening performance.

During the winter they will be out hunting with the Holcombe and generally keeping fit and busy. Courtney says that she will continue to have WH training from Pam Prickett and that she hopes to use the Bursary to have some lessons with Tracey Millward and to attend some showing clinics to polish up her ringcraft.

Good Luck to Courtney and Teddy, excellent Ambassadors for the Fell pony breed. I'm sure we will be seeing a lot more of them in the future.

Greenholme Duke at the British Dressage National Championships

Qualifying for the BD National Championships with Duke was an amazing experience and one that I will never forget. When competing at the Regionals I would have been pleased to be in the top 10, so to come 2nd was for me, awesome. I suppose I didn't realise what competing at the summer nationals meant until I had qualified. I had people I did not even know shaking my hand congratulating us. It was a great feeling I can tell you.

So the preparations began with only 4 weeks to go I wanted us to be on top form I was a little nervous of what response I would get because Duke is not the normal "dressage horse" you would expect to be competing at that level, but just thought we had to give it our best shot. So the day arrived, we travelled down the day before to get him settled and to soak up the atmosphere in the work in arenas the night before. The working in was a little daunting to say the least, big talented dressage horses with big names on board coming at us from all angles. I looked around and around but not another hairy pony in sight, just us Duke was tense and not himself as more and more big standing at 14 hands. Quite a lot of competitors were having lessons as horses piled into the arena. their trainers stood on the side lines communicating through ear pieces. We then went for the arena walk which you were allowed to walk only around the outside of the arenas. I think we must have jogged for about 30 minutes before settling into a walk. The pavilion, the seating, the huge flower arrangements, the judges' boxes, the 3 Audi cars and of course the big screen which was about 40 feet in the air at the side of the arena...was guite a lot for Duke to take in. Finally the day of the competition came. We got him ready and set off for the 10 minute



walk to the arena for the tack check, everything ok. There seemed even more horses working in than the previous evening, and still no hairies in sight. The steward called my name, 7 minutes to go. I didn't know what to expect, would he be jogging and all tense or would he be ok? I had no idea. 2 minutes to go, then we were in, under the archway of flowers we went and into the arena. The previous competitor wished me luck (which is another reason I love dressage as I have always had a welcoming feeling from other We managed to walk a few steps without being too tense and competitors). away we went. I don't think I took a breath during the whole test. Phew, big sigh of relief, it was over with not a hiccup up in sight and we left the arena with a big smile. Walking away from the arena I met my friends who had purchased ear pieces which enabled them to listen to the judges opinion, they said the judges really loved Duke and were very complimentary on his way of going especially his canter. On entering one of the judges had said 'Mmmmmmm now and another judge said, 'The same as everyone how do we judge this?' else....' We finished 12th out of 28 which I was delighted with. Since the Nationals we have competed in the Area Festival Pet Plan where we finished 5th, which again I was delighted with, especially as we have gone up to the next section.

Later in the day Julie rode Aurora to win the Fell ridden and the overall Fell Championship under judge Barbara Bell from Wigton.

Rebecca Morland's prolific winning mare Greenholme Buttercup took the in hand class for ponies four years and above; and the Wilkinson family from Appleby took the yearling and two/three year old classes with Brackenbank Kate and Brackenbank Pearl; full sisters by Lownthwaite Gary out of Brackenbank Sorrel and again prolific winners. Pearl also took the reserve championship.



Sadly the FPS annual sale, which was to have been held at the new auction mart near the M6 at Kendal, could not go ahead, due to circumstances outside the Society's control. However a Mountain & Moorland sale was held at the Penrith auction mart and a number of ponies that would have been sold at the Society's sale were re-routed to Penrith.

Among the potential buyers at the sale was Hannah Toft who travelled all the way from Shrewsbury, Shropshire; setting out at 2 am hoping to find a new addition to her small native (Grinshill) stud. Hannah had lost a two year old Fell colt to an accident a few years ago and although her colt could not be replaced, she felt that the time had come to find another Fell.

When Hannah arrived at the sale her attention was drawn by an impatient little colt with lots of mane and feather and a little bit of fire. Hannah breeds Welsh at home and says that she and her sister tend to go for presence over behaviour. The colt, Birkettbank Sir Alex, was bred and owned by Rob Briggs and is a previous FPS performance premium winner. Hannah loved Sir Alex, or Ferg as he is now known, from the first moment and decided that he was going home to Shrewsbury. Hannah says that Ferg is not like her previous beloved colt, but he reminds her of three ponies that she has lost over the years; and she loves the fact that he represents something from each of them.

Ferg was tucked up in bed on the Friday night and then taken to a show on the Sunday where he qualified for the NCPA pony of the year show. The following week he went out again and qualified for the National Winter Champs; won his class and went reserve champion and got fantastic feedback from the judge.

There are very specific settings for the Magazine text which keep its "look" consistent, so please don't spend time on special layouts or fonts, which will be removed. In particular, don't use tabs to create columns of show results: list the items, one entry per line, in a normal page of text. An Excel spreadsheet is equally acceptable. Don't include show entry numbers. Results often have to be curtailed to the first four placings.

Photographs

The Magazine only uses colour photographs on the covers, inside covers, or centre pages. We reduce photographs to black and white for the main pages. Your digital photograph does not need to be wider than 1600 pixels.

Please DO NOT send your digital image in a word-processed document or PowerPoint slideshow. Just send me a .jpg please. Hard-copy commercial prints, from 5 inches wide up to A4 size, can be posted for scanning. <u>Please</u> enclose an SAE if you want them returned.

Deadline

Please SEND YOUR COPY TO ARRIVE BEFORE THE DEADLINE: 1st September and 1st February. The Magazine must be put together, proof-read and any amendments made before it goes to the printers, and their turnaround also has to be factored in, before the Office can envelope and post the Magazine so you receive your Notice and Agenda three weeks before any FPS General Meeting.

CONDITIONS

The submitter must declare that they either hold the copyright for the image or have permission from the copyright holder for this use of the image. The copyright holder is normally the person who created the image, ie the photographer. The person in the photograph, or the owner of the animal in the image, is NOT automatically a copyright holder. PLEASE CHECK. Images submitted which are later challenged on copyright grounds will be taken off the Gallery. Submission of the image implicitly grants the right to display the image on the web site.

Images may be submitted for consideration in a number of ways:

Electronically via email (the preferred mechanism) Submissions s h o u l d b e m a i l e d t o sue@fellpony.f9.co.uk. Images should be in either GIF or JPG format (JPG preferred).

BIGGER IS NOT BETTER

Please <u>DO NOT</u> submit huge, high resolution image files. Even for the Magazine, images will not need to be much larger than 1Mb. Please note that very large emailed files may clog up the rural broadband to such an extent that I will have to delete the offending messages in order to keep the system running—in which case, your photo will never arrive. Make it smaller—please!

Images posted on the FPS website will not exceed 800 pixels on their longest side.

RESIZE YOUR IMAGES

Please crop and/or resize your images prior to submission: suggested methods below:

For **Outlook/Outlook Express** and other PC-based email programs: Save the image into a folder, then go to My Computer and open that folder, and then right-click the photo. From the menu pick "send to" >> "mail recipient." There is an option to "make all my pictures smaller" when sending - also click the "More Options" link on that little dialogue box, and pick "medium -600 by 800" - it should resize, and open your mail program with a message ready to send, with the resized image attached.

For Hotmail/Gmail and other serverbased programs: Open the picture in Paint or another picture editor, and save it as a small JPG no larger than 800 pixels wide.

CAPTIONS

Regardless of the image submission method used, please provide all necessary captioning information and a means to contact you if we have any questions (either email address or phone number, preferably an email address).

The site's webmaster and the FPS Office are responsible for determining which images should he included. Decision criteria include: the degree to which the image features Fell ponies (cf., people), image quality and general appropriateness of the image. Images used in the Magazine will not normally be included here because Magazines are made available online within 6 months of publication. We are also trying to avoid having too many "me and my pony" portraits as well, instead hoping to feature ponies in action.

No fees will be paid by the Fell Pony Society to anyone for the right to display the submitted image. If fees are required for the right to display the submitted image do not bother submitting the image.

We would like to caption images neatly and appropriately. 
